Mrs. Brock has been staying with her son, Professor Brock, this week.

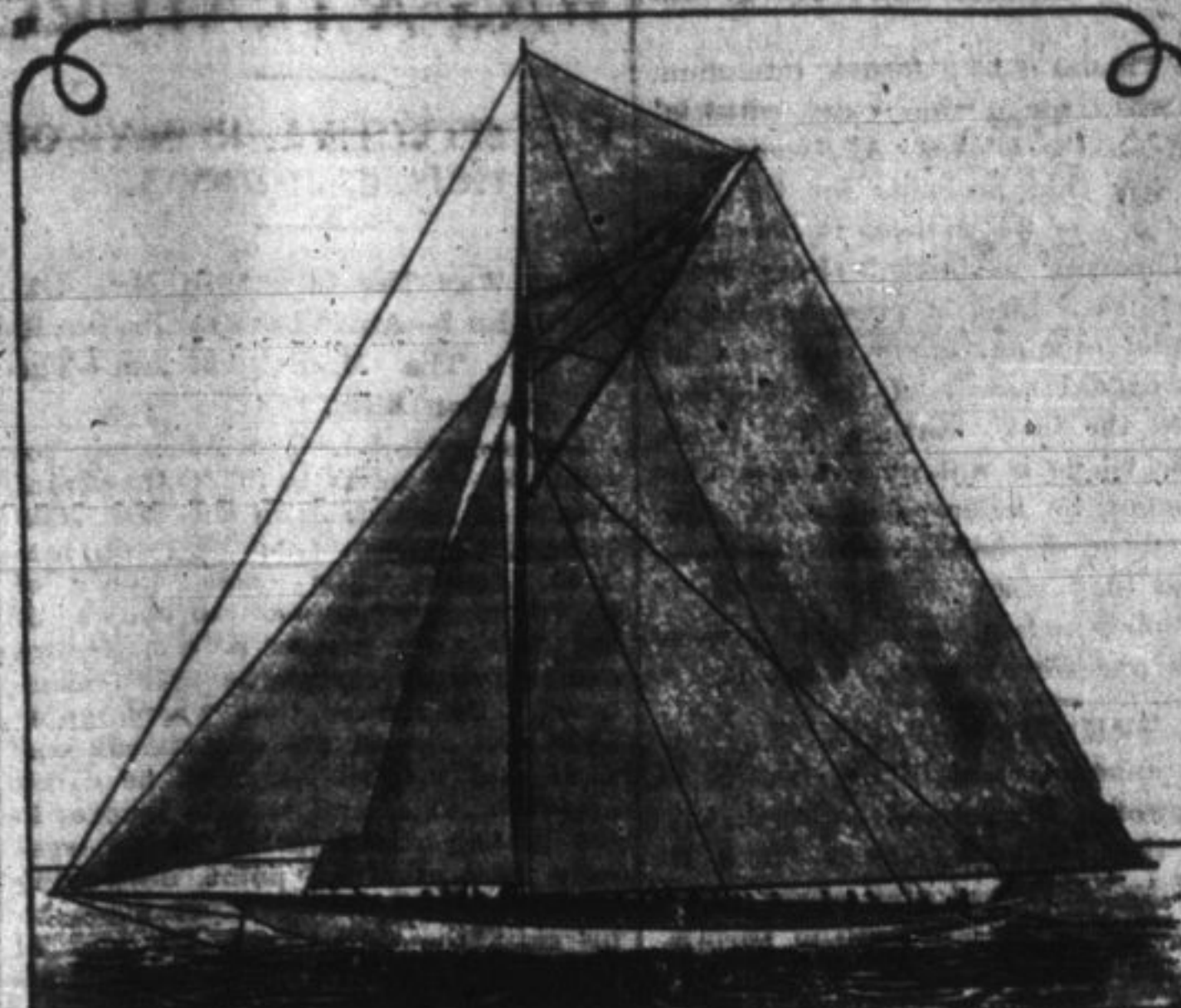
It was very good news to Mrs. McPhail's friends here and in Picton to hear that she and her family were amongst those who escaped the tragedy in Frank, B.C.
