THE CLOSING CEREMONIES

AT THE ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.

Unveiling of a Tablet to Deseated Graduates Vigorous Addresses by Sir Richard Cartwright and Lord Dundonald.

An atmosphere almost approaching gloom pervaded the closing exercises at the Royal Military College this morning.

The shadow of death brooded over the military colony on Point Frederick, caused by the tragic drowning of Cadet Charles Phoenix Toronto, on Monday.

At half past ten o'clock, Lord Dundonald, general officer commanding the Canadian militia, in company with his aide-de-camp and Major Logan, entered the college square where the cadets were drawn up in column.

This tablet is very large, and of brass. On it are these inscriptions: The names of the deceased officers, graduates of the Royal Military College of Canada.

A deputation of wholesale seedmen from Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal and Ottawa, interviewed the Dominion government on Wednesday, and objected to a bill of Hon. Mr. Fisher relating to the purity of seeds imported for sale in Canada.

Chicago, June 24.—Robbers broke into the Town Bank at Cary, Ill., a western suburb of Chicago, at two o'clock, first striking the safe with dynamite and escaped with \$5,000 in currency and valuable papers.

IN A COLLISION

PETER HUNTER IS A SERIOUS SUFFERER.

His Mother Was Also Badly Injured—Four Thrown Out of the Rig.

Wednesday afternoon, while driving from the Forty Foot Road, where they had been attending a wedding, through a street car collision with their conveyance, four persons were thrown out of a rig and two of them badly hurt.

Peter Hunter, of the News-Times staff, was driving in the rig, two seated, was his mother, Mrs. Sands, of Bay street, and Rev. Dr. Antill.

At the corner of Frontenac and Princess street they were trying to pass by another rig or else got too close to the track for the down-running car, No. 7, in charge of motor-man Joseph Gilman, struck the heavy rig, the ladder being broken and a wheel taken off the rig, the only damage to it on account of its being quite heavy.

Mr. Hunter was thrown to the ground and seriously hurt, his collar bone being dislocated, two or three ribs broken, and the back of his head being badly cut. His clothing was also torn in many places.

Dr. Campbell attended the sufferers and had them removed by means of ambulance to Mr. Hunter's home, Montreal street.

James Laturney took the damaged rig to his carriage works, on Princess street.

The motorman was not going beyond the ordinary rate and as far as can be learned the accident was not his fault.

Both Mr. Hunter and his mother will be laid up for several weeks.
