The disposition of the senate to dabble in partisan politics was exhibited when Hon. Mr. Ferguson introduced his bill to prevent the judges doing any work but that which pertains to the courts. His argument was that the employment of judges on commissions was detrimental to judicial functions, and that it affected their independence.

THE DUTY OF THE JUDGES.
The object of the bill and the discussion which it provoked was to help on the cause of the conservative party in the Ontario legislature. It had raised against the government for presuming to let a commission conduct the Gurney enquiry, and the senate who favoured the Ferguson bill simply played into Mr. Whitney's hands and magnified his grievance. It was pointed out that a conservative government had commenced the employment of judges in extra-judicial commissions, and that no fault was found with the practice so long as a conservative government continued it. It was only when a liberal government resorted to a commission, to call and analyze the evidence that the impropriety of the procedure was discovered and that the bench was found to be losing its respect.

THE DUTY OF THE JUDGES.
The bill gets its second reading on the 25th, and its quietus at the same time. The senate may meanwhile get all the evidence it wants as to the vindictiveness of the conservative party. The abuse of the judges by Gurney himself in terms at once coarse, wicked and spiteful—and the indirect censure of Dr. Beattie Nesbitt and others without a parallel. The fact that the judges exonerated the provincial secretary and held that the charges against him failed is sufficient to raise in the opposition a malicious spirit, which exhibits itself in the most offensive language. The senate is regarded as a calm and deliberate assembly, and largely devoted to the consideration of legislation passed in the lower assembly. It is supposed to be free from political bias, and it cannot be this and identify itself with the petty concerns of a local opposition.

GAMEY IN DISGRACE.
The speech of Mr. Gamey, in the legislature, as reported in a friendly press, is marked by coarseness and vulgarity throughout.
