GOT DAMAGE

Against Lady Francis Cook,
Of London.

LIBELLED HIM.

TWAS SAID HE TRIED TO
BLACKMAIL HER.

Lady Cook Made a Scene in the Court After the Jury Had Reached a Verdict—The Chief Justice Told Her the Case Was at an End.

London, March 4.—The suit of Mr. Wallace, the former private secretary of Lady Francis Cook (Tennesse Clavin), against Lady Cook for damages for libel and slander, was heard yesterday. Wallace alleged that he was employed by Lady Cook to watch the movements of the late Sir Francis, her lordship's husband, and those of a mysterious lady, whom he agreed to call Mrs. G., and who was supposed to be alienating the affections of Sir Francis.

Wallace further alleged that Lady Cook offered to make him independent for life if he followed her instructions. Wallace acted the role of a private detective not only in this case, but he also watched the movements of "Miss G." father, mother, grandfather, sister and brother, and attended a paragraph, said to have been inspired by Lady Cook, was published, referring to an alleged plan to blackmail Lady Cook. Wallace stated that he believed the paragraph to have been a direct reference to him, hence his suit. Lady Cook was not called upon to testify.

The jury awarded the plaintiff £550 damages.

When the verdict was given Lady Cook approached the bench and in an excited voice loudly protested against the decision, waving her arms and screaming. She declared that she would have the case reopened. The chief justice several times told her the case was over and ultimately, she was induced to leave the court.

AN EDICT ISSUED.
And Ecclesiastical Penalties Are Threatened.

Berlin, March 4.—The spirit of religious strife has again broken out in Germany. The immediate cause is a recent edict by the Archbishop of Trier, threatening the parents of Catholic children who attend any school for girls with ecclesiastical penalties. In the Prussian diet, yesterday, interpellated as to the view he took of the edict, Herr Von Bismarck, the imperial chancellor, declared that the edict was intended to disturb the public peace in matters of belief. He added that the government conscientiously expected the immediate recall of Archbishop Korum, and stated that to this end he had instructed the representatives at the Vatican to impress the importance of the incident upon the pope. The chancellor stated in conclusion that he would take good care to suggest nothing to disturb the existing relations between the church and the state.

IN OUR OWN CIRCUIT.

News of The Districts On Both Sides of The Line.
Westport population is 902, according to the last census.
Hector Fraser, manager of the Bank of Ottawa, Pembroke, was stricken with paralysis on Friday night and died next day.
Henry Young died in Belleville, on Tuesday, aged eighty-six. He was an old friend of Edward. Remains laid to rest at Cherry Valley.

Alexander McCoy, son of William McCoy, of the inland revenue department at Corbyville, died on Tuesday in his eighteenth year. Deceased had been ill for some time.

A funeral party near Caintown nearly terminated in a fight on the night of possession of a son of the deceased, James Cumming, J.P. Lyn, threatened the party with prosecution unless they desisted.

The Brockville, Ont., council has instructed the finance committee to make an application to Mr. Carnegie, on behalf of the corporation, for a grant for the erection of a public library.

FITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest News Culled From All Over The World.

The Aldrich bill was defeated in the United States senate on Tuesday. The carpenters at Brandon have demanded an increase of wages on May 1st.

Percy Wellband, run over by a Winnipeg street car, last Saturday, died this morning.

The Winnipeg Victorias, last night defeated the Louisa Club's team by a score of eight to five.

Mr. Sbarretti, the paid delegate, will go to Montreal, on Friday afternoon, to spend four or five days.

The Allan line steamer Saratonia, from Glasgow, for Portland, Me., arrived at Portland Wednesday morning.

Alfred Carter, aged eighteen, was run over at E.H. Man, while loading sand on the cars and instantly killed.

The award of the United States strike commission is expected to be in the hands of the district boards by Friday next.

The report published in New York City, that Andrew Carnegie had given \$1,000,000 to the graduate school of Princeton University is without foundation.

In Ithaca, N.Y., eight new cases of typhoid fever, three suspected cases and two deaths from the disease have been reported in the last twenty-four hours.

Robert Stewart, employed in a lumber camp at Erwood, N.W.T., was instantly killed by a tree falling on top of his head. He was aged thirty-five and formerly lived at Durham, Ont.

William Rockefeller, the Standard Oil millionaire, is building unique summer homes at St. Regis Lake, near the Adirondacks. Japanese workmen are erecting the cottages on the Japanese model.

The strike instigated by the International Bridge and Structural Iron Works Union, at Fort William, was declared off last night, satisfactory settlement having been arrived at in the nature of a compromise.

The strike instigated by the Italians at the plant of the steel company, at Sydney, N.S., is ended, and this morning most of the men returned to work at the old rate of wages, \$1.40 per day. The ringleaders of the strike will not be taken back.

DISEASE STAMPED OUT.

But Quarantine Regulations Will Be Maintained.

