A BIG DISCHARGE.
Liberty To Be Given To 110 Prisoners.
Toronto, March 12.—One hundred and ten prisoners will be set free from Central Prison in April, one hundred of whom will be discharged and ten let go on ticket-of-leave. It is the largest discharge of prisoners in the Central Prison's history. There are now 283 confined in the prison.
