HE WILL STAY ON HIS ROYAL YACHT.

He Will Not be Seen at Naples—The Seriousness of His Illness is Not Known—Not Likely to See the Big Review at Rome. Rome, April 21.—News has reached here that King Edward is prostrated as a result of the fatigue incident to his long trip. His majesty has been ordered to take a four days' rest aboard his yacht at Naples, before coming to Rome.

Changing Parishes. At the annual vestry meeting of St. John's church, Weston, the rector, Rev. C. H. Rich, stated in the course of his address that he had arranged with the approval of the bishop, to exchange parishes with the Rev. I. H. Jones, of Holy Trinity church, Streetsville, which arrangement will take effect on Sunday, 30th. The statement came as a surprise to those present, and there was considerable regret expressed at the departure of Mr. Rich from Weston, as during his incumbency of eight years the church has been greatly improved and the parish placed on a comparatively firm basis.

Injured By Jumping. Cornwall, April 21.—Herbert McMillan, aged fifteen years, brother of "Reddy" McMillan, the well-known hockey player, was seriously injured Sunday evening at the Grand Trunk depot. The boy jumped off a flat car, and in doing so his head struck a rock, fracturing the skull. He was taken to the Cornwall General hospital, where he lies in a precarious condition.

To Call Special Meeting. The building committee appointed by the General Hospital governors to consider the question of isolation cottages for contagious diseases held a meeting last night, when the report of the medical staff of the hospital was considered. As this report is opposed to the Nicksle wing being turned into a nurses' home, it was decided to call a special meeting of the governors for Friday when the matter will be again discussed.

The Measurements Made. All the measurements of the streets to be paved have been made, and everything is in readiness for the final action of the city council on Monday night when various kinds of pavement will be considered. The bituminous substance will likely be chosen. Little opposition from property owners is anticipated.

Canal Bank Caved In. Ogdensburg, N.Y., April 21.—When the water was let out of the Canadian section of the St. Lawrence canal, Saturday, to make repairs before the opening of navigation, 250 feet of heavy rip-rap on the bank slid into the canal. The water was returned to the canal to prevent a further threatened cave in.

Rabbits Were Stolen. Boys are suspected of stealing a number of valuable rabbits from the yard of A. J. Lee, Cataract street. The bunnies disappeared a few days ago. Mr. Lee has the names of about eight boys whom he suspects, and has placed the matter in the hands of the police.

Has Been Sentenced. New York, April 21.—Justice Scott, to-day, sentenced Albert J. Adams to not less than one year and not more than one year and nine months in Sing Sing and to pay a fine of \$1,000 for having his outfit for playing policy in his possession.

A Kingston penitentiary convict whose "tip" recently led to two keepers being caught carrying letters into the prison, is to be punished, so it is said.

A NEW SCALE OF WAGES FOR GRAND TRUNK TRACK MEN.

Action Against Travellers Insurance Company—No Trouble From Striking Longshoremen No Trans-Atlantic Lines Yet.

Montreal, April 21.—John F. Wilson, president of the Maintenance and Ways union in the city conferring with the officials of the Grand Trunk railway regarding a new scale of wages. Mr. Wilson states that the trackmen have asked for a small increase in wages, but he does not anticipate any difficulty in reaching an agreeable settlement.

CHURCH BADLY SCORCHED.

Historic Land Mark Has Narrow Escape.

Brookville, Ont., April 20.—The Blue Church (Methodist), situated on the front road, between Brookville and Prescott, and one of the most interesting historic points in Eastern Ontario, narrowly escaped destruction by fire yesterday. The exterior was badly scorched, as the result of some parties smoking or kindling a small fire close to the building. The first church was erected on the site fully 100 years ago, and the present building is also very old. In the cemetery which surrounds it are interred the remains of Barbara Hoek, who with her husband were the founders of Methodism in Canada. They came to the township of Augusta in 1783. Barbara died in 1804.
