'TELLS OF TERRIBLE CRIME. Accused of Killing Sixteen-Year-Old Boy. St. Thomas, Ont., April 23.—Charles King, twenty years of age, who on September 9th, 1902, shot and killed sixteen-year-old Willie Freeman, has been found guilty of manslaughter, with a recommendation to mercy.

The function marked the golden jubilee of Sir James' entry upon his chosen profession of medicine, and forty-nine years of practice therein in the now city of Ottawa.

A NEW CURE. Inhalation of Vapor Kills the Bacilli. Berlin, April 23.—What is claimed by its inventor, Robert Schneider, a druggist of Berlin, as an entirely new remedial treatment for consumption is attracting attention. It consists of the inhalation of a vapor produced by heating a mixture of eucalyptus oil, salubrom and chloroform, and it is stated that it is more effective than any serum or other remedy hitherto tried. Prof. Sommerfeld, a physician of repute, experimented in several hospitals for six months with the result that 60 out of 100 patients treated were completely cured. The inhalation of the vapor kills the bacilli.

WILL STRIKE. Do Not Think They Are Paid Enough. Berlin, April 23.—The medical periodicals announce that physicians throughout Germany, who are employed by sick fund societies, will strike on July 1st. These physicians complain of the insufficiency of their fees which under the invalid's insurance law are only twenty-pennies, about four cents, for each visit. The medical profession is overworked, and a great majority of practitioners are obliged to accept contracts from sick fund societies, the revenue of which is provided by compulsory contributions from employers and employees.

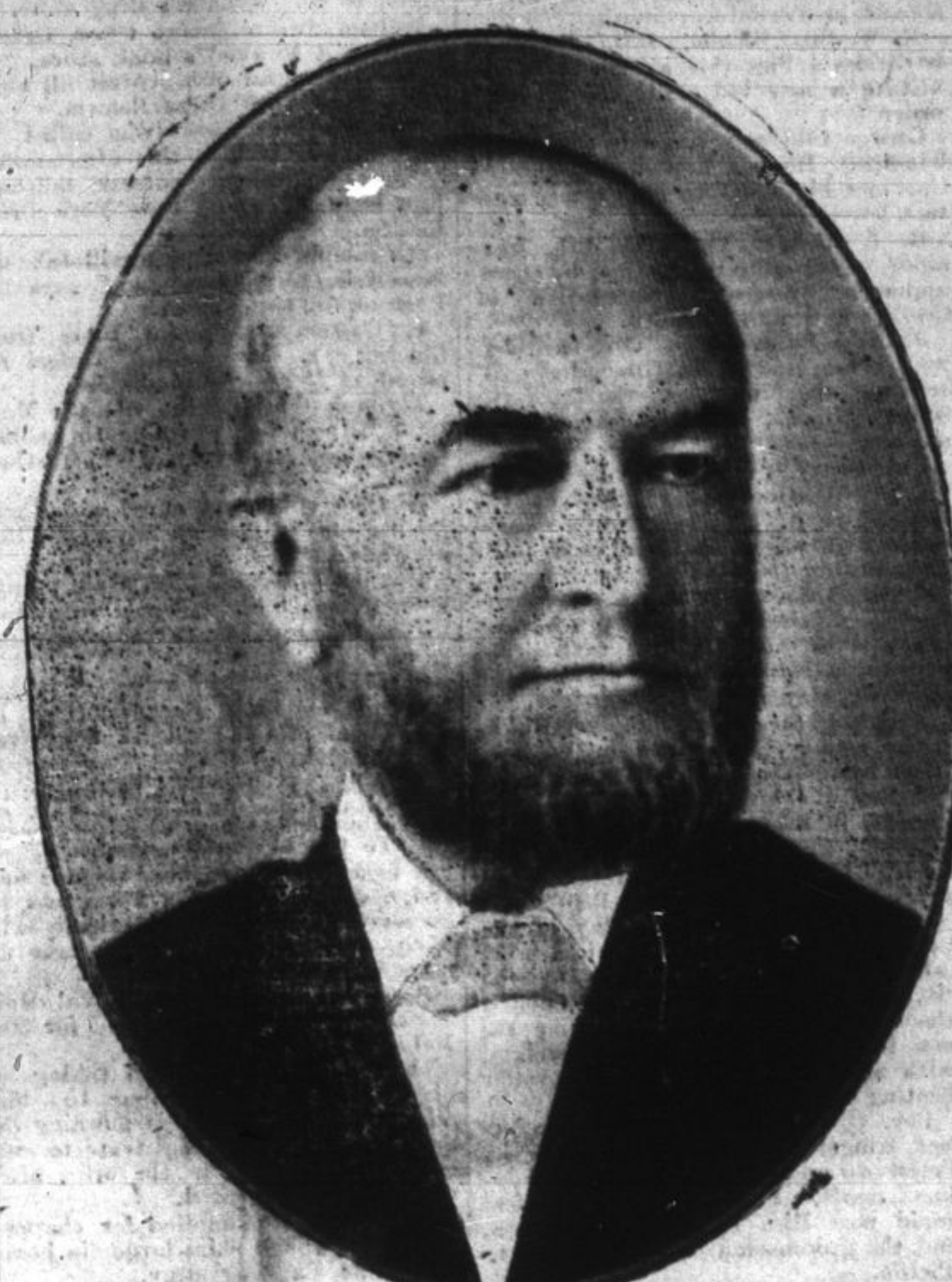
Between Germany and Canada is Feared.

