AT LEGISLATURE

OPENING MOST BRILLIANT OF ITS CLASS. The Liberals Were Cheerful and Happy—The Election of a Speaker—Other Notes. Toronto, March 10.—The brisk elections, the recent class-balancing of party strength, with the prospect of a lively session, centred the public mind upon the opening of the Ontario house, to-day, and it was the most brilliant event of its class for years. It is said that Toronto society dearly loves an occasion for full dress, and the line, weather favored its desires, to-day. The ladies filled galleries and floor to the last inch of space, two rows of chairs being placed between members' desks, a few gentlemen, very few, invited because of official, clerical or public position, were to be seen within the charmed circle on the floor, while the ministers of the crown stood near the throne, while the members of the house, who are supposed to take part in many formal votes and proceedings, were crowded back under the galleries. Not a dozen were within view. It is the one occasion when they have no privileges and are really the rejected and despised. But there was one delightful consolation when a captivating personage graced their seats, and they were proud of the representation. Hon. G. W. Ross seemed well and in great spirits. He was fresh from a meeting with his followers, whose spirit of happiness and good feeling was clearly contagious and inspiring. Mr. Whitney stood at the head of the first row on the opposition side, alongside his desk, with Napoleonic dignity—at least the attitude recalled the historic figure. Beside him being the only members there in full view, were two stalwart representatives, returned again after lapse of one parliament, Messrs. St. John and Willoughby, who will never be found in the back ground on any occasion, and who aptly represent the present aggressive spirit of the opposition. It is said there will be parliamentary war to the knife and the knife to the hilt, with no exchanges of courtesies as to pairing and other time-honored exchanges, but so far this is mere newspaper talk, and, in too retrospective, too near recourse to savagery of debate, too futile as to results, to be credited. The inability of his honor the lieutenant-governor to be present was regretted by many more than by the old friends and admirers, no figure so historic can disappear without leaving an aching void. But the king alway lives and Chief Justice Moss encountered a bronze of his old friend, and it was announced that he would, as acting administrator open the house. He arrived promptly on time, with an escort and military suite, and the usual band stirred the air. His honor was pleased to remark through the provincial secretary that he had something to say, but could not do it with becoming dignity until a speaker could be elected. He retired to the speaker's room, to give the house full liberty of choice and action, and at once the premier moved the election of William A. Charlton, member for North Northwick, in a eulogistic speech, uncommonly well narrated. The clerk, Colonel Clarke, put the question to the house, and declared it carried, it being one of those cases where silence and absence give content. Speaker Charlton, thanked the house quite graciously and retired to robe, returning with his honor and his impressive uniformed following. Then the speaker asked for the accustomed prayers and privileges and his honor through the provincial secretary graciously granted them. Then the administration read the address, unusually long, but reflecting much useful and progressive legislation. Then the premier moved the formal resolutions for appointment of committees, for moving of the reply next day, and for adjournment, and the distinguished party of the first part left the chamber and the building with a repetition of the pomp of entry. Afterwards the guests of the day were entertained at high tea in the speaker's chambers, where Mrs. G. W. Ross, Mrs. Harcourt and Mrs. Davis received. A few hours before the liberal members had gathered there at the premier's invitation for luncheon. At the conclusion, after the toast to "The King on this his wedding day," Mr. Eganaroli, late speaker, proposed the health of Mr. Ross in a graceful and well-wordsed speech, and this brought the enthusiasm of his followers. His speech was warmly received and expressive of great gratitude for faithful and generous support, such as any leader might be proud of. The liberal members seem indeed a very happy company—the old-timers more comfortable than ever, the new comers pleased with the speedy acquaintance and good fellowship extended.

The liberalists do not show much change of position. Mr. Caldwell is brought two seats nearer the ministerial group, alongside Mr. Connes, the cabinet "right bower," as it were. Mr. Graham, of Brockville, is given that position which his rapidly rising position and usefulness dictate, a desk place alongside Hon. Mr. Letchford on the second row, flanked by Messrs. Pense and Russell, a group introduced by Mr. Eganaroli on Mr. Letchford's right, who will see that Eastern Ontario rarely suffers in the struggle. The conservative locations are little changed except that Mr. Foy skips second alongside the leader. That Boala Nesbitt should rest on the back row is but another proof of what are the best places on the floor. Among the new bills to pass before many men and women attempt to drive and motor vehicles on highways, the other to give municipalities power under certain restrictions to go into the fuel business. This bill will provide that municipal councils may take money out of current rates for the purpose of buying fuel and selling it, but if they exceed the limit of one year, they must submit a by-law to the people. SABBATH LESSON. The Sunday Study is the Riot at Ephesus. The International Sunday school lesson is found in Acts xiii, 29-40. The time is A.D. 48, and the place is Ephesus. The silversmiths of Ephesus were full of wrath against Paul because he was causing to buy their silver shrines of Diana on account of his preaching. So long as a minister is accomplishing nothing against them the followers of evil associations are not so angry, but let the serious interfere with their business and they get angry and threaten. As it was in Ephesus so it is now. The three-year-old Paul's ministry were very fruitful, but probably they were also the hardest years of his life. Paul saw in Ephesus "a great door and effectual" opened to him, but there were also "many adversaries." Paul's intensest pleasure was his desire to take generous collection for the poor to the church at Jerusalem, so showing the loyalty of the mission churches, which were rich, to the mother church, which was poor. The opposition here, which was most prolonged and bitter, was great partly because the success was great. There was a large class of men, employees and employers, who were living by the manufacture of little shrines for the worshippers at the great temple of Diana. Their business was actually falling off as a result of the increasing success of the "Evangelical War" as Christianity was called. Every convert meant the loss of a customer. Their pockets were touched and their wrath was aroused. The people took his advice seriously, and cases of drunkenness became so alarmingly frequent that the mayor yesterday ordered the police to arrest the first man found intoxicated on the streets. Several hours later the mayor himself came down the street, staggering under the influence of liquor, and the marshal promptly hauled him to the police station. In spite of his expostulation the mayor was compelled to remain in a cell all night. Now he claims he whole affair was a plot to ruin him, concocted by political enemies.

