BURNED DOWN. A TORONTO OPERA HOUSE WENT UP IN SMOKE.

The King of Detectives' Company Lost All of Their Effects—Defective Insulation Was the Cause.

Toronto, Ont., March 25.—The Toronto Opera House, owned by C. and L. Perini, Detroit, was completely destroyed by fire this morning, and the "King of Detectives" company lost all they had, including much of their personal effects. The caretaker, George Champion, with his wife and three children and his assistant, had narrow escapes.

NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by the Public.

The New York state senate passed the thousand ton barge canal bill which goes to the assembly to-day. Hon. Clifford Sifton and those who will assist him in preparing the Alaska boundary case have sailed from New York for London.

The Illinois appellate court held that a man sent to prison for the murder of his wife is judicially dead and the insurance on the victim is payable to the children.

It is stated that Hon. Mr. Tarte will be offered a position on the transportation commission of which Sir William Van Horne will be head. It is not known whether he will accept it or not.

The Norwegian steamer Argyle, bound from Glasgow for Sydney, N. S., has been posted as missing. She is now two months and twelve days out. She is a small steamer of 990 tons register.

A deputation of farmers has interviewed Mr. Fielding in Ottawa, and protested against any increase in the tariff. The claim was made that further increases would increase the farmers' burdens which are now heavy enough.

The liberal council of Manitoba closed on Tuesday night at Winnipeg. An important feature was the unanimous adoption of a platform which will be published later. The leadership of Thomas Greenway was heartily endorsed.

The Crown Corundum company has obtained a judgment against George A. Sanborn, a Buffalo broker, for \$1,000 balance due on a lot sold to him in Melbourn township. If this is not paid within a month the property will be sold.

Factories To Co-operate.

Glenvale, March 23.—A number from here attended the sale of farm stock and implements of John Cairnes, Elginburg, on Thursday, March 19th, and report good prices being realized.

Mrs. Robert Gibson, an old and respected resident, passed away on Thursday, aged eighty-two years. Rev. Mr. Milligan conducted the funeral service on Saturday afternoon.

A meeting of the patrons of Glenvale cheese factory was held on Friday evening for the purpose of seeing whether the patrons were "willing" to go into the syndicate for the appointment of an extra inspector to visit the factories every two weeks.

Was Charged For Taxes.

Mrs. Filson, Alberst Island, mother of Sergt. Filson, killed in South Africa, this morning received a bill for \$5.70 for taxes on her dead son's land claim in Widdiefield township, New Ontario. She thinks that she is unjustly taxed and holds that the land should revert to her free of taxes, as though her dead son had actually staked the claim.

It looks like placing a premium on misfortune. The land was located by Rev. Mr. Cumberland at Mrs. Filson's request, and the account was forwarded by the clerk of the township of Widdiefield.

Looking For A New Park.

An effort is being made to secure from the Dominion government, the land lying between the customs house and post-office, fronting Clarence street, for a public park, at a small rental. If successful, the wall between the present garden and St. George's cathedral will be razed and the whole turned into a free park.

Look Out For Snow.

A citizen who has, with much success, prognosticated the weather throughout the past winter, stated this morning that ere many days "slipped" past the city would be visited by a snowstorm that would be so heavy as to tie up the street railway system, and would remain with us for at least three days.

Canadians In Demand.

R. Graham, of Graham Bros., owners of the famous Cairnbrooke stock farm, at Claremont, says "Canadian horses are in great demand. Shipments to the States and the Northwest from our stables have been large. Clydesdales, which we breed principally, are in the greatest demand and bring big prices."

The Reserve Not Reached.

The estate of Chester Follet, first, was offered for sale this morning by Auctioneer Mills. The attendance was large, but though the bidding was spirited, the reserve bid was not reached, so the sale was withdrawn. It is understood that the highest bid received was only \$1,400, while the reserve bid was \$2,000.

Want The Street Opened.

An agitation has been revived for the opening of Sydenham street, between Brock and Princess streets, for which the fire in McGowan's factory is responsible. It is likely that the city council will be asked to have the board of works report upon the scheme.
