Telegrams and Cullings Which Tell of What is Transpiring in All Parts of the Earth.

The ice is causing much trouble in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Miss Alice Roosevelt will visit Maine and Canada during the summer.

The cost of repairing the battleship Iowa, damaged by an explosion, will be \$700,000.

Henry Bloomhead lost his life in an explosion of gas.

Flurries of snow occurred in various parts of England yesterday.

A young man, thought to be James Mackenzie, was found in High Park, Toronto, dying of carbolic acid poisoning.

Robert Lithgow, injured in a runaway at Foxboro, in which Miss Anne Johnston was killed, died of his injuries.

Alfred Weldon, of Fulton, N. Y., committed suicide with morphine. He returned from a visit to Canada on Saturday last.

According to a judgment by Recorder Blair, Montreal city cannot assume the expense of erection for the purpose of taxation.

The Toronto Board of Trade council has passed resolutions for submission to the congress of chambers of commerce to be held in Montreal.

While tunnelling a mountain in Idaho, a vein of rich gold-bearing ore was exposed.

Mrs. Clarence Bishop, of Port Jervis, N. Y., aged seventeen, a bride of a few weeks, drowned herself because her husband spoke slightly of her new Easter hat.

Mrs. Mary Roll, of Minneapolis, is dead at the age of 102 years. She went there from Dayton, Ohio, and was the first white woman born in that city.

Prof. Pickering, Harvard's famous astronomer, made observations during the recent eclipse, which struck the eye of the moon.

A shock of earthquake was experienced along the coast of Labrador on Monday. The inhabitants were greatly alarmed. Fishermen report a heavy tidal wave at the same time.

A Lake Shore & Michigan Southern grain elevator at Chicago, containing 50,000 bushels of grain, owned by Churchill & Co., was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$200,000; insured.

Some 1,500 railway men who are among the strikers in Holland have been replaced by outsiders, and a large number of the gas and metal employees find themselves in a like fix.

Eight Rev. George Montgomery, coadjutor archbishop of San Francisco, recently appointed archbishop of Manila by the Pope, has refused the position. He prefers to stay in San Francisco.

The Washington, Rome, N.Y., one of the best appointed theatres in Central New York, owned by Wallace G. Gilmore, of Oswego, was destroyed by fire early to-day. Loss, \$125,000.

A landslide occurred at the east end of the Aspen tunnel, Evanston, Wyo., burying the Union Pacific track 300 feet deep for a distance of 200 feet, and causing a bad caving in at the end of the tunnel.

There were 12,000 strikers on parade at Lowell, Mass., Monday, as a demonstration against the cotton combine. There were nearly 3,000 young women in line. The parade was over a mile in length.

James Chalk, of Utica, N.Y., a brakeman, was killed near Water-town, while uncoupling an airbrake. He was dragged under the car for nearly a mile before he was discovered. His arms and legs were torn off.
