**THIS SOCIETY AT BOTTOM OF RECENT MURDERS.**

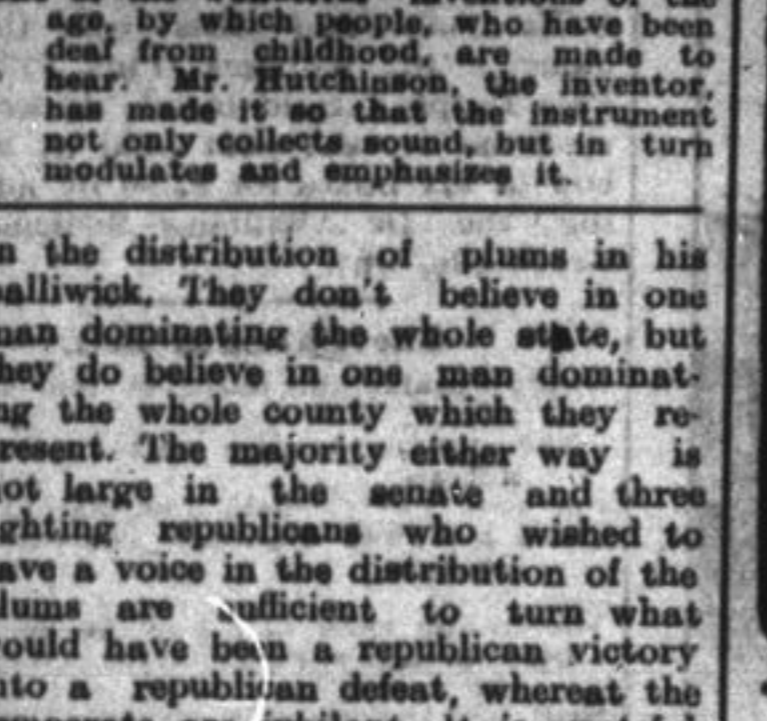
Is New York Honeycombed By The Secret Association Society?—Roosevelt Has Seen Big Game—Political News.

New York, April 25.—A question of fearful import is now submitted to the people of this land. Are we to have an organization of the Mafia, as it is known in Italy, not only in the present, but the past? Of the origin of the Mafia we know little or nothing. We have no reason to believe it existed during the Roman dominion. It may not be very complimentary, but certainly it is almost coeval with Christianity. There is no part of Italy in which this mysterious association has not always existed, its cornerstone being laid in secret assassination. There is little doubt that we are now sheltering in the United States some of the most notorious banditti that Italy has ever known. The emigration from that land to the United States has been very large and not always desirable. They differ in many respects from any other class by which we are blessed or cursed. A few years ago an Italian suspected woman in court and several boys and girls were found to be armed with some kind of a weapon, most of them being knives, made out of old files, not pretty to look at, but very effective in a row. It is only a few days ago that a number of Italian had characters were arrested in the city of New Orleans. If perjury were necessary to secure them freedom it may always be had in any amount. The procuring of evidence against Italian criminals has always been difficult, for in a number of cases the witnesses against these Italians have suddenly disappeared, no one seems to know how or where. They were blotted out from the human calendar and the places that knew them once shall know them no more forever.

**SPORTY BOSTON.**

**Many Events Taking Place At The "Hub."**

Boston, April 25.—Old Sol has again made his appearance and by the indications he intends staying some time. The flowers have survived the attacks of the adversary "Jack Frost" and are now showing their brilliant faces with victorious dignity. The red and white tulips are becoming quite conspicuous in their beds which for so long have been green, but delayed in making their appearance by the cold dark days. The department of parks and streets have put the sprinkling carts to work to keep down the dust which seems to think it is its duty to take light on these warm and windy days.

Sunday the 19th of April was Patriots Day, but it was celebrated on Monday. It is in honor of the battle of Lexington, but is celebrated generally throughout the state of Massachusetts. It was fine and bright and large numbers took advantage of the weather as well as the open cars, which for the first time have been run to any extent this season.

The principal amusements were different kinds of athletic sports, such as baseball, foot races, etc. The greatest event was the great Marathon race in which fifty-six competitors took part, of whom only thirty-six finished. The starting point was Ashland, Mass., and the course of twenty-five miles, and the course of the bride and groom terminated at the Boston athletic grounds, Boston. The first in was J. C. A small powered steam car captured the prize, making the distance of one-fifth of a mile in seven seconds, first trial, and in two-fifths seconds less the second time. Great applause was sent up from the onlookers when its meteor-like flight was maintained the second time. It is estimated that upwards of 400 cars occupied vantage points along the line and 5,000 people were present to witness the contest.

The horse show opened Monday and has proved as great a success as anticipated. It opened promptly and got under way with a flying start. Mr. Lawson had the honor to carry the first and second ribbons. A. G. Vanderbilt, the wealthiest man in the United States, was also present in the interests of his brother, Reginald, who has his "white Oak Maid" on exhibition, and she made a fine performance and carried a prize. As usual the event of the mounted police proved a very popular attraction, but was somewhat marred by an injury sustained by Charles J. Haskins, of Station II, who was severely ruptured and had to be carried out of the ring and sent to the Emergency hospital, but is reported not seriously ill. This accident somewhat delayed the programme, but another officer immediately took his place and carried out the drill. This was the smoothest and cleverest exhibition of his kind ever witnessed in the mechanics building. So much for the horses, but the prettily attired ladies must not be forgotten. It is doubtful if the show would draw the crowds it does were it not for the stunning ladies with their brilliant costumes that are in attendance, whose boxes make an exquisite border of life and color to the tan bark arena.—EDWIN PERKER.
