That Existed in South Africa Thousands of Blankets Sold dom-A Shocking State of Af-

May 21.-A sudden out break of enteric fever on board the reformatory ship Cornwall, lying off Purfleet has been traced to infected blankets from the hospital camps in South Africa. Further investigation, says the Daily Mail, revealed that many thousand of these blankets had been sold broadcast in the United Kingdom. How they got on the market has not yet been discovered. The war office sold none and sent none home. The Cornwall's blankets, which examination showed to be blood-stained and filthy and swarming with typhoid bacilli have been traced We have some very handsome through their vendors to a Whitechapel firm, through which it was learned that they were imported from South Africa. The sanitary authorities have been warned and the police are tying to trace the importers.
