COUNCIL CONSIDERS SEVERAL MATTERS.

Deputation From General Hospital—Portland Wants Smallpox Grant—Wolfe Island Assessment and the Subway.

The county council met Thursday morning at ten o'clock. Engineer Smith reported that the Kingston and Napanee road was in good condition.

A resolution passed by the board of audit recommending computing of the sheriff's fees at \$300 a year was read. Deputy Sheriff Asseltine explained that the amount was fixed at an average over some years.

A deputation consisting of Prof. Marshall, D. M. McIntyre, Archdeacon Carey, W. B. Skinner, Dr. Wood and Dr. Herald was present on behalf of the General Hospital.

It was shown that the cost of maintaining the poor patients of the county was far in excess of the county council grant and county subscriptions.

The Wolfe Island assessment came up for discussion, this question having been before the council for several years past.

MADE PROTEST.

Toronto University Men Against Queen's.

The formal protest of the University of Toronto against the alleged encroachments of Queen's upon the government's patrimony was registered yesterday by a deputation of university men who waited on Premier Ross and Hon. Mr. Harcourt.

The deputation was headed by Dr. Burwash and Dr. Tuffly, on behalf of the federated university, and strongly that the demands of the provincial university at further aid must always come first.

The views of the deputation were embodied in a memorandum which stated that "Whilst every effort was being made by the university authorities to carry out in good faith the terms of federation, the government and legislature, in the fourth year after the proclamation of the federation act, began the subsidizing of the school of mining at Kingston, thereby relieving Queen's University of the cost of maintaining certain scientific departments of its arts faculty.

Continuing the memorial declares that the acceptance of Queen's new proposition as to the school of mines, in effect, the establishment of a second provincial university, in so far as it regards the faculty of applied science, and the scientific departments of the arts faculty.

The premier declared that the government had no intention of supporting a second provincial university, but that it was the intention to support an efficient school of mines in Eastern Ontario.

Prof. Duppis, acting principal of Queen's, was interviewed this morning by a Whig reporter relative to the sweeping charge that the scientific departments of the university are being maintained at the cost of the province.

The statements are utterly false, he replied, on being shown the memorial presented to the government by the Toronto University deputation.

A FIRE TRAP.

WAS DAVIDSON & THACKERAY'S BIG MILL.

Large Portions of Sparks and Queen Streets in Ashes—Loss \$250,000—Firemen Saved Sparks Street.

Ottawa, June 4.—Fire which broke out at 6:45 o'clock this morning, swept a part of the business centre of Ottawa, laying in ashes large portions of Sparks and Queen streets, between Bank and Kent streets.

Broken and irregular columns of smouldering ruins are all that remain where stood the big mill, factory and lumber yards of Davidson & Thackeray, the printing and lithographing establishments of the Mortimer company, the clothing manufactory of R. J. Smith & Co., the paint works of Peter Stewart, and other smaller concerns.

It was a quarter to seven when the fire, discovered by the firemen, started in Davidson & Thackeray's mill. It was claimed that the blaze started in the stable, adjoining the mill, but firemen say they had water on the mill before the flames caught at all.
