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THE PREMIER. Diverged On Just One Point From Chamberlain.

SHORT DEBATE. DILKE DEMANDS EXPLANATION OF POLICY.

Said Chamberlain Had Proposed Policy Not Properly Thought Out—Forcibly Condemned Taxation of Food Products.

New York, May 29.—The Tribune's London calls says: The House of Commons adjourned yesterday after a most important and incisive, but the effects of speeches of the prime minister and Joseph Chamberlain were felt to be far-reaching.

The prime minister declared that it would not be wise to impose taxes on food in any circumstances, and Mr. Chamberlain subsequently asserted that raw materials ought not to be taxed and consequently that the duties would have to be levied on imported food.

Mr. Chamberlain's speech was an emphatic reference to the triumph of economic progress being before the United States and declared with strong emphasis that it was his to erect the British empire on the ruins of the tariff system.

Telegrams and Collings Which Tell of What is Transpiring in All Parts of The Earth.

The British parliament has adjourned until June 8th.

The loss by the recent forest fire in the Carleton county, burned over three miles of territory.

The Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, on Thursday, passed a resolution favoring the formation of county leagues to influence elections.

Paris, May 29.—In the Chamber of Deputies, M. Pelletan, the marine minister, answering a question of M. Gouzy (radical socialist), indignantly repudiated the charges of corruption based on the alleged letter from M. Humbert.

London, May 29.—Lady Margaret Cowell Stepany, daughter of Lord De Tabley, petitioned to-day for a judicial separation on the ground of the desertion of her husband, Sir Arthur Cowell Stepany.

Frank Grant, aged thirty-three, of the Crossing near Woodstock, fell overboard from a White Star liner on May 16th and was lost.

Joseph Leiter, of Chicago, the head of the great wheat corner, of 1897, has submitted to his creditors a proposition to settle their claims against him at twenty cents on the dollar.

Efforts are being made to raise the battleship Victoria, which was rammed by the battleship Camperdown in the Mediterranean off Tripoli, European Turkey, some years ago, in which some 800 sailors and marines perished.

Salonica, May 29.—In an encounter between Turks and Bulgarians on May 25th, in the forest near Smerdash, 20 miles of Lake Presa, where 2000 Turkish soldiers were killed.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 29.—In the Presbyterian general assembly a motion made by Dr. W. N. Page for the adoption of the report of the revision committee as a whole prevailed by unanimous vote.

Quebec, May 29.—Two big guns, seven tons each, and two barbitts, four and one-half tons each, and a quantity of military stores were landed from the steamship Yola for the Canadian militia.

Edinburgh, May 29.—Andrew Carnegie has received \$125,000 worth of steel bonds to the Royal Scottish academy to fund travelling scholarships.
