SENT TO REPORT

AS TO THE OUTLET OF THE TRENT CANAL.

An Independent Engineer Will Go Over the Ground—To Abolish Customs Fees Hitherto Collected From Vessel Owners.

Ottawa, May 6.—The government has decided to send an independent engineer to examine into and report upon the comparative merits of the Trent canal route via Port Hope and that by way of Trenton. The duty has been entrusted to Henry A. F. Macleod, who has left for the west. Mr. Macleod will make a survey of both routes and submit an estimate of the cost in each case.

The marine interests have been asking to be relieved of payments for the service of customs officers after regular hours, which last year amounted to \$70,000. Dunkl's gallery, Montreal, has taken the matter up and has been vigorously seconding the proposition. Last night the member for St. Anne's said that he expected the government to introduce a vote to reimburse the customs officers for working after hours, thus relieving the vessel owners of the charge. Mr. Gallery is also moving to have the tax of two cents per ton in aid of the sick mariners' fund, which is collected upon vessels entering the ports of the maritime provinces, Quebec and British Columbia, reduced to one cent.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Sir Percy Girouard are appointed honorary lieutenant-colonels of the 49th Hastings Rifles and the 19th Sagueneay Regiment respectively.

The Earl of Minto, is gazetted honorary colonel of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, and the Earl of Aberdeen honorary colonel of the 10th Royal Grenadiers. His excellency has also accepted the honorary colonelcy of the 90th Winnipeg Rifles.

Sir William Mulock's bill for the settlement of railway disputes was taken up in parliament today.

DETERMINATION

BOTH SIDES IN STRIKE WILL HOLD OUT.

Non-Members of Shipping Federation Refused Men—Coal Carters and General Carters Out Now.

Montreal, May 6.—The Canadian Pacific Atlantic steamer Montrose is discharging cargo at Three Rivers, and the freight will be shipped from there by rail to its destination. The company sent 200 men there for that purpose. The company finds the plan works well as the ship is far removed from the storm centre, and there is no trouble with the teamsters or other classes of labor. It is understood that the Dominion government will not send any more regulars here to replace the militia, owing to the disinclination of the city to pay the expense.

Coal carters have gone on strike in sympathy with the general strike of the teamsters. About 100 of them are affected, besides another 100 general carters.

Blakely and Lemieux, agents of the French-Canadian shipping line, non-members of the shipping federation, went to the longshoremen to-day and had a conference, and made a request that they be allowed 100 men to load the steamer Hector. They were willing to allow all the demands of strikers, but the latter replied that if any men go back to work they must all go, and the Hector did not get the men. Generally speaking there is no change in the situation, and both sides seem determined to hold out.

The steamship agents in this city have received cable instructions from the owners in England not to give in to the striking longshoremen under any consideration. There is reported to be much dissatisfaction among the militia owing to notices having been received of the necessity of keeping them on duty a considerable time longer.

INCIDENTS OF THE DAY.

Frank Matthews, so badly injured in the locomotive works, last Saturday morning, is improving.

Henry Folger intends erecting a small summer cottage on Cedar Island, which he has leased for a long period.

Dog poisoners are at work near the outer station. Six dogs have lately met death at the hands of the surreptitious poisoner.

The steamer Petrol cleared for Collins Bay this afternoon to be fitted up, ere clearing for Newfoundland, where she will hereafter be stationed.

A gang of twenty-five men are quartered near the outer junction. They are engaged in stringing a special wire between Montreal and this city for the G.N.W. Telegraph company.

Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, C. M. Hays and other Grand Trunk railroad dignitaries passed through the city this afternoon en route to Montreal. They stopped off at the junction for a few minutes.

G.T.R. freight agents have been notified to refuse to accept perishable freight consigned to Montreal. Over 1,000 cars containing the class of freight are tied up at points between Port Huron and Kingston, owing to the Montreal strike.

About twenty couples were present. Refreshments were served at midnight, after which the guests departed for home, voting Miss Leader a charming hostess.

British Dairy Market.

London, May 2.—Cold storage butter sold this week at 8s. to 9s. and cheese was easier at 6s. to 7s.

Bristol, May 2.—Butter was quiet, 8s. to 8s. for ordinary, and 9s. to 9s. for fine creamery. Old cheese firm, 7s. to 7s. and new easier, 6s. to 6s.

Liverpool, May 2.—Butter, finest steady, 7s. Cheese steady, finest white and colored, 6s.

Live Stock Market.

