WARM CHARGES

DEVIL LURKS IN CLUBDOM DECLARER PASTOR.

Rev. George Whitman Draws an Illustration of Growing Godlessness Among Prosperous People in Sermon on Burdick Tragedy.

Buffalo, March 10.—The Burdick tragedy was referred to from the pulpit of some of the churches of the city Sunday. At the Lafayette Baptist church Rev. George Whitman delivered a sermon on "Church Life Versus Home Life."

"Recent events in our city," said Mr. Whitman, "have revealed the gay, irreligious life which many of our more prosperous people live. There is a growing godlessness among many well-to-do persons. The type of life prevalent among persons in the higher circles is often worse than in the slums of the city. This gay, Godless way of living often manifests itself in what is spoken of as club life. I admit that clubs differ in their aims, but I believe that that which is technically called club life is opposed to the interests of the individual, the church and the nation."

"In its essential purpose club life is neither social, literary nor beneficial. Out of this club life often grow evil alliances. The purpose of many may be the purest, but almost inevitably there will be a black sheep who will improve the opportunity to work mischief. A member is committed in our club and two divorce cases are revealed. These have some relation to the club life."

"America is fast following in the steps of the old Roman empire. The home is despised; children are an inconvenience; a poodle dog is of more value than a baby. Wealth and pride consume the life blood of the nation and aristocratic weakness saps our democratic vigor."

Rev. Byron Stauffer said the police

should be careful at whose door the police may be the crime and whose names they drag into it. Continuing, he said:

"This tragedy is also less due to the wickedness in all social circles. We are apt to say that the poorer classes are the wicked ones and that the richer class are good; that the cultured have all the virtue and the uncultured none. We are wrong, for at all extremes there are the good and the bad. How hurried was the march of a certain class to tear up the ground where this tragedy was announced. How wily they showed then their unwillingness to be associated with that set that had become the object of every man's revilement."

Parental Discipline in Russia.
In Russia the patriarchal spirit is still very strong. An old man called Rybalka, residing at Novosibirsk, on the Black Sea, has just beaten his son Stephen to death, "for daring to get drunk during the holidays." The son was twenty years of age, and the punishment took place in the presence of a crowd of people. No one dared interfere, "because the old man was the father and it was his will."
