Settlement Arranged. Windsor, Ont., April 3.—The case instituted by Wineman Bros., owners of the steamer J. F. Card, against the Gilmour Co., of Cleveland, for damages sustained in a collision with the steamer in Lake Huron, two sea miles ago, was tried yesterday by Judge Hodgins of the admiralty court. When the evidence had all been taken the judge awarded an amicable settlement in favor of the Gilmour people consented to pay the plaintiffs \$1,200. This was accepted and the suit was withdrawn. Each litigant will pay his own costs.

ARE ACTIVE.

Without Any Flourish or Trumpets. TEN ENGAGED IN WORKING UP THE CANADIAN CASE.

Will Be a Thorough Investigation of the Records of the Foreign Office Bearing on the Anglo-Russian Treaty of 1825. London, April 3.—The Canadian staff has quietly settled down to work without any flourish of trumpets. Minister Sifton and assistant secretary state, Joseph Pope, were closely occupied, yesterday, with preliminary consultations, in which their counsel and the officials of the foreign office took part. Their secretary, A. P. Collier, informed me that a strong staff of ten men would be engaged for the next three months in working up the Canadian case for presentation to the Alaskan commission.

USE EARTH CURRENTS.

Without Wires—Tests Made at Alexandra Palace. London, April 3.—The apparatus for the transmission and reception of signals and speech through the ground without wires, was tested yesterday at Alexandra Palace, the inventors, J. T. Armstrong, a Devonshire electrician, and Axel Oring, a young Swedish electrical engineer trained in the United States being present, with Sir Gerald Smith and other experts. The experiments were conducted modestly, and without pretence that a perfected system of installation had been worked out, but the practicability of dispensing with wires and masts, and using the earth currents of electricity for commercial, military and naval purposes, was illustrated.

SIGN AN AGREEMENT.

Of Disinterestedness Before Assent to Reform Scheme. London, April 3.—A number of English members of the House of Commons and others interested in the preservation of the independence of the minor Balkan states, had an interview with the Marquis of Lansdowne, secretary for foreign affairs yesterday. They suggested to him that before England's assent to further action, any individual power on the lines of the Austro-Russian reform scheme for Macedonia is given, all the signatory powers to the Berlin congress be invited to sign a protocol of disinterestedness, binding them not to seek fresh territory in the Balkan peninsula. The Marquis of Lansdowne promised to take the matter under consideration.

WANT TO GO TO LOUISIANA.

France's Religious Refugees May Be Received in South. New Orleans, La., April 3.—Bishop Roux, who is in charge of the archdiocese of New Orleans during the absence of Archbishop Chapelle, says he is flooded with applications from the religious refugees of France, who are desirous of establishing themselves in Louisiana. Some of the convents may be able to receive a number of the refugee sisters.

Easter Flowers in Vaintry.

New York, April 7.—A visit to the large and fashionable florists' establishments in Fifth avenue would show that Easter flowers this year are of unlimited supply as well as luxuriant variety, though the prices are not such as to tempt the person of average means to make large purchases. The Lily continues the typical Easter flower and it is hard to estimate even roughly the great number of these beautiful blossoms that will be sold in the metropolis during the next two days. The most of the Easter lilies are imported from Bermuda where lily-growing for the American market is one of the chief industries of the inhabitants.

Holiday in Mexico.

City of Mexico, April 2.—Today, which is second only to May 5th, in the calendar of Mexican holidays, was celebrated generally throughout the republic. It is the thirty-sixth anniversary of the triumph of Mexican arms at the close of the revolt against Maximilian in 1867. Business was generally suspended, banks and business houses being closed for the day.

Armstrong's First Hanging.

Kittanning, Pa., April 2.—The execution of Frank Dudas, which takes place here to-day, is notable from the fact that it is the first hanging in the history of Armstrong county. Dudas' crime was the murder of an Italian fellow-countryman at Yatesboro fifteen months ago.

CORRUPTION IN ELECTIONS.

Mr. Charlton's Bill to Stop the Practices. Ottawa, April 2.—The debate upon the second reading of Mr. Charlton's bill to amend the Dominion elections act, 1900, this afternoon was animatedly and ably handled.

MAKE APPEAL.

British Government To Go To Country. THE PROPOSALS THAT THEY WILL MAKE TO PEOPLE. A Legislative Council to Be Convened in Dublin and the Various Matters to Be Put Under Their Control. London, April 3.—The Dublin correspondent of the Chronicle says he learns on the authority of a member of the government that parliament will be dissolved at the end of the present session and that a general election will be held in the autumn. The government will appeal to the country on a proposal to amend the Dominion elections act, 1900, and several other matters.

BUTTER TRADE OF BRITAIN.

Bill Being Considered of Interest to Canada. London, April 3.—The government's bill dealing with the sale of adulterated butter now before the British commons is of direct interest to Canada. Merchants say the report that the government of Australia will benefit inasmuch as they send dry butters, which can be largely used for adding moisture, as permitted. Under the provisions of the new bill, Irish butter will suffer as it always contains a high percentage of moisture in its natural state. Thousands of tons of Siberian butter are expected this summer in competition with Canadian varieties.