Real Buffalo, May 5.—Cattle—Receipts, 200 head; market slow, barely steady. Veals strong. Hogs—Receipts, 2,000 head; market active, 9s.10c. higher. Heavy, \$7.15 to \$7.20; mixed, \$7.10 to \$7.15. Yorkers, \$7.00 to \$7.10; pigs, \$7.00 to \$7.15; roughs, \$6.15 to \$6.30; stags, \$4.75 to \$5.25. Sheep and lambs—Receipts, 1,200 head; market steady.

Provisions.

Toronto, May 5.—There is a good demand for hog products. Prices are generally steady. We quote: Canada short cut, \$23 to \$23.50; heavy, \$21 to \$21.50, and clear mess, \$21.50 to \$22.

Smoked and dry salted meats—Long clear bacon, 10c. for tons and 10c. for cases; hams, 13c. to 13 1/2c.; backs, 14c. to 15c.; breakfast bacon, 14c. to 15c.; rolls, 11c. to 12c.; shoulders, 11c. to 11 1/2c.; green meats out of pickle are quoted at 1c. less than smoked.

Lard—Tiers 10c. tubs 11c. to 11 1/2c. tubs, 11c. to 11 1/2c.

New York Stock Market.

New York, May 6.—The market was of a sluggish nature to-day. After a rather lively opening, which stocks advanced somewhat, dullness set in, and the balance of the day showed little change. During the last few minutes the market became somewhat uneasy and a decline of about a half point was registered. Twin City held strong around 113; L. & N. was very strong around 119. There has been very heavy buying of this stock for the past few days, and there is a report current that it will advance fifteen to twenty-five points this month. We think it should be a good purchase now for at least five points.

Infants' Home Executive.

The ladies' executive of the Infants' Home met Tuesday afternoon. Complaint was made that no government grant came to the home which was more worthy such a grant than other institutions which had money in the bank and on loan. The Infants' Home is in debt, and just manages to scrape along. Its value to the district is very great.

An unusual application was received from a Brockville woman who pleaded for a young baby which she declares she would care for and give a good home. The executive acquiesced with pleasure, and this afternoon a two-months' old babe was taken to the G.T.R. Junction where it was to be met by the Brockville applicant.

An Old Document.

In the law office of Messrs. Walkem & Walkem, is a very old and interesting document. It is dated in 1826, and is a copy of an application by the late Robert Sellers for a pension from the British government (which employment he was on account of falling health). It is interesting to note that Mr. Sellers lived just sixty-four years after this application. He was born in 1792, and died in 1856, being ninety-nine years of age.

The Largest Cargo.

The grain cargo of 101,000 bushels coming here to-night or to-morrow morning by the steamer Turret Cape is the largest to ever enter Kingston harbor in one vessel. The Turret Cape has a draught of seventeen feet three inches, a foot more than in the Rosemount or Panobrook. She is one of the vessels of the Great Lakes & Ocean Navigation company.

Judge Croesky, Steubenville, Ohio, had his skull fractured by a brick thrown by a boy he had chidden for trespassing.

Twenty Years a Tramp.

Mrs. Ludlow Incensed at Husband's Desertion.

New York, May 6.—Twenty years ago James Ludlow, whose deserted wife lives at No. 608 Monroe street, Hoboken, was a travelling agent for a roadway business house, and was a model husband. Yesterday when he entered the Monroe street house, dirty, ragged and unkempt, and worst of all, intoxicated, his wife mistook him for a tramp, and had him ejected from the house. He begged for mercy, but she was her husband. At first she ridiculed his pretensions, and finally, when he convinced her that his story was true, she said he had done her an irreparable injury. Laundry called on Sergt. Kipp, at Hoboken police headquarters, but he refused to interfere, and the rejected husband had no redress.

For twenty years he has been a tramp because he has too ready a tongue to listen to the malicious tongue of a woman. According to his story, one day a neighbor, his acquaintance, advised him that his wife was misconducting herself. Later that day he reproached his wife, who protested innocence, and fell in a faint.

He left her being senseless on the floor, swearing never again to enter the house. Later he discovered he had done his wife a cruel wrong, but a tramp, travelling over the greater part of the United States.

Mrs. Ludlow, who is now being cared for by her grown-up son, says she never heard nor saw her husband since he left her. She said he was, in her opinion, unpardonable.

A Citizen's Opinion.

A citizen stated this morning that in his opinion the strike of longshoremen at Montreal was instigated by United States marine interests, by way of retaliation against Canada's throwing out of the United States consuls, thereby injuring United States exports. The strike, he pointed out, would result in inflicting injury on Canada's national port of entry, that would be hard to overcome for years.
