SCANDAL AT A DISCOUNT. The federal government is taking the only wise course of sending Judge Britton to the Yukon to investigate and report upon the Treadgold concession.

As far as one can see there is no ground for the scandal the opposition have endeavored to establish in connection with it. In 1901 the first concession was granted to the company which is headed by Mr. Treadgold.

Yet there was dissatisfaction. The idea current, and made much of by political agitators, was that a monopoly would be in charge of the hydraulic business. The Dawson City Board of Trade protested.

It is said that the people's interests have not been fully safeguarded in the concession. Judge Britton will report upon that and the government will be guided by his recommendations.

The opposition, led by Hon. Mr. Haggart, endeavored to show in the Intercolonial discussion, that the government was not doing as well as Hon. Mr. Blair affirmed.

A NEW CABINET

The Opposition Timber to Be in It.

The Test of McBride's Strength to Be Shown—Rain of Benefit to Western Crops—Opened a Surgery Wing.

Toronto, June 2.—A Globe special, from Victoria, B.C., says that if a cabinet is formed of the present opposition it likely will consist of: Hon. J. H. Macdonald, premier and attorney-general; Green, minister of mines; Tattow, finance minister; Patterson, provincial secretary; Oliver, chief commissioner of lands and works; and McPhillips, president of council.
