It is expected that a new Hungarian cabinet will be formed to-day. G. F. Smith, Montreal, has been elected president of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association.

A general conference is to be held in Chicago, in the fall with a view to the union of the Lutheran churches of the United States and Canada. Col. McLachlin of the 25th Elgin Regiment has resigned, and other officers threaten to do the same because the B.C. Col. Poser, censured them.

NO BRITISH DISASTER. War Office Is Able To Make Contradictions. Paris, June 27.—A despatch from Jibuti Abyssinia, says the Mad Mullah has destroyed five British posts, between Buro and Bohole, in Somali-land. Thirty-nine British officers, out of forty-two white men were killed in the engagements. Two thousand native soldiers were made prisoners.

The Story Denied. London, June 27.—The war office has received a telegram from Somali-land, enabling it to contradict the French report of a British disaster. The last news of the Mullah was that he was hovering eastward of the British forces, threatening the lines between Buro and Bohole, which were the only British means of communication with the coast.
