BIG ELEPHANT

BOUGHT BY BOSTOCK FOR SHOW IN AMERICA.

A Great Engineering Feat - To Make Tools for the British Market - A Prophecy as to What Settlement Would Mean.

London, March 2.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News reports that Princess Margaret, sister of the ex-Crown Princess of Saxony, is willing to become the wife of the crown prince. Marriage with a divorced wife's sister is not illegal and Princess Margaret, the stepmother of her children than a stranger. It is added that the Grand Duke of Tuscany, father of the princess, is willing if the king consents, to give Margaret a dowry equal to that of Louise.

According to the Daily Mail Mr. Bostock has bought the world's biggest elephant, Jingo, and will transport the animal to the United States immediately. The American Consolidated Pneumatic company has completed details with a view to the immediate erection of extensive works in Liverpool, England, for the manufacture of machine tools for the British market. The works will be supervised by American engineers.

Charles Shaw Taylor, secretary of the Irish land conference, sums up the result of his visit to America in the prophecy that a final settlement of the Irish land question would establish better relations between the United States and Great Britain, and greater friendship between Canada and the mother country.

The union members of parliament, who voted against the government on the army debate, last week, make no secret of their determination to pursue a vigorous policy upon independent lines in military, financial and social questions. Winston Churchill is the virtual leader of this new fourth party.

The king's suggestion that the collection of gifts of the two Victoria jubilees should be exhibited in the British section of the next world's fair will be carried out by a British committee. The collection from many hundreds of British gifts will not be made before the end of the year.

The promoters of the British and colonial exhibition, at Cape Town, lament the lack of interest in the home government in that enterprise. They are bent upon having an exhibition at Johannesburg after starting an all-British movement at Cape Town.

One of the speakers of the South African banquet on Saturday night made a fierce onslaught upon the shipping traffic, which was enabling Germany, Belgium and American exporters to send their goods to South Africa at a half, or even a third, of the rates charged for freight from Great Britain. Duke of Devonshire, Tudhope, and other guests warmly advocated a colonial exhibition as a peace measure, and a sound industrial policy. J. J. RUSSIA FEARS CRISIS.

Views a War With Turkey With Much Concern.

St. Petersburg, March 2.—Some publicists are of the opinion that only the sternest language toward Turkey can prevent a war between Russia and Turkey in the spring.

They believe that Turkey will purchase bands of Macedonian revolutionaries across the Bulgarian frontier and that public opinion will compel Russia to interfere.

The Russians thoroughly understand that a war with Turkey will be a more severe one than that of 1878. Officers are quoted as saying that the Turkish army is the best in the world, owing to its German organization and armament.

There is an inclination here to anticipate German financial support of Turkey, and, in view of the situation, forebodings of a clash with Turkey are freely expressed in private, although they are carefully suppressed in the newspapers.

Will Bear Expenses.

Victoria, B.C., March 2.—At Saturday night session of the mining convention the Premier announced that the government would pay the expenses of a commission, named by the convention to proceed to Fenwick to endeavor to settle the coal miners' strike. Premier Prior also declared himself opposed to the present two per cent. mining tax and invited the co-operation of the association in levying a more equitable tax. James Keen, Association, was elected president of the association.

In Northumberland, where Premier Tweedie ran, the government lost three seats, the premier being the only one of his ticket to be re-elected. There were four government members for this county in the last house. Hon. A. G. Blair's determination to make the elections a party question gave intensity to the struggle, and created interesting side issues. Notable among these was the clash between Mr. Blair and Senator Ellis, proprietor of the St. John Globe. Senator Ellis is a staunch liberal of the old school. He fought the battles of New Brunswick liberalism, when victory seemed a long way off. For his earnestness he was given a term in jail, his newspaper having cast reflections upon judicial action in the famous Queen's county election case. Now for his zeal on behalf of coalition and political independence he has been thrown into the cool shades of governmental and party opposition at Ottawa. The ministerial victor of Saturday does not give quarter, especially to the faithless within the camp.

Ottawa, March 2.—The import returns show that 9,710 tons of coal, of which 8,565 was anthracite, was entered at the port of Ottawa during February. Coal is coming in freely and there is now no stringency. Col. Pineault, deputy minister of militia, has returned from holidays in the western states. He spent fourteen days on the train. The first he made of the Maritime shore was through the newspapers. He hurried home on urgent message from the minister. A deputation from Gananoque waited on the minister of public works to ask dredging in the Gananoque and St. Lawrence rivers to improve the harbor. Mr. Tarte visited Gananoque last year, and the deputation held that he had made a specific promise that the work would be done. This is disputed, and the present minister will look into the matter.
