A Sheriff Who Always Secures His Man.

A dispatch announcing the visit of Capt. Seth Bullock, of Deadwood, S. D., at the White House and the long gallop which President Roosevelt took with the westerner over the Washington hills, was read with much interest in Essex county, Ont., his old home.

Bullock is a striking type of the western frontiersman, quick with a gun and knows no fear. It is many years since Bullock left Essex county, but he is still remembered as the "silent man." He has the reputation of seldom asking a question and rarely replying in more than a monosyllabic word. Throughout his long career in dealing with criminals, he was never known to have lost a prisoner or missed a man that he went after. Records of the men he has killed place the list at from twenty-five to forty-five. The former Windsor man is responsible for the capture of "Lame

POPE 25 YEARS.

GREAT EVENT CELEBRATED AT ROME.

The Venerable Pontiff was Celebrated by Fifty Thousand People—Ceremony in St. Peter's.

Rome, March 3.—The pope celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his coronation to-day with great solemnity. St. Peter's was crowded, scores of Americans being present. Inside the great edifice, at the singing of the Te Deum, the scene was one of marvelous brilliancy. The pope's noble guests were reposed in their new uniforms, consisting of purple doublets, white leather breeches, high patent-leather boots, and polished steel helmets with white horse-hair tufts. A score of members of the Sacred College were present, their red robes offering a most pleasing contrast to the

Johnny's gang," a band of criminals, which made a practice of holding up stage coaches on the route to Deadwood. Securing a Chinese preparation known as "stink spot" which has a most vile odor, he called upon them to surrender and being told to go to "to" he lit the fuse and lowered the dope down the shaft. In a short time, unearthly yells were heard, followed by an object offer to surrender. Bullock lowered a rope and ordered that they should fasten all their firearms to it. This done, the men were hauled to the top and locked in the Deadwood jail.

The president's admiration for the old frontiersman dated back to 1890 when he was campaigning in South Dakota. An organized mob had been made to break up a meeting, but Bullock appeared on the platform with a loaded revolver. Bullock's reputation as a "straight shot" served to keep the crowd in order.

The pope had gone to a window overlooking the piazza of St. Peter's to see the people come out of the church. His holiness was recognized, and in a twinkling the great space was crowded with people fluttering their handkerchiefs, waving their hats and cheering the venerable pontiff.

The pope, surrounded by the cardinals and dignitaries of the pontifical curia, was carried to and from the basilica in the Sedia Gestatoria. By request of the pope himself the people were allowed to throw the various hats and witness the impressive procession to and from the basilica.

Late in the day an official bulletin was issued by Dr. Lapponi stating that the aged pontiff had withstood the fatigues of the day remarkably well.

New York Observes Jubilee.

New York, March 3.—Were St. Patrick's cathedral as large as St. Peter's at Rome it would scarcely have been able to accommodate the thousands of devoted Catholics who sought admission, to-day, on the occasion of the celebration of the pope's jubilee. The celebration formed one of the most elaborate ecclesiastical ceremonies ever seen in New York. The participants included all the bishops of the ecclesiastical provinces of New York, together with their gorgeous robes of office, together with all the clergy of the diocese. Archbishop Washington, celebrated pontifical mass and Archbishop Farley preached the sermon. The feature of the elaborate musical programme was Gounod's "Messe Solenne" for soli, chorus, orchestra and organ.

Splendid Topaz For The Pope.

Rome, March 3.—Aids from the golden tiara the most magnificent gift received by the pope on the occasion of the silver jubilee of his pontificate is the splendid topaz, a present from the citizens of Naples. The stone is the largest of its kind in the world, weighing 1 kilo, 784 grains. It was found in the gigantic mines in Brazil, and belonged to the Bourbons of Naples, from whom it passed into the Caracciolo family of Naples, and the face of the stone bears an engraving of "Christ Breaking the Eucharistic Bread."

Pope Very Weak.

Rome, March 3.—The pope is very weak, but determined to attend the thanksgiving service at St. Peter's to-day. A Vatican prelate assured the correspondent that the pope's health is rapidly declining, although danger does not seem to be imminent. Forty-two cardinals now in Rome have met secretly to exchange views as to the possibility of holding a conclave.
