> Being Prepared To Provide For Naval Defence-Winnipeg Asking For Concession-Lord Minto's Successor Hinted At.

Ottawa, May 16 .- The jury at Bryon, in the Kippewa murder trial, after being out since . 11:30 last night, returned a verdict of not guilty . at ten o'clock this morning. The prisoner, Jules Henri, charged with murdering young Gucher, at Kippewa, in January, 1901, was discharged amid great excitement. The appointment of A. H. Hilyard,

Dalbousie, N.B., as a member of the pilotage authority for the district Restigouche, is gazetted to day. The city of Winnipeg is applying for power to utilize the water of the siniboine river for civic water pur poses. Authority is asked for the construction of the necessary dams,

It is rumored that Sir Frederick Borden will not proceed with his militia bill this session, the reason being that another bill to provide for naval defence is being prepared by Hon. Raymond Prefontaine. As the law now stands the organization of naval militia is under the jurisdiction of the department of militia. It is, however, to be taken from this department and placed under the marine and fisheries. This will require the authority of parliament.

The government has no information as to the report that Lord Northcote, governor of Bombay, is to succeed Lord Minto, whose term as governorgeneral of Canada expires this summer. The fact that Lord Northcote is married to a daughter of Lord Mount-Stephen, connects him in a sense with Canada, and gives an air of probability to the report. His lordship is a son of the late Baron Iddesleigh, better known as Sir Stafford North-
