BUDGET DEBATE

SOME OF THE POINTS MADE BY THE ALDERMEN.

Number of Liquor Licenses Should be Lowered—To Raise the License Fee for Second-Hand Goods Stores and Confine Them to a Certain District.

The city council spent over three hours in discussing the budget at last night's meeting. Every item was gone into very thoroughly and all possible information gleaned concerning it. Only two changes were made, Alderman Meek moving an amendment to the preamble, touching reference made therein to the increasing cost of maintaining the Collegiate Institute, Alderman Meek's amendment read as follows:

"That the report of the finance committee in connection with the budget, be amended by the substitution of the following for the paragraph which deals with the high and public schools.

"That the cost of secondary education be increased at a rate out of all proportion to the revenues of the city; that the amount asked from the council this year is \$806 in excess of the amount asked last year; that the council is most willing to add an amount to the secondary education to the fullest possible extent; its opportunities to do this are limited; that the financial condition of the city suggests that any increase in future be met by an increase in the fees generally; that information to this effect be sent to the representatives of the high school on the Board of Education."

The other amendment was offered by Alderman Macfarlane and McLeod, and provided for the cutting out of \$150 set apart as salary for a typewriter. It was shown that the intention was to create a new office, to which almost every alderman was opposed. The money was set apart to the credit of contingencies. With these two amendments, the budget is prepared as follows.

Alderman Hoag and Knapp told of the need of urging the tax collector to get in all the taxes as early as possible, so as not to allow so much unpaid taxes to be carried over from year to year. Alderman King replied that there was not a set time specified for the collector to return his rolls, and he thought a set date should be fixed. Alderman Knapp said there would always be trouble until a date was named.

As a means of providing revenue, Alderman Meek suggested that the amount charged for the rental of the city hall; at least \$300 or \$300 could be raised that way. Alderman Macfarlane replied that the property committee had such a scheme under consideration, but that by-law. It was intended not to make rebates in future.

Alderman Sears considered that the committee had estimated the income from the markets too high at \$1,500. The present income is \$20,000, but he understood, was losing money. Alderman Meek replied that the finance committee considered the markets to be worth \$1,500.

Alderman Behan considered the present license fee, \$20, charged by hand dealers, too low. The license fee should be higher. The existence of these stores in any community was an incentive to crime. They should be under rigorous police inspection, and the attention of the police commissioners should be drawn to these points at once. Mayor Bell promised to carry out Alderman Behan's suggestions. Alderman Bell considered that the city was well protected under the present system of governing these stores. Alderman Reeves favored removing the second-hand stores from Princess street and confining them to a certain district. At Mayor Bell's suggestion, he promised to submit a by-law along these lines.

ASSAULT MADE.

ON PARIS PLAYERS IN A TORONTO RINK.

T. Toronto, How Thon Hast Falls on - Large Rinks in Ontario Are Developing Speedier Players.

The Toronto papers took great delight in branding Kingston over the assault upon Brown, of Belleville hockey team, by a spectator. Of course the like would never occur in Toronto, that city of righteousness. Yet, this item appears in yesterday's Toronto Globe relative to the Marlboro-Paris hockey match at the Mutual street rink.

LOOKING FOR A SITE.

Shoe Firm Desires of Locating in Kingston.

At last night's meeting of the city council Alderman Sears presented a communication which Archie Abernethy had received from P. C. Folwell, representing the E. D. Moloney company, one of the largest shoe and shoe manufacturing firms of Rochester, N.Y. The letter, in part, was as follows:

"I have been doing Ohio and Indiana for the first and have, I think, persuaded them to start a branch in Canada, and B. E. Moloney spent all last week here with me, prospecting for a place to establish a factory, and we have received a good deal of encouragement from three Ontario gentlemen, and he has gone home again to Rochester, and I expect him to return in a couple of days, when we expect to have well-defined offers from at least two of them. My object in writing you is to ask how Kingston would like to have a locate there."

"If you think the city would be willing to bid us, and to what extent, let us know. We are going to make the first line of fine shoes wear, the same as the firm makes in Rochester, and we will be able to give them to the trade at United States prices, laid down. This firm will install a plant worth about \$15,000, and guarantee to employ not less than fifty hands from the start, with a pay roll of not less than \$1,600 a month. We hope to increase this showing right up to our object is to get as large a business as possible. We would require a suitable building for a factory and a cash bonus."
