COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Market News.

Toronto Stock Exchange is considering the erection of a building and to add a room to the exchange.

A bonfire cable to The Argentine corn crop is expected to be very late, and will be ready for export about the middle of April.

The New York Stock Exchange seat sold last week for \$11,000, the highest price ever paid, with the customary fee of \$2,000, the membership actually cost.

Prices in hogs in Chicago this week range from \$40 to \$7.55 per cwt., live weight, according to reports in New York.

After making allowances for a small surplus of 5,000,000 bushels in South Australia, it is estimated that the Cornish miners will have to import 12,500.

The Alberta Commercial company is meeting with much success in recruiting men in Norway. Owing to the prevailing depression there is a great shortage of men anxious to emigrate.

The figures of the C.P.R. land department show that there is a great demand for farm lands in the interior, total sales for the month just over were 14,000 acres, which yielded the sum of \$749,235.

A few wholesale grocers of Toronto, London, Hamilton, and other Ontario cities have organized a company to take over the business of the Vimyware company. The present capital of \$25,000 will shortly be raised to \$40,000.

According to the United States Investor gross earnings of twenty-two roads this week were \$1,140,000, or \$4,516,790, an increase of \$2,55,500 over 1902. Sixteen roads show increases and six decreases. Since July 1st these roads totalled \$16,200,223, an increase of \$12,543,723. For the longer period eighteen roads show increases and four decreases.
