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MANY SLAIN.

Details Of A Massacre At Monastir. WAS A QUARREL.

THE BASHI BAZOUKS WERE THE AGGRESSORS. They Swarmed Into The Bulgarian Quarter and Began Shooting and Beating the People—Many Killed or Wounded Before The Troops Could Intervene.

New York, May 14.—A Monastir, Macedonia cable to the Tribune, via London, gives details of a massacre at that place. The affair, according to the despatch, was begun entirely by Bashi Bazouks, was carried on by Turkish troops, under the direction of the governor. A quarrel arose between a Bulgarian and a Turk. Several Turks came to the rescue of their comrade when the Bulgarian drew a revolver and shot one of them. The Bashi Bazouks thereupon swarmed into the Bulgarian quarter, shooting right and left, and beating the unfortunate persons whom they overhauled. Thirty victims were reported, and several hundreds were beaten unmercifully before the troops could arrive in sufficient strength to drive off the Mussulman population. The troops made a point neither to kill or hurt a Moslem, but drove into their houses all the Bulgarians they found on the streets. The town fell into a panic. The shops were shut and the new branch of the Ottoman bank was closed and strongly guarded. The next day there were a few small outbreaks in other portions of the town and a few more Bulgarians were killed.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The Premier Parries the Opposition Attack. Ottawa, May 13.—The long promised attack by the opposition upon the government in connection with the removal of changes in the departments of public works and marine and fisheries came to a head this afternoon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier informed the house that all the money now being voted for public works would be expended under the direction of Hon. James Sutherland, minister of public works. The premier added that before leaving for the south, and before Mr. Prentiss's return, he had asked Mr. Prentiss to enter the department of the marine and fisheries in addition of such branches of the service as are purely marine in character, such as the hydrographic survey. The debate was exceedingly spirited, and was participated in by Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Hon. Mr. Tarte, Thomas Chase, Cochrane, P. Monk, H. Lacombe and others. The discussion drifted into municipal affairs of Montreal, and the methods of Mr. Prefontaine in connection therewith which resulted in a sharp passage between Mr. Tarte and Mr. Prefontaine. In reply to Mr. Talbot (Bellevue) Hon. W. S. Fielding stated that no loans have been made to the G.T.R. from the federal treasury, and that confederation. At the time of confederation the G.T.R. owed the province of Canada \$25,707,293, which amount was taken over by the Dominion of Canada as an asset, and which still stands on the balance sheet as a payment having been made on account of capital or interest by the G.T.R.

WILL BUILD MONASTERY.

German R. C. Immigrants Come From Minnesota. Winnipeg, May 14.—The movement of a large body of German Roman Catholics from Minnesota to Saskatchewan, which began in the last few days of April, when some five or six hundred members of the party crossed the line, will soon assume grand proportions. During the next four or five months at least 10,000 people belonging to the party will have settled upon their land, situated about half way between Yorkton and Saskatoon. The movement is under the control of the Beneficent Monks, a large monastic order, and the party are all of the same faith. The district where the party are settled, and will be one of the finest buildings of this class in the country.

IBON WORKS BURNED.

Were Frame Structures—Origin Of Fire Unknown. Winnipeg, May 14.—The buildings and plant of the Northern Iron works were completely destroyed by fire at midnight last night. The buildings were frame structures, and dry as tinder. The origin of the fire is unknown; loss about \$15,000 to \$20,000. Insurance unknown.

SHANROCKS TO START MAY 30.

Gourock, Scotland, May 14.—It is expected that the dismantling and refitting of the two Shanrocks will be accomplished in record time. The sails and spars for the ocean rigs are practically ready. The date upon which the yachts will start for the United States has been provisionally fixed for May 30th.

WOOD WORKERS ON STRIKE.

Guelph, May 14.—The woodworkers and finishers in the factory of the Raymond Sewing Machine Manufacturer have gone on strike to enforce a demand for a fifteen per cent. increase of wages. It is understood that the wages at present range from \$1.20 to \$1.75 a day.

BEST WELL IN CANADA.

