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WANTED A DUKE WAS WILLING TO PAY \$125,000 FOR SAME.

She Drew the Line at Barons—Sir William Macgregor Gets a Bride, However—A Swell Matrimonial Agency. London, March 21.—The story of Sir William Gordon Macgregor's rescue from the Westham workhouse by a woman, who, it was said, was an American, intended to marry him, has already been cabled. Apparently he will secure a wife, but she is not an American. The story of the afflicted baronet's misfortunes has incidentally brought to light a remarkable agency, which, however, is not unparalleled. When it became known that a real, live baronet was immured in a workhouse, this agency communicated with him and arranged for an interview with the head of the firm, who is an energetic society woman. She visited Sir William and told him of an American client, who was willing to pay \$125,000 for the privilege of marrying a titled Englishman. After some correspondence a legal agreement was drawn up, in which the agent undertook to provide the baronet with a good-looking, mild-tempered, bride of loving disposition, aged twenty-five years. The first instalment of the dowry was to be \$25,000, and on the wedding day Sir William agreed to pay the agent \$15,000, of which \$10,000 was allotted to the titled woman who had introduced the American. The bargain, however, was not ratified, because the American refused to part with her money for anything less than a duke.

They Tear Them Off When Preacher Calls Them Trivialous. Wabash, Ind., March 24.—A sensational scene was enacted at the Wesleyan Methodist church in the north-western part of the city, where meetings have been held nearly all winter. The Rev. John Brown, the pastor, is set immovably against all amusement, and was warning the large congregation present to beware of the follies of earth, saying that "no woman who wore plumes on her hat could ever hope to enter the Kingdom of heaven." There were not many women in the audience, thus deked out, but straightaway after the minister gave the admonition four occupying seats well up in the front, and with the accented adornments waving jauntily, walked to the front of the church, tore the plumes from their hats, threw them into the stove, and then returned to their seats and resumed their close attention to the discourse. They were later commended by the minister for the sacrifice.

LOOKED MUCH LIKE AN OLD GREEK.

"Everyman" which was presented in Montreal at the Academy of Music last week, was particularly interesting to people of literary tastes, and especially to those who are familiar with old plays. It was written in the fifteenth century, presumably by a Dutch monk, and is very similar in style to old English plays of that period preserved in the British museum. In the simplicity of its conception it forcibly reminds one of the old Greek drama, the gruesome representation of death, which is frequently a feature of old Greek plays, also appearing in "Everyman." With regard to costume and scenic effect the original production has been closely followed in the play, which adds to its educational value, but in the department from the all-man cast, we feel the management has not made a mistake. Miss Mathison admirably sustains the difficult and trying part of "Everyman" throughout the play, her expressive face and sympathetic quality of voice rendering her particularly acceptable in the role. The play opens with the entrance of "Death" (a grim, terrifying figure), who appears in answer to the voice of God. "Everyman" (representing mankind), who next enters, soon encounters "Death." "Death" informs him that he must yield up his life, and in spite of his protestations, will only make the concession that he may have a companion on the dread journey to the other world, if he can find some one who will consent to accompany him. "Good-fellowship" (representing friendship), cheerful, goodhearted, and low, now appears on the scene, and seems deeply touched at "Everyman's" distress. He vows eternal friendship and promises to support him in every undertaking he may have, but when he learns what is required of him and that there is no returning from the long journey upon which "Everyman" must set out, he declines to accompany him and departs in spite of "Everyman's" tears and entreaties. "Kinsmen," "Worldly Goods" and "Good Works" are in turn introduced on the stage, and utterly fail. "Everyman" except "Good Works" (as a Sister of Charity), who would find him bear him company, but she is in such a weak and feeble condition that she finds it impossible to do so in his extremity. "Everyman" turns to religion and "Confession" (a monk) presents him with a scourge and monk's habit, as the symbols of penance and humility. "Everyman" at first resists from these, but after a brief, though severe struggle, meekly accepts them. Then, as the end draws near, "Beauty," "Strength," "Discretion" and "The Five Senses" (who are four female forms have grouped themselves about "Everyman") leave him, causing him a last pang. "Knowledge" (which is also represented), too, departs. "Good Works," who has now grown strong and vigorous, alone supports him and accompanies him to the tomb. The play is unique among dramatic representations on the stage to-day, and those who have had the pleasure of seeing it will feel that they would have missed a good deal if they had not availed themselves of the opportunity of doing so.
