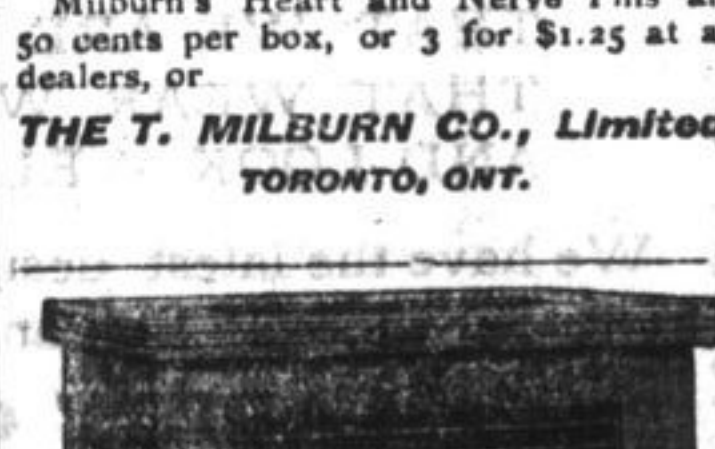

WORLD TIDINGS.

Occurrences recounted in brief form.

Despatches and Cullings Telling of Events Transpiring in All Parts of the Earth.

One hundred houses and many business buildings were burned down at Lumbria, N.H.

Mrs. J. A. Solomon was seriously injured by a car on Bathurst street, Toronto.

The striking Toronto builders' laborers have asked for a conference with employers.

The steel rail mill at Sault Ste. Marie is expected to be in operation by the 1st of July.

Paul Blouet (Max O'Reil) who died at Paris on Sunday bequeathed his library to St. Paul's church.

King Alfonso of Spain has inherited \$7,500,000 under the will of his grand father, the late King Francis.

In the North-West Territories 300 parcels of school lands have been sold at prices ranging from \$3 to \$37 an acre.

John Fleming was elected to the county council of Hastings for the vacancy caused by the death of R. A. Porter.

It is current that Duncan Marshall will be appointed Ontario secretary of the Liberal Association, to succeed Alexander Smith.

One policeman was driven crazy and two others disfigured for life by burns received while rescuing women and children at a Brooklyn fire.

G. A. Kyle, heretofore division engineer on the Northern Pacific railway, has been appointed to a similar position on the Grand Trunk at Winnipeg.

The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, in national convention at Denver, Col., has voted to increase its strike protection fund from \$100,000 to \$300,000.

The officials of the Cunard steamship company deny the report that they had withdrawn from the Atlantic conference and the agreement in regard to saloon passengers.

Paderewski, the pianist and composer, is in bad health. He is suffering from acute neuritis at his home in Switzerland, and has cancelled all engagements for three months.

Warrants were issued two weeks ago for the apprehension of several London men in connection with frauds and forgeries of bills of exchange on Morgan & Co., and other firms.

A despatch from Washington says that the joint high commission will reassemble in Ottawa in September to consider the trade relations between Canada and the United States.

Thomas Skinner, editor of the Canadian Gazette, and a director of the Canadian Pacific railway, was married at Christ church, London, on Tuesday, to Mrs. C. J. Williamson, of New York.

The contingent of southern troops on their way to join the Moroccan sultan's force, at Fez, was attacked by the rebels near Rabat, losing some killed. The remainder, robbed of everything, arrived at Rabat in a pitiable condition.

The Canada Atlantic railway is given authority to construct a line three hundred miles to the Soo from a point on the present main line between Whitney and Scotia Junction. The company asks power to increase its capital stock to \$10,200,000.

The Canada's cap defender, Strathcona, will be informally launched at Oakville on Thursday afternoon. Mrs. R. S. Smellie will name the yacht. Word has been received from Lord Strathcona that he would be only too pleased to have the defender of the championship for the great lakes bear his name.

The members of the Hamilton Independent Garment Workers' Union, twenty-five or thirty in number, have struck work to enforce their demands for increased wages. Most of the strikers are pressers and improvers, and as a result of their action from 200 to 300 girls and boys are thrown out of work. A few non-union shops are running.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Prison Reform Legislation Required.

Toronto, May 25. (To the Editor): The Prisoners' Aid Association, at the present moment is pressing for legislation whereby effect may be given to the probation system as a substitute for the imprisonment of comparatively unimportant first offenders.

The probation system in its operation is similar to the "First Offenders Act" of Great Britain, and the Benger law of France, and for a number of years has been working most satisfactorily—where in operation—in the diminution of crime and in preventing the stigma and contamination of jail association.

The Ontario government is also urged to make some provision, during the present session of the legislature, for the efficient treatment of indigent criminals either by the adoption of the proposed bill prepared at the request of, and submitted to, the government over three years ago, or by means of a special grant to the Prisoners' Aid Association for the purpose of continuing a system of treatment commenced a few months ago with encouraging results.

It is to be hoped that not only members of the government, but that each private member of the legislature shall be given to understand that the best sentiment of the province would favor the inauguration of these much-needed reforms. Will not every one who is in a position to do so, kindly give this important matter a helping hand.—A. M. ROBERTSON, Secretary.

ARE STILL UNEASY.

Labor Outbreak in St. Petersburg Feared.

St. Petersburg, May 27.—The uneasiness felt by the government and the public regarding the threatened labor troubles on May 24th and 26th, during the celebration in honor of the centenary of St. Petersburg does not abate. Among other precautions the police have requisitioned all the house porters in the city to assist in preserving order in case of need. A part of the strikers will be confined to barracks under arms on Friday and Saturday. Other detachments of troops will be posted in the suburbs to prevent the working people from marching thence to the heart of the city.

LIKE THE SYMPATY.

But Confess They Have No Special Complaint.

London, May 27.—Usual special to the Times: Despite the gratification of finding themselves the objects of so much sympathy, the better class of Bulgarians here are compelled to confess that they have no very serious complaint against the conduct of the Turks. Arrivals have certainly been made by the wholesale, but only in proportion to the widespread nature of the revolutionary propaganda.

British Government's Action.

London, May 27.—Replying to a question in the house Colonial Secretary Chamberlain said, the government had not sanctioned, and was not supporting the movement of the mine workers to import Chinese and other Asiatic labor into the Transvaal.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.

Farm Hand Shot Adopted Daughter of Employer.

Peterboro, Ont., May 26.—Joseph Fram, aged seventeen years, in the employ of James Matchett, a farmer in Ottonabee district, is alleged to have attempted to murder Lizzie Stewart, aged twenty-three years, an adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Matchett.

On Saturday afternoon the farmer and his wife came to town, leaving young Fram and Miss Stewart the sole occupants of the house. The young woman had been washing her hair, and was drying it before the fire, when it was alleged, Fram came behind her and attempted to commit an assault. Miss Stewart finally broke loose and fled screaming from the house. When she was about ten yards away Fram picked up a gun and fired, hitting her in both legs. The gun was loaded with fine shot. The attending physician extracted several bullets, and reports that the young woman's condition may become serious should blood poisoning set in.

ASKS FOR RESIGNATION.

Of Two Ministers Involved in C. & W. Scandal.

Toronto, May 27.—A Globe Victoria, B.C. C. special says that Premier Prior has anticipated the report of the special committee appointed to investigate the C. & W. scandal, by asking for the resignation of two of the ministers most intimately associated with that deal, namely Messrs. Eberts and Wells. This precipitate action of Col. Prior, the despatch adds, gives color to a rumor that the committee will report against the government as a whole, but particularly against Messrs. Wells and Eberts. The house resumes business today when it is expected that the committee will take the results of its deliberations.