BAD OUTLOOK

FOR AGRICULTURE AND GENERAL TRADE.

An Extraordinary Outburst By John Burns In The Imperial House—A Very Warm Figure of Speech Was Made Use of.

London, April 23.—The German sugar trade is already greatly alarmed at the prospects of a German-Canadian tariff war and a Danzig sugar importing firm writes to the Berlin papers that agriculture in Eastern Russia, as well as the German sugar industry and trade, will suffer heavily. The discussion in the House of Commons, yesterday, on the question of railway reform, led to an extraordinary outburst from John Burns, the Liberal member for Battersea, Mr. Balfour, president of the board of trade, said that in the matter of railway accidents England was better off than America. Burns at once rose and electrified the house by the phrase "industrially America is hell with the lid off." \$100,000; NO THANKS. Former Missionary's Gift To Church Not Appreciated.

Chicago, April 23.—The Swedish Evangelical church has accepted a gift of \$100,000 from a former missionary and refuses even to thank the giver. The church believes it is entitled to at least \$600,000.

Peter H. Anderson, a missionary who was sent to a mission near Cape Nome, is the giver. Six years ago Rev. John Hulberg was stationed at the mission.

Two Eskimauz showed him a rich gold deposit and he staked claims out in the name of the church and was later in the talk of a secret agreement that binds this country hand and foot to Germany and commits it to an unknown vista of humiliations, embezzlements and perils.

Anderson learned that one of the Eskimauz was dead. He found the other, located a gold mine and cleaned up \$600,000, which he recently brought back to the States.

He asserts that the claims were other than those staked out by Hulberg. He gave the church \$100,000 of the money.

ONLY ONE PLANT ABL. Board of Arbitration Renders Report on Strike.

Boston, April 23.—The textile corporations in Lowell involved in the present strike of 17,000 operatives, with a single exception, cannot afford to pay their help the ten per cent. increase in wages of the state board of arbitration and conciliation. This opinion is contained in a report of the board to Governor Bates, summarizing up its recent inquiry into the textile situation in Lowell, and is corroborated by a statement from the state statistician, based on the figures of an accountant employed by the board to make an examination of the financial condition of the seven mills in question.

HE WAS CRUCIFIED. The Treatment Given to a Chinese Desperado.

