CHILDREN SING

PATRIOTIC SONGS IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

This is Empire Day—How it was Observed by Over 2,000 Children in the Kingston Schools. This was "Empire day" in the public schools, a day appointed by the Ontario educational department for the instilling into the children a deeper patriotism and love of the world-wide British empire of which in the future years they are to be the Canadian portion. Could the writer of a recent editorial in the Boston Transcript have looked into the Kingston schools to-day he would never again declare to the people of the United States that the sons of Canada are "men without a country and without a flag," or that the Canadian national song is feeble and withered. Over 2,000 clear and lusty children's voices rang through the various city schools to-day in the songs which tell of the radiant deeds of Canada's sons in the last century and a half, and of the glory of their native land. Among these songs were "Canada, Loved Canada," "The Maple Leaf," and "The Land of the Maple."

Sydenham School. The Empire day exercises in Sydenham school were held in the morning. The children with their teacher congregating in the large kindergarten room which was prettily decorated with flags, etc. John McIntyre, K.C., presided, and made a brief address. Dr. Bogart also spoke, his subject being a few anecdotes about his visit to the British metropolis last summer. Besides the appointed national songs there were a recitation by Norman Fraser; extracts, N. E. Davin; chorus, "Rule Britannia," junior third class; recitation, "The Canadian Centennial," Violet Patterson; "God Save The King" recited by a ceremony which the children greatly enjoyed. Trustee J. R. Donaldson and several visitors were present.

Louise School. The pupils gathered in the principal's room this afternoon and had a happy time. A choice programme of choruses was rendered and patriotic addresses made by Prof. Pike and Rev. Alexander Laird. J. G. Elliott was chairman, in the absence of Mr. Wormwith, but that gentleman sent a piano to remind the children of his interest in the day's proceedings. Miss Agnes Staples gave a capital reading of a patriotic type. The school room was charmingly decorated. The children called for a monster celebration next year.

Rideau School. Prof. Dyde, the chairman, was represented by John McIntyre, K.C. The room, in which all the pupils assembled, was decorated with flags, and a profusion of flowers. The following programme was presented: Chorus, "The Maple Leaf"; address, John McIntyre; song, "The Men of the North"; Harold Singleton; chorus, "Canada to England"; recitation, "The Union Jack"; Edith Clarke; chorus, "The Land of the Maple"; address, Rev. M. Brown; chorus, "Canada, Loved Canada"; recitation, Mabel Clarke; chorus, "The Red, White and Blue"; reading, Freddie Mack; address, W. H. Godwin; "God Save the King."

At Orphans' Home School. A programme suitable to the sentiment of Empire day was carried out in the Orphans' Home school this afternoon. The room was prettily decorated, and flags were flying from poles on the building outside. Patriotic addresses were made by Prof. Macnaughton, Rev. Mr. Crawford, Rev. Mr. Brown and John McIntyre, K.C. The children sang several lovely choruses and recited stirring selections. Two recitations, "This Canada of Ours," and "The Flag," by little Misses Annie Smith and Jessie McKenzie, were particularly good, as was also a solo by Miss Minerva Newman. Another recitation by four small boys and three girls was cleverly given. The children were trained by Miss Wither, who showed great care in the preparation of the excellent programme.

At Cataragui School. The Cataragui school children held their patriotic assembly this afternoon. Flags were displayed in all the rooms throughout the day. The appointed choruses were sung, and an address was given by the principal, Miss Davidson, who urged upon the children loyalty and love for their native land and to the British empire. She also impressed upon them the duty they owed Canada, which they should never leave to go to another country for merely mercenary objects. They should give their services to their own country, even at the risk of great self-sacrifice, and thus truly become patriots. It would be well if more such addresses were given the school children by their teachers. Prof. Martin was present and gave a short address on patriotism.

CASES IN COURT.

Hotel Men Prosecuted For Alleged Breach of Regulations.

Much interest was manifested in the police court this morning, when nine hotel keepers were charged with non-compliance with the liquor license regulations by having on Saturday and Sunday last had the windows of their places of business obscured. Many ministers and temperance workers filed into court and took deep interest in the proceedings. The hotel men also had a large following of sympathizers, who, at the outset, applauded each point gained by the defence, until the magistrate threatened to clear the court unless order was kept.

The defence wanted to have one case tried, resting all the others on the evidence submitted in that case, but the prosecution demurred and the cases were taken up separately. The first case called was that against Lewis Martin, of the Grand Hotel. Mrs. Sparks was the first witness. Knew where the Grand Hotel was. Passed there at nine o'clock Saturday night. Sale of Timber Acres. Halifax, N.S., May 22.—The extensive Nova Scotia lumber areas of E. D. Davison & Son have passed into the hands of a syndicate of Pittsburgh, New York and Philadelphia capitalists. The property comprises 300,000 acres, well wooded with pine and spruce with five saw mills and one planer operation for several months. The price is \$1,250,000. The output will be largely increased and pulp and paper will be established.
