Accused of Fraud.
London, March 20.—John Henry Nicholson, who when he was arrested on charges of fraud, proved by the Berlin authorities, and by a Philadelphia and a physician in New York, was arraigned in the Bow street court, yesterday afternoon, and committed pending an investigation of the case. It is stated that Nicholson had had a long career as a quack doctor on the continent. HE WILL HANG

For The Murder Of Three Women.
USED POISON.

A WARNING ISSUED BY THE JUDGE.
Against the Cremation of Bodies
—It This Had Been Done The Crime Could Never Have Been Fastened on the Criminal.
London, March 20.—George Chapman, a Southwark saloon keeper, charged with the murder of three women, yesterday, convicted and sentenced to death. In the course of his trial, Justice Grant Hamm commented on the fact that if cremation had been the law of the land, it would have been impossible to bring the charges home to Chapman, as nothing would have remained of his victims to show that they had been poisoned. He hoped that the people who favored cremation would take this as a warning.

Chapman, charged with having poisoned a young woman, who lived with him as his wife, was arrested about three months ago. An autopsy showed that the woman had been poisoned. The bodies of Chapman's first and second wives, who had died within a few years were also examined and were also found to contain poison. A fourth woman, a Pole, claimed Chapman as her husband, and said his name was Klesowski. Chapman at first claimed that he was an American citizen, but failed to produce proof.

PITH OF THE NEWS.
The Very Latest News Called From All Over The World.

John Douglas, Grand Trunk engineer, was fatally injured at London. The war minister of Austria has forbidden all officers to join the anti-doubling league.

In the German Reichstag the chance which sells the triple alliance would be renewed.

Last year according to British returns Canada got 3,815 Scottish settlers, while 7,072 went to South Africa.

It is officially announced in London that the Allan line has secured the Atlantic mail contract for another year.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy says the C.P.R. has temporarily abandoned the idea of a Canada-Glasgow steamship service.

The Allan line steamer Siberian, from Glasgow, for St. John's, Halifax, and Philadelphia, arrived at Halifax today.

The legislature will adjourn on Friday evening until Monday. The debate on the commission will extend over next week, probably.

A student at the University of Berlin and the latest double column New York bankers has offered to assume Venezuela's debt to the powers on certain conditions.

An hotel-keeper at Peterboro on Wednesday was fined \$50 and costs for selling liquor to an Indian. The total amount was \$75.

GOVERNOR-GENERALSHIP.

No Action as to Lord Minto's Successor.



LORD MINTO.
London, March 20.—A high official of the colonial office informs me that there has been no communication yet relating to Lord Minto, about his resignation, and that his excellency may stay another year in Canada. The colonial secretary, Mr. Chamberlain, has absolute power to choose his successor, but no name has yet been considered.

Going To Toronto.
Ottawa, March 20.—It is understood that Lord and Lady Minto, with their staff and household, contemplate making a visit to Toronto and remaining there for a month or more. They will occupy the residence of J. W. Flavelle, who has placed his hands in the air of the break-up of the cabinet on the request of the premier of Ontario, as, owing to the session, accommodation in the parliament buildings was not obtainable. Their excellencies leave here the latter part of April and will be in Toronto for the military tournament and horse show about May 1st and will remain for the races.

TORONTO LOVE ROMANCE.
Young Student Almost Marries His Own Sister.

Toronto, March 20.—One of New York's "yellow" journals devoted a whole page of its last Sunday edition to the Toronto romance, a heart-rending theme of two young lovers who discovered on the eve of their marriage that they are brother and sister. The artist was as busy as a bee in the remaining reporter, and the story is written around double column pictures of a girl of surpassing beauty in evening attire and a smart looking student with hair parted in the center and the latest thing from the tailor's that flares like a fly-catcher's waist. Arthur D. Trevelyan is the young man's name, and Violet Belward the girl's. It is one of those queer, pathetic stories of intense human interest, over which women are supposed to sob. The drawing shows the Trinity Cathedral, where the lovers were to have been married, the university in the distance and the weeping lover, who are supposed to have just been made aware of their blood relations. The public is regaled with all the details of how Miss Belward, "whose father is a high official of the Canadian government" became a prime favorite of the Government. Her love letters, Sir Oliver Mowat's residence and other aristocratic homes. No details are lacking to give the story an air of romance and tragedy. Not happened in fact, the writer has woven a pretty love story around the people he found in Toronto. Aside from the fact that Arthur Trevelyan and Violet Belward were never heard of in Toronto, nor by the people in whose circle they are alleged to have moved, the story is substantially correct.

TAKE ACTION.
To Secure The Pay Coming To Them.

Winnipeg, March 20.—A summons has been served on William Whyte, assistant to the C.P.R. president, by one of the U. B. E. strikers for refusal to pay wages on the company pay day which was last Monday. This action is taken to test whether the amounts due to the strikers can be legally claimed.