Thamesville, May 14.—One of the many oil wells that have been put down here, was pumped for the first time steadily yesterday, and showed an output of one hundred and fifty barrels per day of a very superior crude oil. Experts pronounce it the best oil in Canada.

TRIBESMEN STUBBORN.

Three Hundred Killed In Battle At Tetuan. Madrid, May 14.—A dispatch from Ceuta, Morocco, announces that the tribesmen, who attacked Tetuan, Monday, were repulsed. They stubbornly fought their way through the suburbs to the foot of the walls, but the imperial troops eventually regained their lost positions and drove off the rebels with heavy losses on both sides. A later dispatch from Ceuta says a courier, who has arrived there by sea from Tetuan, states that the battle was suspended in order to allow the opposing forces to bury their dead, numbering three hundred. Many heads are displayed on the walls of Tetuan, which still has three days supply of ammunition. Advice from Tancier announces that the imperial forces have routed the rebel mountaineers near Fez, inflicting great losses on the enemy. Advice from Morocco says the American missionaries have practically abandoned Mequinez, owing to the critical situation; but there is no anxiety regarding the missionaries elsewhere. Letters received here from Fez this week state that the surrounding country is quiet and that the outlook is more hopeful, in consequence of the rains having improved the agricultural prospects.

MAYOR HALL RE-ELECTED.

Ogdensburg Voters Have Chosen Him For Another Term. Ogdensburg, N.Y., May 14.—The biennial charter election took place yesterday. Hon. George Hall was re-elected mayor of Ogdensburg on the democratic ticket by a majority of 627. The entire democratic list of candidates was also elected. Recorder Richard E. Fitzgerald was re-elected over John M. Barr by a substantial majority. The four aldermen elected are: George Darrow, Frank E. Breckenridge, John Hannan and William Kelly. Five democratic supervisors, Levi Goddow, Arthur Landry, Lyman D. Burr and E. P. Lynch were returned to office. On the citizens' ticket, Dr. W. S. Daly, James S. Kelly and James Westbrook, were elected. The measure adopting free text books and supplies in the city schools was carried by a large majority.

GHOST CAN'T GET PROPERTY.

Chancery Court Cancels Deed of Explorer Cavendish. London, May 14.—The chancery court has ordered the cancellation of the deed by which H. S. H. Cavendish, the explorer, provided that his property should go to Mrs. Strutt, wife of Major C. H. Strutt, and her children, to the exclusion of the plaintiff's own wife, who was named Jay, formerly leading lady of the Savoy Theatre. Mr. Cavendish, in his appeal to the chancery court, charged Strutt and Mrs. Strutt with influencing him through table-turning, and claimed that Mrs. Strutt obtained the deed by pretending to be the ghost of his, the plaintiff's mother, and by representing the latter as speaking from heaven and advising him to so dispose of his property.

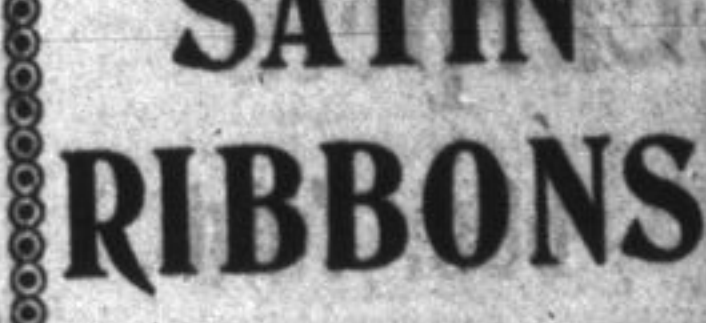

And He Was Heavily Fined For It. Berlin, May 14.—Dr. Schlamp von Hope von Merstein, the largest wine producer in the Rhine district, who was charged at Mavence by the government with adulterating his product sold as hock of the Mersteiner vintage, was, yesterday, found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of 1,500 marks (\$400) or be imprisoned for 300 days. Several witnesses, all of whom were discharged, testified that the preparation of the decoction in question using among other adulterants tannic acid, gelatine and isinglass. With these he also mingled Greek wines of the cheapest grades.