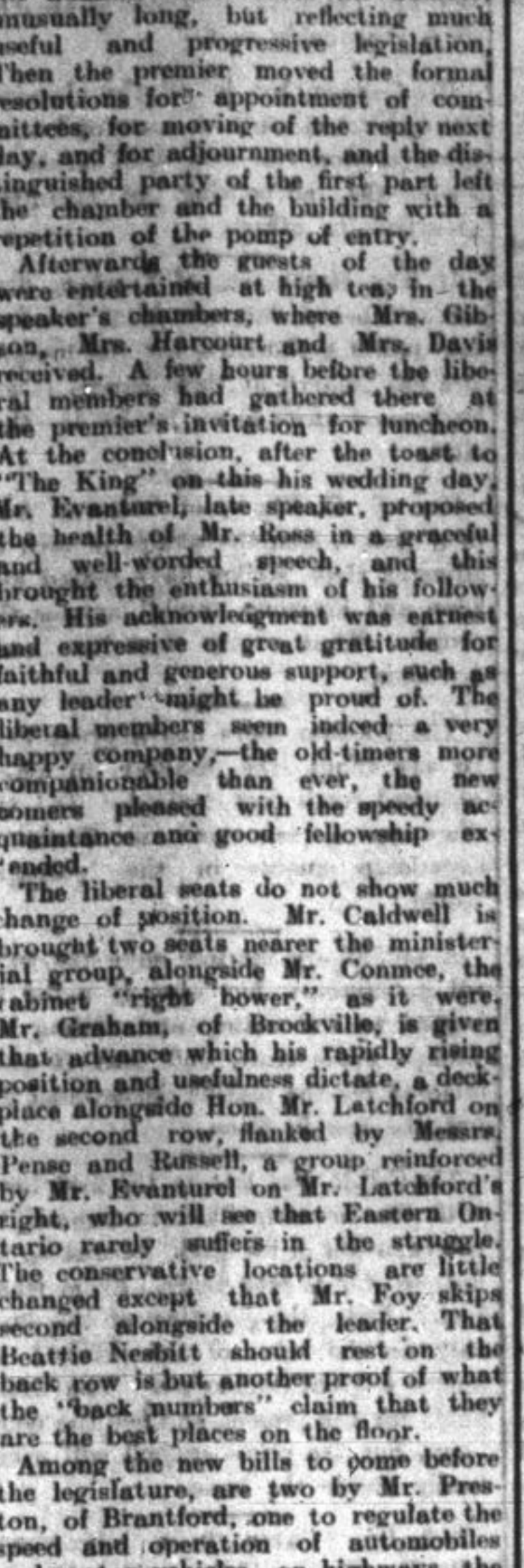

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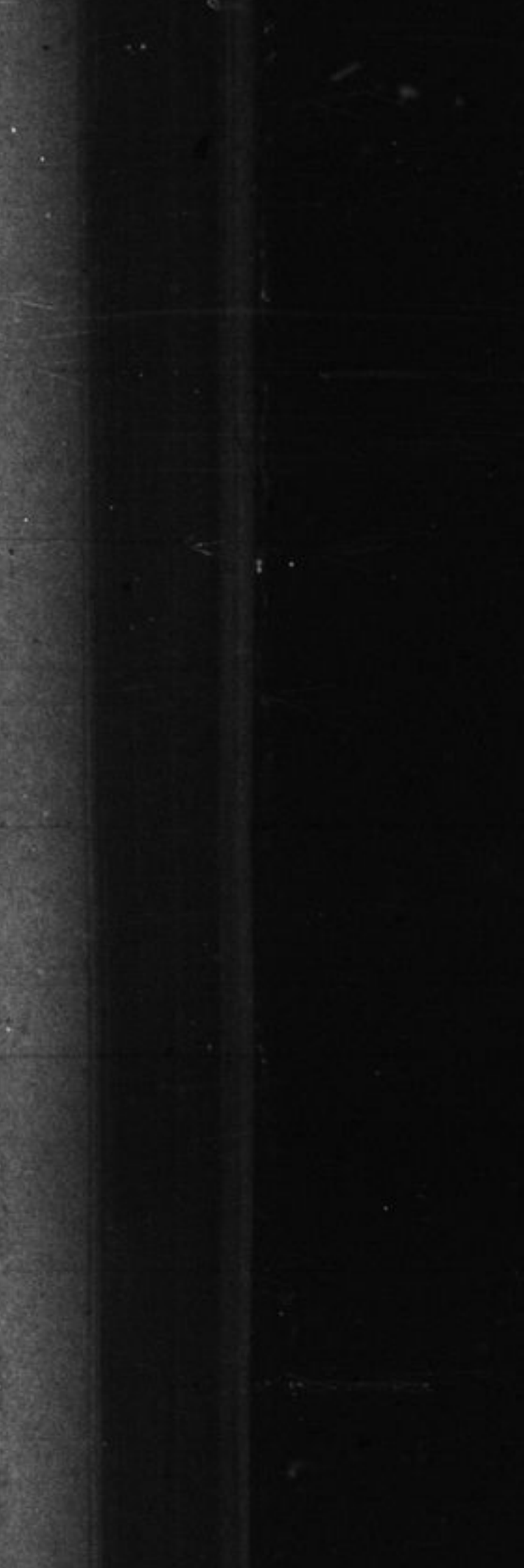
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
