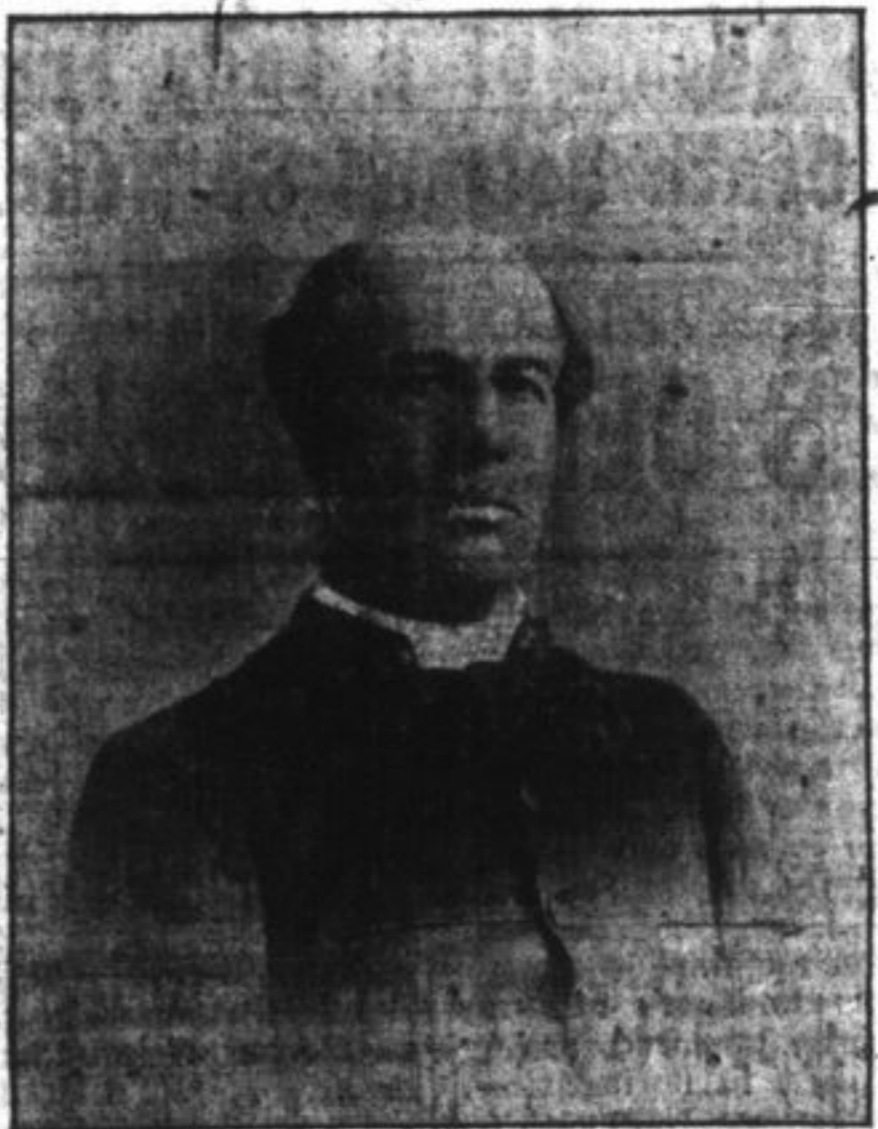

THE FIFTH ROYAL SCOTS

To Be The City's Guests For Two Days.

The Regiment Has Had a Long and Honorable Career--Has Seen Some Active Service-- Sketch of the Gallant Corps.

The visit of the 5th Royal Scots, of Montreal, to Kingston, on Victoria day, will be a historic event. Not since the 93rd Regiment of Highlanders lay here in the "Petit de Pont" barracks in 1844--fifty-nine years ago--has a regiment of kilts visited the historic Limestone city.
