

Former Kingstonian Writes From Red Deer.

Red Deer, Alta, June 25 .- (To Editor): To-day I came up over the . & E. railroad from Calgary to Red Deer. Possibly as good a description hat it compares very favorably wit he K. & P. What with broken ties, te., one can hardly understand how the train manages to keep the rails. lowever a large number of men orses have been set to work on oad bed and in a few months we first-class condition. There is only one mail and passenger train going each way daily along the C. & E. railroad but the amount of freight hauled north is surprising, as many as five

or six freight trains in one day Between here and Calgary there are nany flourishing little towns, but to one who contemplates coming to A berta, let bim rid himself at once o any idea regarding the beauty and size of any of these towns, as I am afraid he may be somewhat disappointed. Red Deer itself has some where in the neighborhood of 200 inhabitants, and extends about one-half mile east and west, so that the residnces are in no way crowded: On the north of the town is the Red Deer river, which supplies power for two saw mills, and carries the saw logs down from the foot hills. Many of the farmers in the surrounding country oring their cream and eggs to the overnment creamery here. As much as ,000 pounds of butter has been ship ed from this creamery in a week mbia. The farmers are guaranteed a pound for the butter made from their cream and pay 4c. a pound for making and shipping it, but if at the end of the season it has cost less than c, to pay the expense the balance is anded to the farmer and also if the outter brings a good price he gets the benefit, Many men have been aided greatly by this industry and to-day own land that they would not have had they not had the benefit of the creamery. Their eggs also bring them 15c dozen all summer.

As to the country surrounding Red Deer, I cannot speak, but as I expect to see considerable of it later I will write of it again. The town also boasts of quite a strong baseball and football team. All the boys turn out every evening and practice, so place is quite lively. I believe there sociation.
