AT LEGISLATURE
THE DEBATE ON THE FINE
ADDRESS.
Good Points Made Both by the
Mover and Second—Climax
of a Great Piece of Political
Acting.

Toronto, March 11.—The legislature
met for despatch of business this after-
noon and the galleries were filled in
the afternoon and the opening of the
debate on the opening of the
address. The mover was Alexander
G. Mackay, who won North Grey gal-
leries on that day of hot fighting,
which made the three cold norths
solid for liberal government. He made
a promising maiden speech, with the
fluency expected of a lawyer, and with
more practical expression than he
generally produces. While strongly in
favor of advance in restraint in
liquor selling, he advocated strongly
the retaining of parliamentary con-
trol through the government of the
day, and discharging a return to
municipal control, abandoned in the
old days because inefficient and har-
sh. He boldly declared that the hotel
keeper who gave more attention to
the bar than to the hotel as a whole
should be shamed out of business.

Valentine Stock, South Perth, the
second, won the good feeling of the
chamber by regretting that, as his
mother tongue had been German, and
English, he was not able to talk
fluently, since he had both to think
what he had to say and how to say
it. But these Canadianized foreigners
are ever a pleasing disappointment,
for Valentine was not only fluent, but
graceful and terse in speech; in which
gift those who study the language
late in life find a compensation. One
of the best points of his address was
his intelligent appeal for forestry pro-
tection, fostering and education. His
review of provincial prosperity, natu-
ral advantages, manifold govern-
mental usefulness, and of education-
al advances was decidedly able. He
publicly objected over the proposal of
the United States congress to pur-
chase Canada; the shadow of the
eagle's wings would be harmful and
ungrateful to the maple leaf, which
flourished in the bright sun of Brit-
ish connection.

The session of the day was the
immediate taking of the day by R.
R. Ganey, for the statement with
which the province has been
both surprised and excited beyond
precedent in provincial affairs. Never
did a deliberate assembly listen with
such intense interest; on both sides
and in the galleries faces were a rare
study. It was the climax of a great
piece of political acting, and brought
forth unprecedented feeling. The prompt
promise of the premier of a thorough
investigation was the bright side of
the rough drawn picture. The par-
liamentary representative has a hard
and costly road to travel, and though
a few men are conspicuous for long
service, the days of the great major-
ity are short and few in the land.
