COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Market News. The Stanley Piano Company, limited, has assigned to H. H. Hall, Peterboro.

Queen's College Change. The passage of Queen's college from under the direct control of the Presbyterian church is foreshadowed in a notice now formally given that during the present session of parliament application will be made to amend the charter of the college and the statutes relating thereto.

BRYCE'S REPORT FINDS THE WATER NOT WHOLLY PURE.

Recommends That Chemical Filtration be Placed in Position—Sewage is Bound to Affect Supply of Drinking Water Under Present Conditions.

A special meeting of the Board of Health was summoned for ten o'clock this morning to consider the report of Dr. Bryce, provincial medical health officer, upon the condition of Kingston's supply of drinking water, as revealed by the analyses made by government experts in Toronto.

"You will notice that the analysis of March 3rd are, in albumenoid and free ammonia and in chlorine, on the whole, lower than those of the other samples in the samples taken along the course of the pipes and comparatively those as well at the points to the westward.

"(1) That the lake waters of so high a natural purity as those of Lake Ontario, the amount of dilution of the sewage poured in is so great as to make anything but a chemical analysis of the water of a lake in Chicago harbor with the enormous quantities of sewage going at that time into the lake, did not show in albumenoid and free ammonia any higher prevalences, speaking generally, than these samples, and yet the typhoid deaths in Chicago were in 1880 to 1884, only 568, 462, 361 and 354 respectively, (1885 not available), and such a ratio continued until Chicago drainage canal diverted the main sewage of the city into the Illinois river. For instance Chicago water in January, 1886, has the following analysis:

"(2) That this is true, may further be shown in the fact that while the samples of March 3rd show chemically but little use in arriving at definite conclusions.

"(3) That, under the conditions then prevailing, the sewage was shown by bacillus coli, though diluted so as not to be chemically shown, must become disturbed widely through the waters of the bay, even out 4,000 feet.

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"(5) Until the pipe is carried west and out beyond the influence of bay water, the analyses would seem to show that the water at the present intake is generally of the same quality, chemically, as that out 4,000 feet; but the same analysis of water three and a half miles south-west is distinctly superior, both in free and albumenoid ammonia, though the same in chlorine, to the other samples taken on the same day.

"(6) It would appear that until the city is prepared to extend its pipe 'in the direct course of the lake, epidemic outbreaks of typhoid, especially in winter, will continue to recur, if bay water in the raw condition continues to be used.

"(7) I would suggest that in view of all the facts, the local board of health would recommend for the consideration of the council and water commission, as probably one of the most inexpensive means of dealing with the matter, the installation of such a system of mechanical filters as have been doing effective work at Chatham and St. Thomas, in Ontario.

The detailed report of the government analysts and bacteriologists, covering a large sheet of closely-written figures, was sent to Dr. Goodwin of Queen's, to have him reduce it from mathematics to ordinary readable English. It showed, chemically, that not more than seven per cent. of chlorine in a million parts was found in any of the samples tested. This is a fairly good showing and is less than double the normal percentage of
