This is considered a clever electioneering idea, as tending to urge the laborer to support fiscal union of the mpire as a means to gaining a pen

Mr. Chamberlain will thus get th support of millions of imperially norant voters, who can be swaved a purely domestic reason. By this poicy Mr. Chamberlain provides himsel with a double-planked platform the next general elections—an imperia plank to appeal to the classes who re cognize the greatness of the empire and the desirability of securing unity for all time; and a domestic clank to attract the masses, whose chief aim is to secure their dail bread and who will welcome any policy which will assure them a source of support in the years when their power of work has been weakened by age.

Mr. Chamberlain advocated state reasions years ago before joining the mionist party in 1886. He developed it in many subsequent speeches and sought to remove objections raised by the friendly societies or workmen's benefit clubs. In 1899 a select committee of the House of Commons reported on the scheme. It suggested pensions for persons over sixty-five years old. ranging from £13 (\$65) to £18 (\$90) per annum, determined by the cost of living in the locality.
