THE WAY CLEAR FOR KINGSTON TO ENTER A TEAM.

In the Eastern International Base-
ball League—the \$1,900 will
be Secured—Sporting Notes.

Already about \$900 has been sub-
mitted to place the Ponies in a foot-
ing in the new Eastern International
Baseball League, and by tomorrow the
\$1,900 will, no doubt, be reached. It
has been figured that the expenses of
the Ponies in making the round trip
to Montreal, Rutland, Burlington and
St. Albans would be \$275, or \$300 at
the most. On that tour, twelve
matches would be played, and the
lowest amount the Ponies could receive
would be \$900, or \$50 a match. Be-
cause thirty per cent. of the gate
revenue is attributed to over \$500, the
Ponies would receive the surplus. Then
the trip to Malone and Plattsburgh in
New York state would be \$150, and
six matches in those places would
more than pay the salaries.

the citizens. Kingston's summer sport
