Driving Rod Broke. Engine Cab Smashed As If An Egg Shell. Buffalo, N.Y., June 25 - While speeding over the rails at the rate of fifty miles an hour, a driving rod on engine number 904, which hauls passenger train No. 5, on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railway, between Buffalo and Lockport, broke about two miles west of Lockport, at 1:30 o'clock this morning, smashing in the fireman's side of the cab like an egg shell and crushing to death one man and perhaps fatally injuring fireman Charles English, Buffalo. No one else was injured, but some 200 passengers were taken up in the cars. The dead man is supposed to be George Clifford, a fireman of Chicago.

Great Gathering Of Wings. Several advertisements have recently appeared asking for information for sale. These, it is believed, are inserted by these women. A few months ago a woman was convicted on a charge of deserting a child, and was sent to the Mercer Hotel for six months. It leaked out that she had received the money and in a few days, when an opportunity presented itself, the baby was deserted, left on a doorstep. The centre of operation appears to be a point near Scarborough.

Ottawa Free Press Sold. Ottawa, June 25 - Alfred Wood, of Toronto, has completed arrangements for the purchase of the Ottawa Free Press, C. W. Mitchell, the present owner, established the Free Press thirty-five years ago, and has ever since conducted it on consistent reform principles. The newspaper is regarded as a splendid property, and under the guidance of Mr. Wood, it is assured of continued success. Mr. Wood began his newspaper career in Toronto twenty years ago, and he is at home in the journalistic as well as in the business world. The Free Press will continue to support the government.

Will Make Them Powerful. Montreal, June 25 - The leading officials of Northern and Great Northern railways of Canada are meeting in this city, but the purpose thereof is being kept strictly quiet. D. B. Mann contents himself with stating that no effort will be spared in carrying out the original intentions of the management of making the Canadian Northern a transcontinental road.

First Bet On Yacht Race. New York, June 25 - The first actual bet in Wall street on the coming races, was made yesterday. F. H. Brooks, the curb broker, announced that he had bet \$2,500 to \$5,000 that Shamrock III, would win a series. Brooks said he was acting for a customer.

Earthquake Shocks In Hungary. Eria, Hungary, June 25 - Four violent earthquake shocks were felt here at six o'clock this morning. Several houses in the suburbs collapsed, and nearly all the buildings in the town were more or less damaged. The inhabitants were panic stricken.

NEWS OF WORLD TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody - Notes From All Over - Little Of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by The Public. King Peter has confirmed the appointments of the existing Serbian ministry. Emperor William visited the United States warships Kearsage at Kiel on Thursday. Conductor Robert Brackwood, Hamilton, was killed in a collision on the H.O. & B. railway on Thursday. The British representative at Peking is informed that a treaty ensuring China's sovereignty in Manchuria was being negotiated.

Two bulls brought on a steamer from New York, has developed the foot and mouth disease, says a Herald despatch from Buenos Ayres. The authorities have resolved to quarantine the ship and burn the carcasses of the animals.

JOHN MITCHELL'S CONDITION. Gives Rise to Anxiety - He Is On Verge of Collapse. Indianapolis, Ind., June 25 - John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers of America, is on the verge of a physical collapse, and will take a so completely worn out and ill he is so from worry, hard work and ceaseless travel that for several days he has managed to get through his daily routine of work only by the exercise of the strongest will power.

President Mitchell attends conferences from one end of the country to the other. His mail is almost as large as that of a cabinet minister, and his influence is felt in all departments of the organization. In addition to this he is a voracious reader and keeps himself posted on all questions of public moment.

King Edward's Birthday. London, June 25 - The birthday of King Edward (who was born November 9th, 1841), was officially celebrated to-day, it having been decided, as announced in the London Gazette some time ago, that his majesty's natal day was to be observed in London and on the home stations on June 26th, this being the anniversary of his coronation and altogether a more suitable time for a military display than in November. On the other hand, as was the case last year, foreign stations will celebrate it on November 9th, the actual anniversary of his majesty's birth.

Acts of a Hired Man. Cut a Woman's Throat And Hammered Another. New Milford Conn., June 25 - A hired man on the farm of Orlando Pepper, in the town of Sherman, is reported to have attacked two women early to-day, cutting the throat of one, and pounding the head of the other with his fist. He was then cutting his own throat. His name has not been learned. Neither the man nor his victims are dead though one of the women probably will die.

Country Produce In Ottawa. The demand for beans is limited and prices are steady at from \$1.80 to \$1.90 per bushel. The market for honey continues dull with no change in prices, which are ruling as follows: White clover, in comb, 12c to 13c; white strained, in 60 lb. to 70 lb. tins, 9c to 9 1/2c, and buckwheat, at 7c to 7 1/2c. Eggs are in fairly good demand at 11c to 13c, per dozen, while potatoes retail at from \$1 to \$1.10 per bag.

Resumed Relations. Belgrade, June 25 - The German emperor sent King Peter a telegram couched in cordial terms. The Austrian minister, this morning, resumed official relations with the Serbian government.
