What Is Going On In The Business World—The Market News.

A Montreal paper figures the losses Montrealeers have sustained from the shrinkage in value of stocks from their high level at \$75,000,000. At the haphazard close on Friday afternoon 2,001 shares of choice were traded, 1,119 white and 882 colored. Sales: 915 white and 100 colored at 10-16c.

Failures in Canada for May, according to the U. S. Bureau of Commerce, totaled 75, with aggregate liabilities of \$296,925. In May last year failures totaled 88 with liabilities of \$722,747.

THE STRIKERS IN TORONTO REJECT MASTER'S PROPOSALS.

Say Finances Are Sound, and They Can Stay Out Two Years—Big Loss By Fire.

Toronto, June 6.—The striking union carpenters at a meeting held last night, six hundred men being present, unanimously rejected the latest proposals made by the masters, namely, to make thirty cents the wage from date. The men declared the strike is only beginning. The finances, they add, are in solid condition, and they can stay out for two years if necessary.

FIGHTING FIRE. MONTEAL FIREMEN BATTLE AT ST. AGATHE.

Have Been Ordered to St. Jerome, Where Bush Fires Rage—Electric Plant in Danger—Flames Now Controlled.

Montreal, June 6.—The firemen from Montreal, after a seven-hour battle two miles north-east of St. Agathe, yesterday, were ordered last night to St. Jerome, where the residents are greatly alarmed over the danger from a raging bush fire. A special C.P.R. train left St. Agathe about midnight, with men and apparatus for the threatened village. St. Agathe is considered out of danger for the present. For several hours during the day, the electric light plant, north-east of the village, was in danger of destruction from flames, which worked through the woods at an incredible rate of speed. At ten o'clock the Montreal firemen, engine and hose wagon, which were stationed in the village, were despatched to the scene, which they reached none too soon to save the electric light plant from disaster.

DEATH OF A NURSE. Miss Spooner, Glenburnie, Entered Into Rest. After a six weeks' illness of typhoid fever, during five of which she was in a comatose condition, Miss Elizabeth Spooner, second daughter of Reuben Spooner, "The Elm," Glenburnie, entered into rest on Friday, June 5, long held out for her recovery, but lapses occurred, and the sufferer's remarkable constitution finally gave way to the terrible inroads upon it.
