NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by the Public.

President Roosevelt has resumed his southern tour. Dr. Beattie Nesbitt says he proposes to stick by Mr. Gagey. The Hamburg American liner, Assyrian, with 1,100 immigrants has arrived.

Robbers went through a Burlington, Vt., train and relieved sleeping immigrants of \$1,000. Lord Lyveden's parliamentary party will visit Toronto exhibition during their tour of Canada.

Queen Alexandra, on a visit to her father in Copenhagen, arrived in London, Friday evening. Four miners were killed by the explosion of gas in the French slope at the Reserve mine, Glasco Bay, N.S.

Hon. Mr. Tarte was present at the annual banquet of the Galt Board of Trade on Friday night, and replied to the toast of "Canada." Right Hon. Robert William Hanbury, president of the board of agriculture in the British cabinet, is ill of influenza and pneumonia.

Sir Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer is ill at his home, at Brookwood, of malaria. The crisis has passed and he is convalescing. It is announced that the Canadian Northern railway will build another great railway at Port Arthur this summer, with a capacity of 3,500,000.

The union bakers of Hamilton, Ont., have decided to enforce their demand for all day work instead of night work, beginning the first of June. It is rumored that a hitch has occurred in the negotiations in connection with the visit of King Edward to the Vatican. Nothing has yet been definitely settled.

The United States war department declines to grant a court of enquiry to investigate the conduct of Gen. Funston in the Philippines. His action is endorsed. George Murdoch was killed by a dynamite explosion at the Elizabeth mine near Fort William, Ont., on Friday.

The shaft house at the west end of Silver Mountain mine was burned. The steamer Indiananah of the Portland and Asiatic line called at Victoria, B.C., on Friday, and landed a large contingent of Chinese, who are hurrying into Canada, because of the proposed increase in the head tax.

Adolphine Kok appeared before the law tribunal at Rotterdam, on Friday, with her husband, and passed the necessary examinations. She is the first woman ever admitted to the practice of law by the Dutch bar.

Lawrence Dorey, trainman on N. Y. & C. railroad, dreamed last week of a lovely blond and twisted, and last night the train he was on struck and killed a man near Brockport, whom Dorey identified as his brother Frank.

It is reported in Belgrade that M. J. Stuchoff, the Russian consul at Ulanok, also fulfilling the duties of the late M. Stecherina, the Russian consul at Mitrovica, has been attacked and wounded by Albanians. M. Stecherina was shot by an Albanian soldier of the name B. Usinin, who is now under sentence of death.

Justice Kellogg, Ogdensburg, N.Y., held valid a bond issued by the Aetna Indemnity company to Henry W. Wawker, saloon keeper, although had been issued by clerk instead of the agent. The company refused payment on the ground that the bond had been issued by a clerk, in the absence of the agent, and that, although it had been accepted by the county treasurer, it had not been made valid by the agent's signature until after the violation of the law had occurred.

Civic Finance Committee. At a meeting last night of the civic finance committee the application of A. J. Small, for a reduction of the license fee on the Grand Opera House, and asking that the former license system be revived, was held over for further consideration.

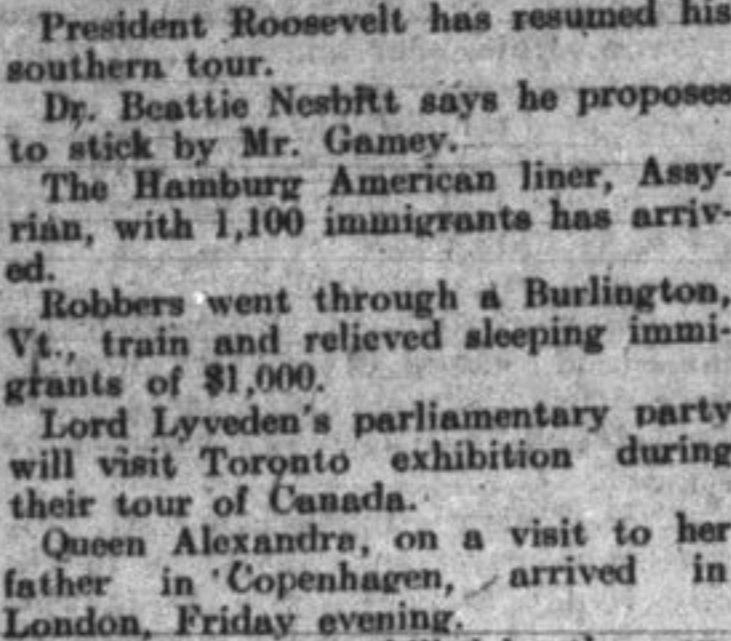
