They first appeared in eastern courts and among eastern kings and emperors as a source of diversion and amusement, and afterward were accepted by the Roman emperors, and became a prevailing fashion at the rich and the great everywhere to keep dwarfs dressed in fantastic and sometimes very costly attire, about their houses. Marc Antony had a number at his court, and the Emperor Augustus took special pains to have them brought from all parts of the world

Live Stock Market.

Montreal, March 9.—Prime beefs were less plentiful than on last week's market, and sold at from 42c. to 45c. per lb., and pretty good cattle at from 34c. to 44c.; and the common stock at from 24c. to 31c., while some of the small bulls and lean, dry cows sold down to 20c. per lb. Small calves are very plentiful, and are selling at from \$1.25 to \$3 each; good veals sold at from 86c. to \$1 each, and from 6c. to 6 1/2c. per lb. Sheep sold at from 34c. to 4c., and lambs at from 41c. to 5c. A fine spring lamb was sold for \$6. Good lots of fat hogs sold at from 42c. to 61c. per lb., weighed off the cars.

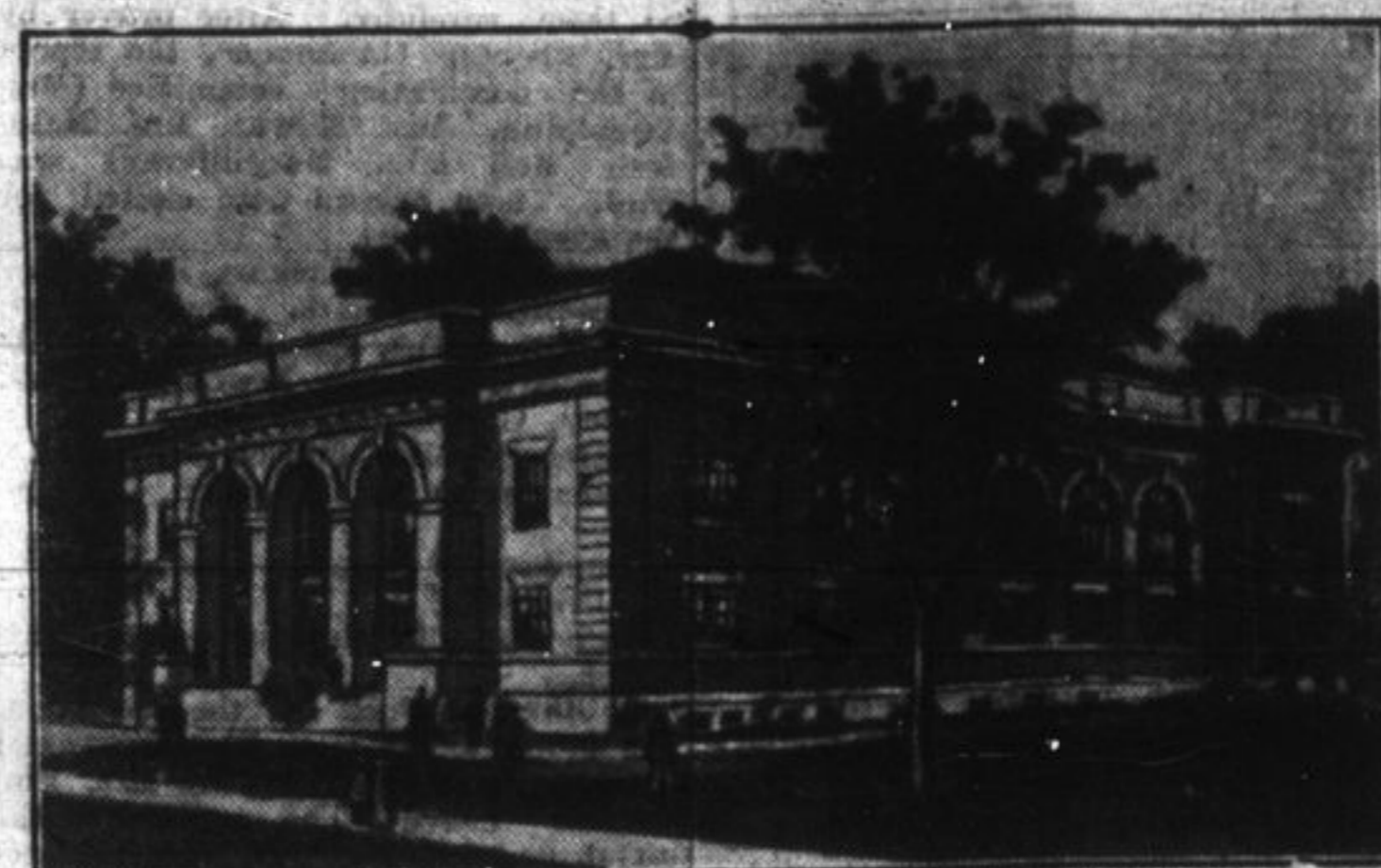
