GHASTLY FIND.

LED TO MEDICAL COLLEGE TO FIND FATHER.

Mystery Is Cleared Up--Mad Daughter Comes a Day Later Body Would Have Been Dissected.

Chicago, June 13--The Chronicle says: Searching for her father, William Frano, who has been missing since February 6th, Mrs. Bell Lowrey, 6251 Lexington avenue, was led by two detectives into the cooling room of the Northwestern Medical College...

A Pertinent Question. Ex-Alderman Toye was seen this morning with reference to the statement made by Alderman McLeod at Thursday's special meeting of the council, touching the subway question, in which Alderman McLeod tried to clear himself by reading selections from minutes of council. All that ex-Alderman Toye had to say was this: "Why did Alderman McLeod tell the city council all the facts relative to a joint meeting of committees from the city and county councils, relative to the subway matter, and arranged by motion, ex-Alderman Deane and Toye? If Alderman McLeod told the hidden facts relative to that meeting, Alderman King would not have made his cowardly attack upon Alderman Mowat. Alderman McLeod purposely kept the proceedings of this conference obscure, so as to protect himself."

An Historical Fence. Chairman of Parks Walkers will attend to the request of the Kingston Historical Society that the piece of abutment separating St. George's Cathedral grounds from the new Clarence street park be left standing. The abutment is a wall that remains in the first enclosure about St. George's church, and is three-quarters of a century old. Alderman Walkers has every respect for the cedar posts, erected, he says, to keep the Indians from the church. This bit of fence will be straightened, and labelled as a great curiosity for visitors. A number of the fruit trees have been removed, but most of them still remain. His worst wish is to get all the fruit that remains upon them after the small boy has done his work. The chairman states that an application has been received for the right to establish a refreshment booth in the park, but it will not be granted.

The Steamship Released. The steamship Parsons, owned by Capt. Wheeler, Chamont, N.Y., and which brought a cargo of coal here a week ago, was seized by the Sheriff of Frontenac for \$105 salvage. The claim was made by the crew of the Calvin steamer Johnston which brought the Parsons into port, after it had broken on its machinery in the Batteau channel. Capt. Wheeler disputed the amount, but has now paid it, and the Parsons has been released.

FOUND HANGED.

CONVICT WAS TIRED OF THIS LIFE.

Tore Up Sheet And Hanged Himself To Grating Over Cell Door--When Found He Was Quite Dead.

One more tragedy was enacted in the Kingston penitentiary last evening, when James Gregory, sentenced at Port Arthur in November, 1902, to two years in penitentiary for burglary, committed suicide by hanging. On Tuesday last, Gregory made a victim of himself upon keeper Kenny, in the binder twine department. He was removed to the punishment cell, and Friday afternoon was placed in a cell in the isolation ward. About eight o'clock the guard making his customary rounds, found Gregory all right. Towards nine o'clock when he again made his rounds, he found Gregory hanging by the neck to the cell door.

He had torn up a sheet and formed a noose of the piece, with which to hang himself. The discovery was made by keeper McQuade, who at once summoned assistance and had the body cut down, but too late to save life, as the heart's action had ceased.

Coroner Kilbourn was at once notified and visited the institution, viewing the body and taking note of the occurrence. Up to noon he had not decided upon holding an inquest. Gregory was a comparatively young man. Up to the time of his attack upon keeper Kenny, he was looked upon as a model prisoner. He had not caused any trouble, and was always willing to obey orders. It is presumed that the discipline following incarceration resulted in "turning his mind," which accounts for his attack upon keeper Kenny.

After being subjected to a short term in the punishment cell, he was removed to the prison of isolation, being taken there Friday afternoon. Gregory seems to have brooded over his trouble, and finally decided to do away with himself. With this end in view he tore the sheet of his bed into strips, and with these made a noose with which he successfully made away with himself.

No blame can be attached to any member of the staff, as each one performed satisfactorily the duty assigned to him. An inquest will be held to-night at 5:30 o'clock.
