New York, April 9.—A special from London to the Tribune, says: Premier Balfour's last speech in parliament, before the Easter recess, was an important pronouncement on foreign affairs, and was very glowing in regard to the Balkan situation, which he said, never had been the cause of grave anxiety than was now the case.

THE LEGAL POINT WILL BE FOUGHT OUT. The Lloyds Company Contends That It Is Not Liable For The Loss—When Work Was To Be Completed.

TO BE CONSIDERED. Electoral Corruption and Reform of Election Law. Ottawa, April 9.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier announced in the commons, yesterday, that a committee of the house will be appointed after Easter to inquire into the whole question of electoral corruption and the reform of the election law.

NEED BRITISH OFFICER To Help Reform Macedonian Troops Under New Scheme. London, April 9.—Replying to questions in the House of Commons yesterday, Viscount Cranborne, secretary for foreign affairs, said Sir Nicholas O'Connor, the British ambassador at Constantinople had been urged to send a British officer to the Balkans to see to the reform of the Macedonian gendarmie under the Austro-Russian scheme. The British government, added Cranborne, was acting in cordial co-operation with Austria and Russia. The government was now considering whether as a guarantee against excessive severity, a British officer should not accompany any Turkish troops sent to repress disorders.

NO NEWS FROM BALKANS. New York, April 9.—The Sun's London cable says: Perhaps the most significant facts in connection with the Balkan situation is that there has been no news of cardinal importance regarding it for some days. Reports of conflicts between Turkish troops and insurgents in Macedonia grow new to new in the alleged success of the sultan's pacificatory efforts. The Albanians are practically on the newly happening there. However, reports show that the military party at Constantinople is greatly excited, and is clamoring for war with Bulgaria. It is stated that the minister of war has assured the sultan that the army is ready, and that although the powers would prevent Turkey from acquiring territory in the event of victory, which would be certain, the result of crushing Bulgaria would be the assurance of peace in the empire for years to come.

IS CRITICALLY ILL. Vienna, April 9.—The report that M. St. Chamberin, the Russian consul at Mitrovitsa, recently shot by an Albanian, is in a critical condition from the effect of his wounds, is apparently confirmed. An unfounded report is current that he is dead.

IS A DISPUTE.

About Insurance On Str. Montreal. Montreal, April 9.—A legal point which will now have to be decided is definitely known whether the underwriters of the Lloyds company or the Bertram Shipbuilding company will have to stand a financial loss of the steamer Montreal was announced here this afternoon. It was stated that in conferring with John Bertram, the representative of the Lloyds company will point to the fact that the insurance was put forward on the condition that the building contract for the steamer had to be completed in 1902. This the Bertram company did not do, and therefore the insurance companies could not be held for any damage done in 1903. It was further claimed that a policy of marine insurance cannot legally be issued to cover a longer period than twelve months, and the last policy was to run till the contract expired at the end of 1902. The insurance in the Lloyds companies was £25,000, at the rate of 6s. 8d. per cent.

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REDMOND SPOKE ON BILL.

Should Be Welcomed In Spite Of Great Defects. London, April 9.—John Redmond, the Irish leader, made an important speech at Dublin last night in which he welcomed the Irish land bill, in spite of its great defects, as the first measure proposed by an English minister having the avowed object of carrying into effect the policy of Parnell, and the land league. He considered that Ireland ought to be prepared to give Mr. Wyndham's attempt to deal with the question, a fair trial.

DELAYED BY STORMS. Car Was Tightly Wedged In By Snow. Winnipeg, April 9.—Snow storms are delaying C.P.R. traffic. Dr. Hieman today received a car load of horses, which he had purchased in the east and the animals were eight days on the road between London and Winnipeg. At Schieber the car was sidetracked and it was not long before it was snowed in so tightly that it could not be hauled out without the assistance of a snow plow, and a delay of sixteen hours occurred at that point.

MEASURE RE-ENACTED. Insisting Upon An Educational Test. Victoria, B.C., April 9.—The British Columbia legislature yesterday re-enacted the anti-oriental immigration legislation framed on the lines of the Natal act and providing an educational test to be passed by Chinese and Japanese desiring admittance to the province. This act was in force last year and was disallowed by the federal government for imperial reasons.

Accused Of Crime. Whitenough, Man., April 9.—T. H. Corbett, in a mining river trading company, has been charged before the magistrate with inducing several Poles to sign notes for amounts between \$125 and \$150, with the pretence of getting them home and then giving the notes to the bank for collection. The case was enlarged for a week.

Volunteers Convicted. Toronto, April 9.—Andrew Bell and Peter Drummond, two members of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, were convicted in the police court, today, of stealing \$45 regimental money, from Sergt. Maj. Skinner. Bell, who had served in South Africa, was sentenced to six months in jail, and Drummond to three months.
