A MEMBER READY TO MEET HIS ACCUSERS.

An Episode in The Prince Edward Island Legislature—Denise Ho Is Paid Agent of Packing Company.

Halifax, April 4.—There was great excitement in the Prince Edward Island legislature, yesterday, when Hon. J. F. Wheat, after reading extracts from the Guardian, of that and the previous day, which he alleged charged him with being a paid agent of the Dominion Packing company, moved for the appointment of a committee, with power to administer oaths and send for persons and papers to investigate said charges. After some debate, on motion of Premier Peters, Hon. Mr. Rogers and Messrs. Simpson and Head, of the ministerial party, and Messrs. Morrison and McLean, of the opposition, were appointed. The committee will meet next week.

THE CAUSE FOR IT. A Satisfactory Quid Pro Quo Not Provided.

Rev. Eber Crumney has had no advice yet whether he was transferred to the Hamilton Methodist conference. The papers do not mention the transfer, however. Mr. Crumney says he made application for transfer, and he knows nothing beyond that; he also understood Mr. Hamilton made application to be transferred from Hamilton to Montreal conference, thus maintaining the harmony in the two conferences. "I made my application," said Mr. Crumney, "and that is all I know about it. I may not have fulfilled all the requirements of the church in the matter, but I did all I knew." It was suggested that equal valents were not thought satisfactory, i.e., that the salary of the man entering Hamilton conference would be greater than that of the man leaving to go to the Hamilton conference did not consider the exchange a satisfactory quid pro quo, but this could not surely be the case, for instances are numerous when exchanges have been made, and the discrepancy in salary were five times greater than in the present case.

The Morrisburg Herald refers to the dispatch from Ottawa, announcing that Mrs. Daniel Earl, wife of a Canadian preacher, is in the federal jail there charged with elopement with a Holiness preacher, F. He formerly was stationed at Oxford Mills, Delta, and other places, and is a highly esteemed gentleman, and clergyman. He is one of the well-known Earl family of Winchester. A number of years ago he married a lady from the rear of this county."

It is reported that the Russian consul at Mitrovitza, European Turkey, who was shot in the back by an Albanian entry there, is dead.

The civil service accommodations at Ottawa have formed a society, with J. Fraser, of the finance department, as president, and C. Duncan Scott, as secretary.

King Edward and King Carlos, visited Cintra, the summer residence of the Queen Dowager in Portugal, on Friday. There were enthusiastic demonstrations all along the route.

Advisers from Sofia say the Bulgarian government is taking active measures against the Macedonian band, and has seized a large quantity of their arms, which were hidden in Sofia.

The Royal Canadian Humane Association has decided to grant a bronze medal to Fireman Lassewski, Montreal, for saving the life from a burning building of Constable Forget, when the latter was in a state of insensibility.

Italy will make a notable naval display at Algiers, when President Loubet visits that port. The squadron will be another large gathering of warships on the occasion of King Edward's visit.

Rev. William Tweedie, a retired Methodist clergyman, died at Hampton, N.S., on Friday, at the age of eighty-three. Prof. Tweedie, of Mount Allison, is a son of the deceased and Hon. L. J. Tweedie, premier of New Brunswick, is a nephew.

J. F. Johnston, brother of the bride, assisted the groom. The ceremony, conducted by Rev. J. Treardon, was held in the drawing room, which was prettily decorated with pink and white. The bride was accompanied by her father, and the groom by his father-in-law, both dressed in white. The bride wore a white tulle dress, trimmed with chifon medallions, and pearls, and carrying a bouquet of white carnations. The bridesmaid wore white organdie, with chifon and trimmings, and also carried pink carnations. After the ceremony the guests repaired to the dining-room, where the wedding supper was served to about sixty guests.
