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A ZONE OF FIRE MORE THAN A SCORE MET DEATH.

Human Torches Blaze—Spectators Were Watching the Burning Oil. When Explosions Took Place and They Were Caught in the Flames.

Olean, N.Y., March 10.—A score or more people were killed and a large number were injured by an explosion of oil near here last night. A freight train on the Erie made up principally of tank cars filled with oil, broke in two north of this city at about nine o'clock.

Large crowds gathered at the hospital, and the faces of the injured were anxiously scanned as they were borne into the building on stretchers. Hoarse cries were witnessed when one of the poor blistered bodies was recognized by a father or a mother, and it was with difficulty that the crowd was restrained from invading the operating rooms.

NEW ROYAL TRAIN. Cost \$300,000—Most Luxurious and Beautiful Ever Built.

The new royal train is said to have cost \$300,000. It was built by the London and Northwestern Company, and is said to be the most luxurious and beautifully appointed in the world.

There are two saloons, each measuring sixty feet in length, three saloons for the suite and two, brake vans, each fifty feet long. The whole train weighs 210 tons and is 385 feet long.

The furnishings of the various apartments are artistic in the extreme. Delicately shaded electric lamps suggest a luxurious drawing-room rather than a railway coach.
