THEIR BEST EXEMPLAR.

Whatever advantages, as error only supposed by some shallow mind, may be gained by a practice of the deception of others, none is held to accrue from self-deception. Still, in the face of this fact it is hard for outsiders to understand the fool's paradise created for themselves by those hitherto responsible for the teaching of history and other kindred studies in the schools of the United States. Their school books are notoriously prejudiced and unfair to all things British or Canadian, and represent everything north of the Arctic boundary as being under Arctic conditions, while they deal expansively with Eskimo life and customs as representative of the Dominion.

The resultant self-delusion, so carefully nationalized, and recently exemplified in the fat wit of Andrew Carnegie, is finding its complete exposure and refutation in the rush of the best of their western farmers to the rich lands in the vast hard wheat belt of our Canadian North-West. Also in higher educational circles it is a hopeful sign, that, as represented by their more important universities and colleges, marked attention is now at last being paid to a study of the English constitution as an essential to a proper grasp of the understanding of their own law and constitution.

An important work now coming in to general use as a college text book is Dr. Thomas F. Morin's "Theory and Practice of English Government," in which he explodes the erroneous idea, which he nevertheless frankly admits to be the one popularly held—that there have been only slight changes in the English governmental system during the past century. Dr. Morin claims—what is well known to all but those shut in by their Chinese educational methods of history teaching—that in the last hundred years "great revolutions have taken place in the English constitution with little stir and complete success. The development of the representative system has brought it about, that under monarchy the representation is even more sensitive to the sentiment of the people than in the United States, which, in this respect, a republic that has not been able to profit by the experience of the past hundred and twenty years."

This statement reveals the true test by which we may always judge the freedom of a people—the sensitive response of government to the will of the governed. Where by force of a majority of "elected persons" public sentiment is ignored, there liberty is lacking. The most personally powerful premier of modern times, Lord Beaconsfield, backed by a big majority, and at the instance of the great shipping interest of Britain, moved the six months' hoist to Samuel Plimsoll's shipping bill regulating overloading. But Plimsoll's speech in reply so aroused public sentiment that within forty-eight hours of its rejection his bill became a government measure.

It is by this test, by the rise of this mercury of governmental response, that the real rejection of a people's freedom is recorded. Morin's faithful teaching should show the people of his country that in British parliamentary government they have their best exemplar.

A POLITICAL STRATEGIST. Mr. Chamberlain is the strategist of the age politically. He seems to be taking a position in imperial politics peculiarly his own. His was an independent mind and opinion when he announced that though a freetrader he had the conviction that the time was near, if not at hand, when the fiscal policy of the old land would have to be revised. The "new liberalism" of some Canadians has been sneered at. What Mr. Chamberlain's politics may be has not been described, but it is evident that he is about to lead off in a new direction and become the head and leader of a new party.

The chief plank in his platform will be the preference, which he thinks Britain should show for the products of the colonies. He has not made his position on this point very clear, but he has enunciated the idea that the interests of the empire would be very much improved by a fiscal policy which was expressly favourable to trade within the empire. He has now, as a subsequent and surprising proposal, declared afresh for old age pensions, and he has let it be known that the new policy at which he aims may be contributory to the revenue which is essential and necessary in behalf of the pension scheme.

Political economists stand aghast at the new combination to which Mr. Chamberlain has resorted, and with which he is appealing for popular support. The man's rise in political

life is without a parallel. He has changed his political associations several times. In turn he has been a radical, a home ruler, a liberal, a unionist, and an imperialist. In the practical working out of his principles he has repeatedly changed his party affiliations. He is the mainstay of the government at the present time. Without his dominant force it could not continue. He is not in agreement, however, with his ministerial associates and may be expected to break away from them at any time. His is a new imperialism, with a decided leaning towards colonial preference and a consolidation of the empire.

Some friends of Mr. Chamberlain think he is making a terrible mistake with his venture of old-age pensions. It is the resort of a tactician who aims at captivating the labour element, of having it cooperate with the imperial party for present political purposes without any assurance that it will have a successful or abiding result. Would the colonial secretary, strong as he is, run any risks, for a temporary triumph, and undertake anything which may imperil his own and his party's future? The question is unanswerable. The man has passed through so many experiences, has in turn played so many parts, has occasioned so many shocks and surprises, that one more count for very little. He is doing some thinking and talking on his own account, and no one can imagine what his next move may be.

The chief conservative organ in Ontario is again excited. It expects the provincial government to resign, and Mr. Ross is not inclined to take the matter into his serious consideration.

Oswego contemplates the paving of several of her streets with asphalt or bituminous macadam. The last named is the ideal article, and the Kingston property owners will make a mistake if they do not try it.

Mr. Chamberlain expects to raise the millions called for by his old-age pension scheme from the taxes or non-colonial imports. It may be a dream, but Mr. Chamberlain is trying to give it a semblance of reality.