Victoria, B.C., April 23.—Advices were received by the steamship Empress of China, of the crucifixion, in Kwang Tung, of a Chinese desperado who confessed to sixty murders. This murderer, Man Ling Jin, was decapitated by Sunnath Heien, by a man whose father he had murdered and when he confessed to many crimes, it was decided that decapitation was too lenient a punishment and he was nailed by his hands and feet to a wooden cross and placed on one of the city bridges as a warning to malefactors. He lingered for three days, when he succumbed to his terrible sufferings. After death the body was decapitated.

Head Of The Commission. London, April 23.—The appointment of the Prince of Wales as president of the royal commission, which is to represent Great Britain at the St. Louis exposition will be made at the special request of King Edward, who thought he could thus best demonstrate his personal interests in the exhibition and his cordiality toward the United States generally. John Redmond was invited to be one of the two Irish members of the commission, but his many engagements necessitated a declination.

A BOGUS DOCTOR.

Want Honey To Set Before The Queen.

Toronto, April 23.—For a branch of the medical art a man calling himself Dr. James was lured \$50 and costs by the police magistrate this morning. James rented the office of Dr. Badgerow, who was on a trip to the Old Country, representing himself as a graduate of Trinity University and a licentiate of the Ontario Medical College and took over Dr. Badgerow's practice. It was discovered that he had no license to practice as a physician in Ontario, and proceedings were taken against him. James was not in court when sentence was imposed and a warrant will be issued against him. An invitation has been received at the department of agriculture from the secretary of the Great West International exhibition for an Ontario exhibit of honey. Exhibits are desired from the king and queen will visit the exhibition.

KING AT NAPLES.

Is Looking Well, But Needs Rest. Naples, April 23.—King Edward on board the royal yacht, arrived off here at 3:30 this morning. He was greeted by a salute of 101 guns by Italy's Mediterranean squadron which was present in full to greet his majesty. Three hundred thousand people gathered about the harbor to view the arrival. The authorities who boarded the royal yacht to greet the king say his majesty looks well, but is badly in need of rest. The king expressed a desire that there should be no naval review adding "the elements are against it, but the enthusiasm of the people make up for it."

GENEROUS OFFER.

English (Congregationalists) To Help Canadian Brethren. Montreal, April 23.—A generous offer has been made by the Congregational church of England and Wales, to the Congregational church of Canada, which was announced last night at the meeting of the Quebec association in Guy street church. The indebtedness of the Canadian church is at present \$200,000, and the British church offers to pay ten per cent. of all that their Canadian brethren raise on this debt. The offer will be accepted, and steps taken to take advantage of it.

Trying To Starve Herself.

Newark, N.J., April 23.—Miss H. Hildebrandt is trying to starve herself to death in the county jail in this city. She is the trained nurse formerly of the Orange Hospital, who is serving a six months' sentence for shooting Bernard J. McAlton last July because he had deserted her. Her nurse was sentenced last Thursday.

Had Narrow Escapes.

Chicago, April 23.—A fire which nearly destroyed a flat building at 287 3/4th street, at two o'clock this morning, menaced the lives of a score of tenants, and several persons narrowly escaped death. Several were carried out by firemen and police. Among these are Mrs. J. T. Stiles, who was badly burned.

Street Car Men On Strike.

Toronto, April 23.—The motormen and conductors, employed by the suburban railway corporation, went on strike this morning and as a result not a car is moving. The men were receiving \$35 and asked \$40 a month, which was refused. About fifteen men are employed.

A Magnificent Reward.

Washington, April 23.—Fifteen cents was the reward a prominent business man of Washington gave to a bell boy for finding of two endorsed notes aggregating \$10,000. The notes were lost in a local hotel.

A Year In Jail.

St. Thomas, Ont., April 23.—Justice Street, this morning, sentenced Charles King, convicted yesterday of manslaughter, to one year in the common jail.