Ottawa, March 4.—Dr. Rutherford, of the agricultural department, is back from the eastern states. He is satisfied that the foot and mouth disease is practically stamped out, but it cannot be known for certain till spring when it will reappear. Till that time has passed without the appearance of the disorder the quarantine regulations now in force will likely be maintained.

The government has not yet recommended, either directly or indirectly, the names of any Canadian jurists for the high commission. Neither have any of the officials, to act for Canada, been selected outside of Hon. Edward Blake as leader of the mission. It is generally accepted, however, that W. F. King, dominion astronomer, will be the scientific expert for Canada.

A WOMAN SUSPECTED.

Thought to Have Killed Burdick of Buffalo.

Buffalo, N.Y., March 4.—After nearly one week of investigation the police department attorney's office has concentrated their attention upon one woman as the probable murderer of Edwin L. Burdick. It is likely, but not a certainty, that the woman will be arrested today. Indisputable evidence points to her as the murderer on a couch in his den when the attack which ended his life was made. There was no struggle worthy of the name of struggle, the unfortunate man having been slain in a few moments by the first blow struck. The assailant was a woman.

TOOK HIS LIFE.

He Blew the Top of His Head Off.

Stratford, Ont., March 4.—Harry E. Ballard, a member of the first and third Canadian South African contingents, took his own life, last night, blowing the top of his head off. Ballard lived with his father and mother and went home last night as usual, giving no indication of any intention to end his life. Shortly after midnight he took from his kit the rifle which he carried in South Africa, and placed it to his right temple, killed himself as stated. Ballard was a little over twenty-seven years of age.

CLASH WITH TURKS.

The Revolutionaries Escape To The Hills.

Sofia, March 4.—A collision has taken place between Macedonian revolutionaries under the famous leader, Boris Sarraf, and a body of Turkish troops near the village of Vlado-nirovo. It is reported that ten of the insurgents were killed or wounded, while the loss on the Turkish side was much greater. The revolutionaries succeeded in escaping to the hills.

SCHEDULE COMPLETED.

It Calls for Various Tariff Changes.

Toronto, March 4.—The tariff committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association has practically completed its labors, and a meeting of the members of the association has been called to meet here, on March 12th, to consider the proposed schedule. The schedule is declared, it involves important increases and reductions in the tariff.

Killed On The Line.

Toronto, March 4.—New has reached his family here, that Michael O'Connor, a section foreman on the C.P.R. west of Port Arthur, was killed on Monday. O'Connor was a son of Jeremiah O'Connor, of this city, had been a railway man for about nine years, and formerly lived in Brantford.

Murderer To Hang.

Quebec, March 4.—Mathurin, wife murderer of Montagny, was condemned this morning to be hanged on April 24th.

A GREAT SCENE

Child Chokes To Death In Sunday School

AMID PRAYERS.

Physicians Fail and Give Way to Prayer.

Swallowed a Whistle—Toy Lodged In Throat and Child Dies In Sunday School Surrounded by Her Playmates and Friends Amid Impressive Scenes.

New York, March 4.—A remarkable scene was enacted in the Sunday school hour of the Assisic Street Presbyterian church, in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn. A short time before Emma Rausch, nine years old, left home for Sunday school. On the way she bought a penny whistling ball. This she took into the classroom while inflating it, to the amusement of her mates, the wooden mouthpiece slipped into her throat. She gasped, and pain and fear showed in her eyes. The children became alarmed, and their exclamations of fright attracted the attention of Charles Follett, superintendent of the Sunday school. He called a trustee of the church and they worked to extract the toy from the throat of the fast choking child.

Not until she became unconscious was it believed that her condition was critical. Physicians were hastily summoned but could not extract the toy. When they announced that death was near, Rev. R. S. Dawson raised his hand and asked that all pray. They prayed aloud and fervently for the soul that was going before their eyes.

When they prayed, who had been sent for, ordered the organ to play about to begin his prayer. The organ was clear to them and they knelt sobbing beside their child. On the wings of the prayers of her playmates and friends the child's soul was borne away to its Maker.

Tenderly the body was carried into an adjoining room, and Dr. Dawson led the awe-stricken congregation in a devotional service in place of the regular Sunday school exercises.

EXISTS ONLY IN FANCY.

Home of Angels Is Only a Fairy Story.

New Haven, Conn., March 4.—President A. V. Dawson, of Union College, in his address to the Yale students in Battell chapel, said that Heaven, in his opinion, was a term to conjure with. Heaven, he remarked, had been painted as a land populated with angels. This, in the opinion of the speaker, was as fanciful as the stories of the fables that the children like to read, and the dream vanished with the first touch of realism. He continued:

"Christianity is inspired with idealism within certain prescribed and well-defined lines. We may wonder at the lineage of the coronation of King Edward VII., and to us in the democratic world much of it seems mockery. But what accounts for it, if it does not justify it, is the natural impulse to pay tribute to supreme greatness. It is matters not that Edward VII. is but a titular ruler, tribute is paid the power he represents. The greatest man in college might be the champion athlete, for the sovereignty of youth is not his, but the sovereignty of the campus, exalted by the admiration and homage paid to him and the battery of his fellow students realises when he gets out into the world of material struggle that he has won his kingdom, and that he may begin over again if he must be a sovereign again. The captains of industry are resisting the captains of war, and this is an advance."