The Kaiser says his boys can marry whomsoever they like, that marriage with them will be a case of love rather than of politics. If the young fellows are like their fathers they will probably please themselves anyway.

Sir Frederick Borden, at Brandon, in a speech which preceded the unveiling of the monument to the heroic dead, said Canada was in no danger of being afflicted with militarism. The object of his department was simply self-defence, and the enforcement of law and order in the country.

WAS A FINE SHOW.

And Only a Small Audience To See It. The operative season is over. One can safely put that down, otherwise theatre-goers would never have missed the two excellent productions put on at the Grand Monday and Tuesday nights. To say they were above the average is an injustice; they ranked with the best that has appeared this season. If "The Resurrection" on Monday night was good, the English play, "Lord Strathmore," on Tuesday night, was infinitely better, for it gave Virginia Drew Trecoet, the leading lady, a chance to prove that she merits the title she gets as a celebrated emotional actress. Alexander Frank, her principal support, is a sterling English actor. The play was greeted by a very small house, when there should have been standing room only. The play, in five acts, and the evidence of appreciation was the fact that until the final words of her, whose life had been such an admixture of happiness and misery, joined the two heads of those whom she intended to wrong, the interest of those present never wavered, and many certain calls were generously given from spontaneous feelings. It is a play that has many counter-parts in real life to-day, where youth and beauty sell themselves for title and position, but in this case her visions of regal life, perchance made her overlook the fact that it was necessary to be really married to possess the title which was only secure to her so long as her giddy old lord favored upon her. Meantime in her gorgeous surroundings she had not been idle, for she had her grace and beauty count with nobility of whom the principal fly in the web is the stately and dignified Lord Strathmore himself, who was willing to renounce his claims to a most honored position for the charms of a designing woman. The rest of the piece is full of trouble which is only cleared by the death of the principal character, Marion, the Marchioness of Vavasour, cleverly portrayed by Virginia Drew Trecoet.

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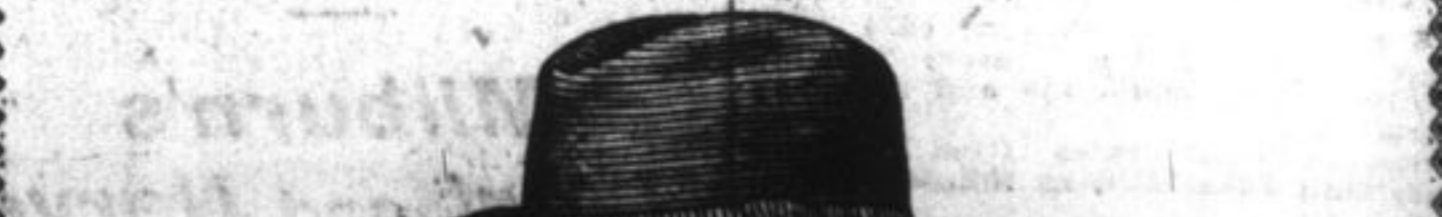

CRUSADE AGAINST RACE.

Automobile Race May Get a Set-Back. 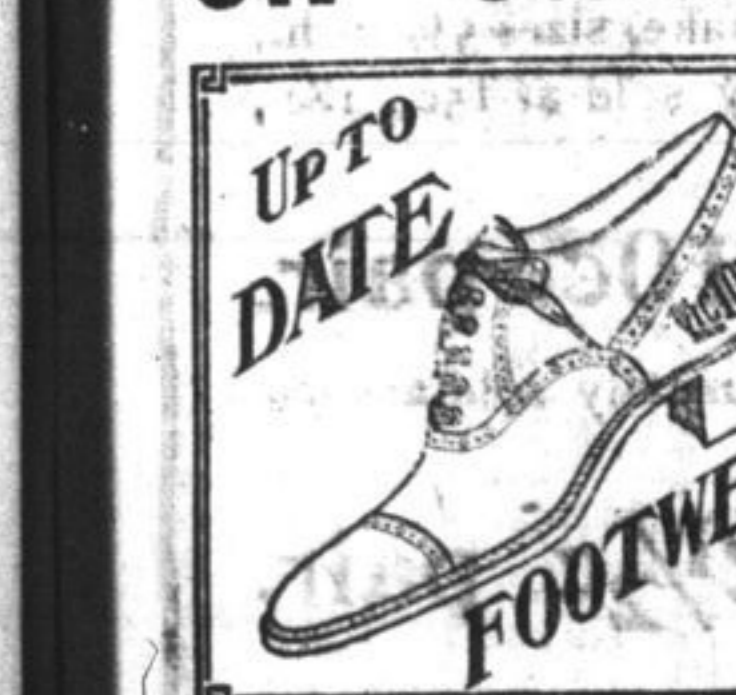
