RESTORE LIFE

IT CAN BE DONE BY A SIMPLE PROCESS.

Dr. Kemp of New York Astonishes the Medical Profession With His Experiments—Animals Get Up and Walk After Being Killed by Chloroform.

New York, May 13.—Following a series of remarkable experiments made by him, Dr. Robert Coleman Kemp of No. 107 East Fifty-seventh street, has declared to the medical profession that resuscitation of persons after death, under certain conditions, can be accomplished. In fact, he has proved beyond any doubt by operations performed upon dogs whose hearts had ceased to beat.

The result of these experiments was explained by Dr. Kemp at a meeting held in the New York Academy of Medicine, and being discussed with great interest by the physicians and surgeons who were present. Dr. Kemp does not say that his method is entirely new, as Dr. Pruss, in Europe, by massage of the heart, once succeeded in bringing a man to life and keeping him alive for twelve hours.

But improvements in the methods of Dr. Pruss have been made, and it is confidently believed by Dr. Kemp that his efforts will eventually be rewarded permanently after death has actually set in.

"The method is to make a small incision between two ribs," Dr. Kemp said, "and to thrust in two fingers until they actually touch the heart itself. The heart is then pressed against the ribs, giving it the motion of the natural heart. At the same time a saline solution is infused into the patient, and respiration is induced by means of a pump invented by Mr. Hoyt, the general electrician at the College of Physicians and Surgeons. The intubation tube, practically the same as the O'Dwyer tube used for croup, is attached to the pump and thrust down the patient's throat as far as the windpipe.

"The massage of the heart starts the human mechanism, so to speak, and the other methods restore the other functions of the body. The patient, who was dead, actually lives again. Of course, the vital spark must still be present, but in the experiments we have made upon dogs it was shown that even the slightest pulsation of the heart had caused the resuscitation.

"In operating upon dogs which had been killed with chloroform we succeeded in resuscitating eleven out of twenty-three subjects. The dogs lived upward of twenty-four hours, though we waited from two to sixteen minutes after the heart, exposed to view, had ceased to beat.

Dr. Kemp declared the exposure of the heart showed that the dogs had died absolutely after the resuscitation they not only lived and were conscious, but some of them walked around, ate, drank and appeared perfectly normal. The fact that their recovery was not permanent was due, Dr. Kemp said, to the fact that they could not be kept quiet after the operations, as would be possible with human beings. In fact, one dog actually climbed out of the box in which it had been placed, and tore out the stitches that had been made in the wound.

"The operation itself is really no more dangerous than operating in the left pleural cavity for pus," Dr. Kemp declared. "For the covering of the heart is not removed and the cut made between the ribs is so small that very little shock results. Where the operation is performed, as it has been made by cutting out the ribs and using the hand to manipulate the heart, the shock is necessarily very severe.

"This operation is practicable in deaths from anesthetic poisoning, opium poisoning, drowning, suffocation or in still birth. The manipulation of the heart starts the blood circulating and each stroke of the pumps restores the normal respiration."

On one of the dog subjects Dr. Kemp said it had been necessary to work forty minutes before life became apparent.

When the dog saw that it had been followed it began scratching at a mound of dirt and leaves. Ready hands soon came to its assistance, and underneath the pile was discovered the body of the dead Bonati with ten great knife wounds as evidence of how he met his death.

The man after he had killed his employer had forgotten the dog, which was the only witness of the crime.

Change in Management of Census Office.

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For New Eight-Hour Bill.
Washington, D. C., May 16.—Already the campaign for another eight hour bill has been begun by the American Federation of Labor. An eminent lawyer has been engaged to draw a new measure, one that will be constitutional, if possible. It is the intention of the labor leaders to have this bill pass muster with the committee on education and of labor of the senate, the senate itself and even the president. And further the president is to be urged through all the pressure that can be brought to bear upon him to endorse this proposed act in his next annual message. At the same time the National Association of Manufacturers have begun active preparations to beat, not only this bill, but also the anti-conspiracy bill, which would legalize a picket around any manufacturing plant.

RIVAL FOR THE BELL.

A. Telephone That Will Kill Monopoly.
H. J. Hurd of Toronto, was in New York two weeks ago, and made a thorough examination of the Fowler automatic telephone exchange. He is a practical electrician and in a position to give an opinion when he declares it the greatest telephone invention yet perfected. It can be used for any number of phones, from 100 to 1,000,000, its capacity being practically unlimited. The inventor is now completing a thousand-phrase automatic exchange, which will be ready in a month or so, and when that is in working order, the telephone question, in Mr. Hurd's opinion, will be solved.

The exchange is in panels of 100 phones, and there can be as many of these panels as necessary. The operation is very simple. The phone user first rings on the disc or indicator the number of the phone on the panel. For instance, if No. 2196 was required, the subscriber rings in 21 and then 96 on that panel. The plug, with a sort of Yale lock combination, runs up a perpendicular wire to the 96 line, and then along the 96 line until it reaches 6, when the corresponding combination automatically releases it and it drops into place, and makes the connection. If the line is busy, it rings back to the sender.

If the phone is not immediately answered, or if the party wanted is out, the bell rings five times at intervals, and then rings back one to the caller. As the line goes over, the bell at the central rings continuously until the single operator in charge has his attention called to it, when he cuts off the line and has it repaired.

Mr. Hurd says that it is a complete success, and that as soon as this sample plant is completed the general manufacture will be commenced, and automatic exchanges will come into use all over America. The principle of the mechanism resembles in a general way the ingenious system by which type is automatically distributed in the type-setting machines, which, as those familiar with them know, is almost as accurate as the solar system, if kept in good working order, and not allowed to wear out.

When this new invention comes into use, the cost of operating telephone exchanges will be reduced to a minimum, and the cost of telephones will be greatly reduced.
