The anniversary of the Dominion's birth was quietly observed in the big military camp on Barrieldale heights. The usual drill was carried out in the morning, and the men were given the afternoon for themselves.

A feature of the day was the "At Home," arranged by Col. Gordon, D.C., London, by all the officers, in particular, many citizens and a large gathering of ladies. Music of a delightful character was supplied by the fine band of the 49th Regiment.

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A MAN STABBED

BY A MILITARY DAMP-COOK ON DOMINION DAY.

Attached to the 49th Regiment—John Cotman Was the Victim—A Large Wound—But Not Serious.

A stabbing affray occurred shortly after half-past five o'clock Wednesday afternoon, at the corner of Dataro and Brock streets. John Cotman, a machinist of the locomotive works, was the victim, and John Elliott, of the 49th Regiment, the perpetrator.

The stabbing was the result of a drunken brawl. Elliott drew a knife and fiercely struck Cotman with the blade on the back of his shoulder. The wound was three inches long and nearly an inch deep.

At the police court this morning, Elliott was arraigned on a charge of bodily assault, and pleaded not guilty. He was represented by J. M. Nowat.