TO MEET IN OTTAWA.

The Joint High Commission to Get To Work. Ottawa, April 3.—There is said to be a reasonable certainty that the joint high commission will meet at Ottawa. Senator Fairbanks is quite anxious for the commission to be held at Ottawa.

Speaks To Wisconsin Legislators.

Madison, Wis., April 3.—The visit of President Roosevelt made this an eventful day for Wisconsin's state capital. The presidential special arrived on scheduled time from Chicago this morning. The distinguished guest was met by officials of the state and escorted to the state capitol building. Thousands of men, women and children, including many visitors from the surrounding country, thronged the sidewalks leading to the capitol building.

Mysterious Fires.

Arnprior, Ont., April 3.—Shortly after one o'clock this morning a fire, that might have proved disastrous to the town, started in the stables of William Colford. Higher it was quickly checked, however, by three streams from the hydrants before much damage was done. The origin of the fire is unknown. Yesterday a small building started in flames owned by John L. Whyte, Madawaska. It was extinguished before any headway was made. This blaze is also unaccountable.

Accused Of Theft.

Guelph, Ont., April 3.—Louis Marsh, special constable of East St. Louis, Ill., has left for home with "Dick" Watson, arrested here and committed for extradition to the state of Illinois upon a charge of larceny. Watson, it is alleged, made away two years ago, with \$1,800 belonging to the Campbell and Head Western Sales Stable Co., East St. Louis, for which he was a buyer of horses and mules.

Indians Need Churches.

London, April 3.—According to the Morning Leader, the Bishop of Keewatin, who has recently visited the contribution of £5,000 sterling, says that seventy-five per cent of the Indians hold family worship regularly. The Indians walk, sometimes twenty-five miles to church. The bishop states that he had baptized scores of babies brought over 150 miles over the snow on their mother's backs.

Accused Of Abduction.

Clayton, N.Y., April 3.—Joseph Karl Emmett is charged with abduction and has been held for the grand jury. Emmett is a youth of eighteen years of age and was charged by the Seaman with the abduction of his fourteen-year-old daughter. Bail was granted in \$1,000.

GERMANS ARE MAD.

Because Ambassador is Civil to the President. Berlin, April 3.—The Morgen Post, a popular organ, with a great circulation, in a leading article this morning, attacks the German minister to the United States, Baron Speck von Sternberg, for having accompanied President Roosevelt to the railway station at Washington. "Baron Sternberg's servility to the president of the United States makes German ridiculous before all the world." The paper says the Taegliche Rundschau, an influential national liberal organ, also has an article this morning protesting against the action of Baron von Sternberg.

TO SAVE INVESTIGATION.

Recommended Suicide and Left Note For Coroner. Rochester, N.Y., April 3.—The body of Frederick L. Stebbins was discovered in a dense clump of evergreens in Genesee Valley Park by two boys yesterday, with a bullet hole through his head. There was a revolver near by, as well as the following note, dated Thursday, March 27: "To the coroner: To save you investigation I wish to state that I was not killed and murdered for money. I did it with my little revolver." The handwriting tallies with some found in his home, and no doubt exists that it is a case of suicide.

A GREAT STORM.

Out Of Chicago From The Outside World. Chicago, April 3.—This city was almost entirely cut off from communication from the outside world this morning, when a northeast gale and heavy fall of wet snow caused telegraph wires to go down in all directions. The temperature was slightly below the freezing point. Lake vessels have been warned not to venture out.

TO SIR JAMES GRANT.

Jubilee of Entry Into Medicine To Be Celebrated. Ottawa, April 3.—A banquet will be tendered to Sir James Grant, K.C.M.G., by the members of the medical profession in Ottawa, on the occasion of his completing his fifty-first year in the practice of medicine. Elaborate preparations are being made for the event, as this is a unique incident in the life of any medical practitioner.

ON FIRST MAY.

De Forest Wireless System Will Begin Operations. Buffalo, N.Y., April 3.—P. Robinson announced, to-day, that he had arranged stations for the De Forest wireless telegraph system at different points along the great lakes, and the company will begin operations on May 1st.

Goes To Halifax College.

Halifax, N.S., April 3.—Rev. James Crookery, B.D., son of the late Professor Crookery, of Magee College, Derry, has been chosen as professor of pastoral theology in the Presbyterian College, Halifax, in succession to Principal Gordon, of Queen's University. Mr. Crookery was ordained five years ago in the congregation of Mountjoy. It is understood that he will accept the appointment.

Stock For The West.

Toronto, April 3.—At to-day's police court George Chambers got eight months in the Central prison for house-breaking. L. W. Fairley, secretary of the British Columbia Stock Association, is in this province purchasing twelve car loads of stock to take west for various purchasers.
