VOTES PASSED THE ESTIMATES ADOPTED WITHOUT QUESTION.

Seven Lines Chartered to Tap Hudson Bay—A Compromise Talked of in a Lanark Bill—A Vote to be Taken.

Toronto, May 8.—The speed with which the vote for maintenance of provincial institutions, (S.P.A.), was put through last evening, without amendment or challenge, once more elicited the admiration of those who date on prudent administration and the amenities of public life. The ministers are having the happy time of their existence. The Kingston asylum estimate, \$81,500, was thrown out, and the estimate for the salary of attendants and stokers was increased last year a little, but still it is below the proper standard, one that is being pressed upon the government. These officers began at \$240 a year and after two years in service they reach \$276. Supervisors begin at \$288 and rise to \$300. Some gratuities are voted as retiring allowances, about equal to six months' salary.

Speculation in Franchises. In railway committee this morning was presented the bill of the Bruce mines and Algoma company, which has a charter for fifty miles north from Lake Huron and has gone only seventeen miles to its copper deposits. Now it is ambitious and in a very short bill, compressed into four lines, asked power to run a line to James Bay, 400 miles. It was a prime instance of a very small tail endeavoring to swing a mastiff, this bill of a mining road, and even a high sounding and pretentious charter. Already seven lines have been licensed to tap Hudson's Bay; whenever a syndicate, wants a little trading capital it reaches out for a franchise to the great North sea, at cost of little effort or cash. It was felt that the B. M. & A. company merely wanted a fine filling for a new prospectus, and that it was time for restriction. Its fight was blocked by clipping of wings. It was given fifty miles of extension north to the C.P.R. main and the promoters seemed quite pleased to get that much.

Lanark And Its Roads. In the private bills committee the bill to legalize the by-laws of the county of Lanark appropriating \$60,000 to build up toll roads, and to provide highways generally led to a long paper because of the withdrawal of Smith's Falls, Montague and Elmley north from the scheme. The latter towns were allotted \$7,100 and \$4,000 respectively, on agreeing to care for their own roads. With the arrangement seven out of thirteen townships were dissatisfied. The bill was held over for a few days and county members went away back and sat down for consultation as to a compromise.

The special committee on the great assessment met on Tuesday. It was arranged to call for objections, if any, from municipalities, private corporations, railway companies, fraternal bodies and other prospective taxpayers, that the committee may be seized of all classes of opinion. The secretary of the commission which framed the bill and which did the rough and advanced work will be secretary of the committee and will probably present such a mass of evidence before the senate as the many decisions required will be clear, though laborious.

Nice Quiet Time. This is private members' day, and the house settling down to business, a long array of acts went on stage, but none as yet have reached the third reading. Another bomb exploded itself harmlessly when the premier reported that no correspondence had been placed between members of the government and John T. Linklater.

On Tuesday an earnest debate will take place, as the liberal whip has been notified of the intention of the opposition to call for a division. Hopes are now felt of a completion of the session this month. Morning sessions are near at hand. An increase of indemnity to \$1,000 per session is the general expectation.

Not Stirring Enough. The tenth annual report of the Department of Neglected and Dependent Children for Ontario has been issued. Twenty-five children's aid societies have been organized, with a total of 12,000 children in their care. Twelve hundred children are in improved conditions in nearly every case. Care was taken to avoid idleness—even erring on side of caution; 223 children were placed in foster homes, making 1,791 placed so far. These, with 200 placed by orphanages, are regularly visited. The great need still was lack of concerted union among charitable organizations. A great evil was the committing of boys to prisons, creating criminals. Kingston and Napanee Societies were gratefully report that their operations have not been as active as they desired. The help of permanent active officer is a necessity to successful operation.

The Women Take Hold. The annual report of Women's Institutes for Ontario is worthy of wide circulation, since it contains some three papers or essays by ladies upon the household, garden, poultry, marketing. Two of the forty-three institutes, only two are located in this district, those of Lennox and Amherst Island, with twenty and fifty-four members respectively. The latter held eleven meetings, and its officers are Mrs. R. D. McDonald, Mrs. William Allen and Mrs. S. K. Towse. The Lennox Society sends no record of meetings; it is officers by Mrs. Duffett, Mrs. T. R. Denyes, and Miss B. Roblin, of Adolphustown.