Three Years' Hard Labor.
New York, March 20.—Byron W. Winters, formerly superintendent of the customs bureau in the general post-office, who last week pleaded guilty to the charge of embezzling government funds, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment at hard labor.

Mr. Black's Bequests.
Halifax, N.S., March 20.—Among the bequests left by the late Samuel Black, whose will has just been probated here, is \$100 to the Methodist Church of Canada, and Mount Allison College, Sackville, N.B., \$500.

DISSEMINATIONS

Reported In The British Cabinet.
OVER LAND BILL

MR. CHAMBERLAIN IS IN OPPOSITION.
A Government Crisis is Not Very Far Off—Panic is Experienced Over The Late Bye-Election in Rye—A Commercial Treaty.

New York, March 20.—The Tribune's London cable says: There are persistent and apparently well grounded rumors of cabinet dissensions over the Irish land bill. It is asserted that Mr. Chamberlain is opposed to making large treasury grants to bridge the balance between the landlords' selling price and what the tenants think they can afford to pay. If these rumors are true in the reports, which have come to me from Irish landlords, a government crisis cannot be long delayed. Premier Balfour could hardly hope to carry the land bill, even with the help of the solid nationalist vote, if Mr. Chamberlain were unwilling to identify himself with the measure, nor could Mr. Wyndham expect to satisfy either the landlords or John Redmond's followers if Mr. Chamberlain were insisting upon cutting down the grant. It is probable that the rumors now in the air of the break-up of the cabinet reflect the feeling of panic among supporters of the government caused by the bye-election.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post says that the United States commercial treaty has been handed to the Chinese commissioners. It stipulates for the opening, as twenty-ports of Mukden and Takuan, in the Yangtze river, for the purpose of safeguarding commercial interests in Manchuria and for the abolition of Liking and all native customs stations excepting those on the frontier. It provides also that the ex-cise on imports shall be ten per cent, that no further taxes shall be imposed, the export maximum being seven and one-half; that there shall be no interference with the Chinese tax on Chinese goods, that no duties shall be imposed on salt and opium, on betting, on the sale of commodities, and that the valuable double team of horses and the waggon, so that the value of the aggregate will amount to a considerable sum. Stockholm, March 20.—After long negotiations the Swedish-Norwegian fishermen's union controversy has been settled. It is stated that the governments of the two countries have decided to establish separate consular systems without alternating the existing arrangement of one minister of foreign affairs for both.

Complete Map of The Yukon.
Dawson, Yukon, March 20.—William Thibodeaux, the territorial engineer, has just finished the only true and complete map of the Yukon territory, which has been in preparation for some months. To those who think they know the geography of the territory this map will be something of a revelation.

Scandalous Scenes.
Paris, March 20.—The celebration of the M-Carone or mid-Lent, late in Paris, yesterday, developed last night into an orgie in some parts of the city and scandalous scenes were enacted. It is stated that 963 persons in all were arrested.

He Took His Life.
Philadelphia, March 20.—Joseph L. Barter, a colored boy, twelve years old, deliberately committed suicide this morning to escape a beating at the hands of his father.

DEBATING AGAINST TIME.

Opposition Threaten to Use up All Next Week.

Toronto, March 20.—Interest has waxed in the long debate in the legislature on the motion to refer the Gandy charges to a commission. The galleries yesterday were not so crowded, and the speeches, while far from uninteresting, lacked the zest which accompanied an attack on a new subject. The indications point to a discussion lasting well into next week, if not to the end, by which time the opposition, who are doing most of the talking, will have exhausted both their speakers and their ammunition. Yesterday Henry Carscallen presented the conservative arguments, in a speech of an hour's duration. Sam. Marks followed, giving the first real touch of humor which have lightened this otherwise weighty discussion. The last speaker of the day was W. J. Hanna, of whom the conservative expect so much, and who did not conclude his speech.

There will be no night session of the legislature this evening. W. J. Hanna, Lambert, will conclude his speech this afternoon. He may be followed by J. F. Gross, Beattie Nesbitt and A. G. McKay, but if Mr. Hanna speaks for long, Mackay will move the adjournment until Monday.

WILL NOT GO.
Lord Dundonald Is to Stay in Canada.

Ottawa, March 20.—Lord Dundonald denied a rumor, cabled from England, that he intended resigning his post as G.O.C. in Canada. He said the rumor evidently arose from the fact that he was asked to give evidence before the war commission and replied that he could not go for some time yet.

Toronto will get a grant of \$50,000 from the Dominion government for the proposed Dominion exhibition this year. A deputation of Torontonians called on members of the government at one o'clock and in reply the premier as good as promised the money. He said the request would be taken under favorable consideration.
