DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

A Non-Confidence Resolution Voted Down. Ottawa, June 17.—A motion to increase the protection enjoyed by market resolutions was voted down by the House of Commons on Tuesday.

The question of drainage across railways was discussed in connection with Blair's bill, and the minister promised to endeavor to find a means of meeting the suggestion.

The commons amended the act respecting infectious and contagious diseases of animals, to provide that in the case of the slaughter of infected animals, the owner shall be entitled to one-third of the value of the animal, which compensation must not exceed \$20 for a grade, or \$50 for a pure bred animal. For non-infected animals in contact with diseased animals, the owner shall be entitled to three-fourths of the value of the animal, which, in the case of a grade, must not exceed \$50, or for a pure bred, \$150.

The government contemplates the erection of a special building for the storage of records. The fire appliances in the various departmental buildings at Ottawa are regularly tested to see that they are in working order and the fire hydrants and chemical fire extinguishers are in charge of the Dominion police, by whom they are kept in order and regularly tested.

MAYOR INVOLVED.