SEARCHED THE HOUSE.

Mrs. Paine is Under Police Surveillance.

Buffalo, N.Y., March 4.—It was given out by the police and district attorney, at noon today, that the home of Mrs. Seth T. Paine, 572 Elmwood avenue, had been searched from top to bottom by the detectives. The photograph of Mrs. Paine, it will be remembered, was found in the room where the dead body of Burdick was found. Just what prompted the police to make the search was not made known, although it is stated Burdick left a will in which he excluded from any share in his property, the woman whom he hoped soon to be freed yet the somewhat curious fact remains that he left a considerable amount to her in life insurance. In all this insurance amounts to about \$25,000 and Mrs. Burdick will get it.

DEVLIN ACCEPTS.

Will Trust to Luck and Laurier to Keep Job.

Toronto, March 4.—A News special cable from London says: (Trans.) Devlin telegraphs me that he has accepted the unanimous nomination of the Nationalist party for Galway, and will be elected to the House of Commons. He hopes to retain his position as chief Canadian agent in Dublin, even after his election, "trusting to luck and Laurier."

Famous Brigand Captured.

Vienna, March 4.—While the inhabitants of the village of Ljosdorf, near here, were amusing themselves at a dance yesterday, a strange-looking man with unkempt hair and long beard walked into their midst and announced that he was Wolfgang, a famous robber, who had long terrorized the district. He was immediately arrested by the police.

Wingard was sentenced to death for murder as far back as 1881, the penalty being eventually commuted to life-long imprisonment. As he showed signs of insanity he was removed to an asylum, from which he escaped after stabbing two warders dangerously. In June, 1901, he was taken to the state and recaptured while breaking into a mill, but last September he again escaped, and thereafter lived "blackmail" on the countryside.

Detroit After It.

Detroit, Mich., March 4.—There is considerable talk in local yachting circles about the probability of Detroit being again represented at the trial races for the Canada cup. It is known that Designer George Wiles has made a design for a boat in this class with the object of getting a local syndicate to back his scheme. Those interested, however, want to first ascertain the exact conditions governing the selection and whether winning the trials and races would bring the cup to Detroit instead of Rochester.

Scant Meals Daily.

St. John's, Nfld., March 4.—The passengers of the two express trains, which were snowbound in the interior, are now reaching the city and relate thrilling stories of their experiences. During their detention in the snowdrifts they were reduced to two meals daily, consisting of cake, hard biscuits and a mug of tea. They had no meat for over a week. Four women on one of the trains suffered extremely.

Uniform Time.

Cape Town, March 4.—The clocks in the Orange River Colony, the Transvaal, Rhodesia, Portuguese East Africa and Cape Colony were advanced half an hour at midnight, on Saturday, thus making them correspond with the time of Natal, which is two hours ahead of Greenwich time. Henceforth there will be uniform time throughout South Africa, with the exception of German territory.

Hanged Himself In Jail.

Sandwich, Ont., March 4.—Asa Leffer, a well-to-do farmer, of Gosfield North, with a family, was placed in Sandwich jail for safety, as he showed signs of insanity. This morning at six o'clock he was let out of his cell. He immediately went to the closet and half an hour after he was found dead. He had hanged himself with a towel.

A Steamship Ashore.

Northport, N.Y., March 4.—The British steamship Breckenham, with a valuable cargo of silk, etc., consigned to New York, went ashore on Eaton's Neck, Long Island, during the fog this morning and is now leaking badly. The vessel and cargo are valued at \$1,000,000. The steamship was on her maiden trip from Calcutta.

Has Gone Ashore.

Queenstown, March 4.—The Dominion liner Merion, which went ashore on the shoals off Roche's Point, on Monday last, was floated this morning. She will go to Liverpool, where she will be placed in dry dock and undergo a thorough examination tomorrow. Her passengers arrived in Liverpool this morning.

Silva Dies In Exile.

Panama, Colombia, March 4.—Carlos Martinez Silva, an indefatigable champion of the people's rights, died yesterday of pneumonia, at Tunja, where he had been banished on account of articles which he published condemning the Colombian government's war measures.

The Houses Adjourned.

Washington, March 4.—The house was declared adjourned sine die at 12:30 by the clerk, amid the singing of patriotic songs and a general ovation to Speaker Henderson. The senate adjourned at twelve o'clock.

A bank teller of Lockport, N.Y., committed suicide by hanging himself in his barn.
