LABOR MATTERS

As Reported on by Secretary Glocking.

The third report of the Bureau of Labor, of the province of Ontario, dated December 31st, 1902, has just been issued.

In it the secretary of the bureau, R. Glocking, gives some very interesting information touching labor and industrial problems in Ontario.

On a motion of Aids. Craig and Behan a committee, consisting of Mayor Bell, Aids. Meek, McLeod, Craig and Aids. Walker and Reeves, was appointed to interview the manager of the G. T. R. company, relative to rumored changes at the outer junction, and with a view to having the main line brought closer to or through the city.

On motion of Aids. Behan and Meek, the assessor was instructed to assess all dogs found in the city while making his assessment for 1904.

This will relieve Dog Bailiff Conley of much work.

Ald. Meek gave notice that at the next regular or subsequent meeting he will introduce a by-law regulating bill posters, so as to prevent the exposing of obnoxious posters in public places.

A by-law was adopted confirming a tariff recently arranged by the property committee for the use of the city and Ontario halls. This by-law will be made applicable to the Frontenac Hotel should it make use of Ontario hall.

A by-law was adopted regarding the civic holiday. Reference to the month of August was struck from the by-law, and the council may hereafter name any day in any month as the civic holiday.

Every alderman was present at last night's meeting, a most unusual occurrence.

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The Vera Cruz with 433 Portuguese immigrants bound from the Cape Verde Islands to New Bedford, Mass., was within 135 miles of the Massachusetts coast two weeks ago, when a terrific storm carried away the vessel's sails and drove her far out at sea.

It was thought the craft would founder and most of those aboard abandoned all hope. Jury sails were finally rigged, but another storm came up and carried them away. The barkentine arrived at Ocracoke, helplessly, Friday afternoon.

Food of all kinds had given out. Their baggage and portions of the ship's deck load had to be burned for a fire to melt ice and condensation of salt water as possible.

The shipwrecked immigrants are still being cared for on the coast. Of the immigrants 390 are men. One died from starvation, who is now being cared for by Ald. King, who had been on the street only a short time.

By his strict ruling, Mayor Bell cut short what promised to be a protracted session of the council. However, it took council about two hours to transact one hour's business.

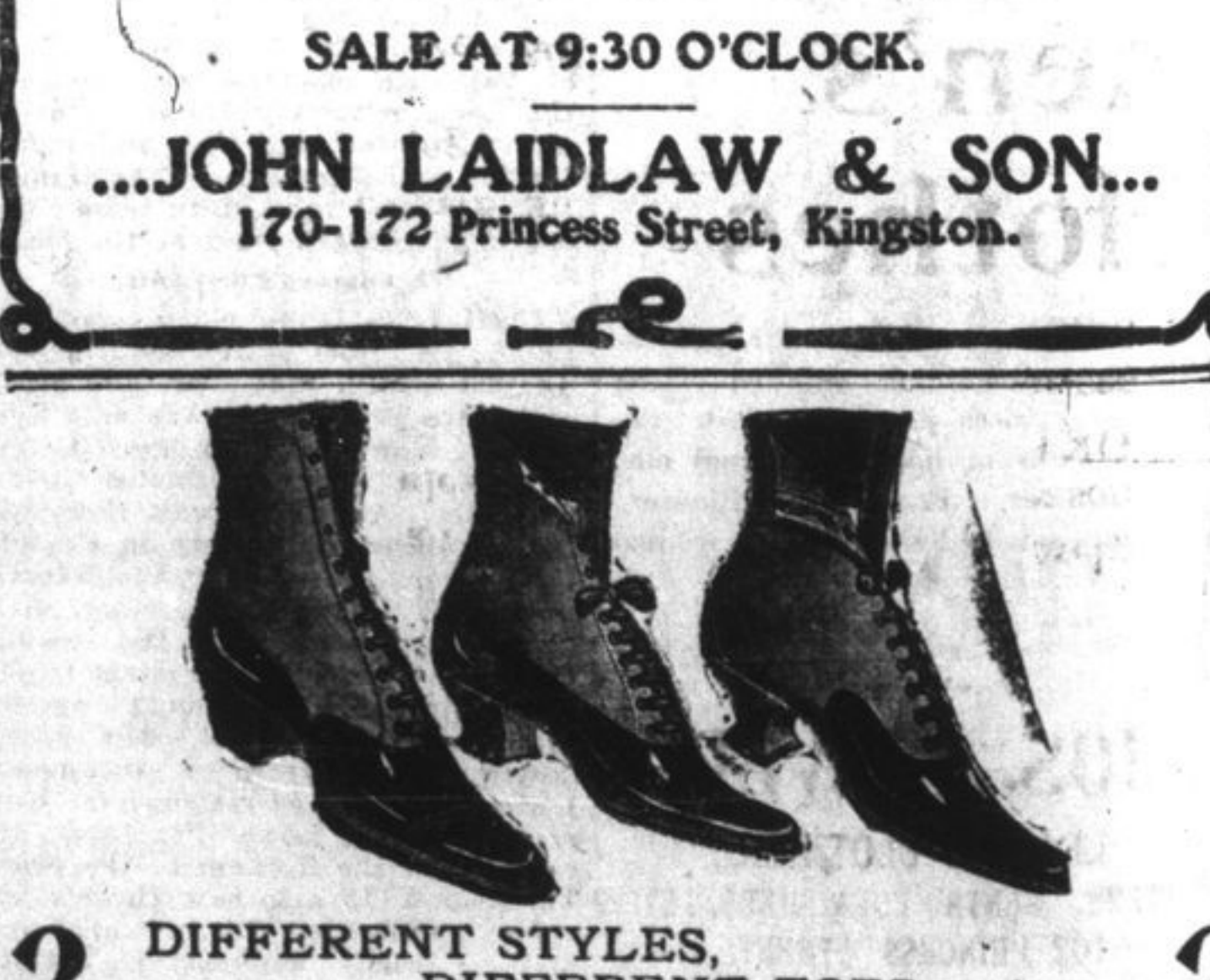
