BIG WORTH MILLIONS.

Amid, Texas, July 3.—A deadly enemy of cotton boll weevil has appeared in cotton fields south of here. It is a small, green, grub-like insect, according to reliable authorities received here. It is a small, green, grub-like insect, which has a voracious appetite for the weevils and does not harm the cotton plants. Since the grub is put in an appearance in that section a few days ago, the weevils on a number of plantations have been destroyed.
It is estimated by United States experts that the cotton boll weevil causes a financial loss of \$25,000,000 in Texas cotton plantations last season. Up to the green-grub appeared no remedy had been found for the pest.

ENGLISH WOMEN PHYSICIANS.
London Contains About Ninety Female Doctors.
London Telegraph.
Women doctors are claiming feminine attention at this moment, for two reasons. There is, first, the splendid effort they are making on behalf of the great fete and bazaar which Princess Christian and Princess Louise are organizing on behalf of the Royal Free Hospital, through whose wards the present generation of qualified women have passed as students. There will be three of the stalls entirely equipped by themselves, one of which will be held by Mrs. Scharlieb, the senior physician for the diseases of women at the hospital, and Miss Julia Cook, assisted by Countess Spencer; another by Dr. Lillian Hamilton, who for several years was physician to the late Amir of Afghanistan at Kabul, and the third by the present women students of the hospital, directed by the house surgeon. Then there has been the publication of the annual report of the School of Medicine for Women, which is lavishly interesting, and this year is especially so from the number of public appointments it records as having lately been conferred on female practitioners.
The list is by the longest it has ever issued, and, in addition to those made at the Royal Free Hospital, which by the way, was the first general hospital to appoint women to its medical staff, and the New Hospital for Women, which is entirely officered by the sex, there are a number of noteworthy positions to which women have been appointed for the first time. Miss J. J. Mackenzie, for instance, is now the medical officer in the department of the London School Board, which also has two or three women as general medical officers; Miss Bryson is resident medical officer at the Cumberland Infirmary, and Miss Colebrook is a medical officer to the Ancient Order of Foresters, among many more lately nominated to important posts. But more striking perhaps, is the fact that Mrs. Stewart Deacon has been appointed government medical officer of health for the Gold Coast Colony, a position which involves the inspection of a considerable number of towns, and Miss Sheldon Amos and Miss Kate Vachon are assistant medical officers in the quarantine department at Port Said and Suez, respectively.
It has lately been estimated that there are some ninety women doctors in London alone.

OVER MEETING THE EXPENSES OF CANADIANS.

Ward Claims That Bill of \$26 Audited Recently By Council, Was For Board of Visitors While in Watertown.
Watertown, N.Y. Standard.
Attorney James A. Ward has got his eye on the city treasury again, and today has been busy examining certain bills which have recently been paid in resolution of the council. Now he makes the announcement that he will commence another action against the officials, but this time the city is in no way involved.
The case will be a peculiar one. About three weeks ago a dozen citizens from Frontenac county, who were friends of Mayor Pappa, came over to this city and had an enjoyable time. There was speech-making and one thing and another in the common council, and then there was a bill of about \$26 run up by some one, at the Hudson house.
A few nights ago at the meeting of the common council a bill was presented by John Hardiman for about \$26 for entertaining these and city of Watertown. The bill was audited and ordered paid all present voting eyes.
Mr. Ward contends that this is a bill for which the city is not liable and says that he will bring an action in city court at once to contest its legality, and will demand a jury trial.
He further says that the action will be against President John E. Folson, Aldermen Wallace, Clough, Hunting, Lewis, Robin, Dods, Fisher, Purser, Earl and Webb and City Clerk Street and City Treasurer Watts. At the meeting when the bill was ordered paid Aldermen Jennings and Potter were absent and in consequence they will not be made parties to the action.

EARTH'S GREATEST CANAL.
New York's Canal Scheme Is Gigantic.
Review of Review.
The canal system of the state of New York now consists of one trunk and two branch canals. The main trunk canal is the world-famed Erie, extending from Buffalo to Troy. Three wharves go by the Hudson river to New York. The Oswego canal extends from Onondaga lake, near Syracuse, to Oswego; the Champlain, from the Hudson river, near Troy, to the banks of the river to Fort Edward, thence to Whitehall, on Lake Champlain. Formerly there were three other lateral canals, reaching the southern section of the state at Olean, Elmira, and Binghamton; but these have long since been abandoned, as has the Delaware and Hudson canal, connecting the Hudson river with the anthracite coal region, which was owned by a private company. The three existing canals, are the only ones considered in the great scheme of improvement for which the New York legislature has proposed the expenditure of \$101,000,000. The Erie canal is now 352 miles long, has a depth of from 7 to 9 feet, and a width on the bottom of 52 feet. The capacity of its boats is 240 tons. The variations in depth are due to the fact that the improvements begun in 1845 were left uncompleted. The Oswego canal is 38 miles long, with the same varying depth as the Erie; and the Champlain canal, with a depth of 7 feet as its greatest depth and 5 as its governing depth.
What is now proposed is to enlarge all three of these canals, to a uniform depth of 12 feet, with a minimum bottom width of 75 feet, making them capable of carrying boats 150 feet long, 25 feet beam, and with a draught of 10 feet. The cargo capacity of these boats will be increased, or more than four times that of the present boats. This amounts practically to building a new canal system, and for considerable portions of the route the Erie canal will be replaced, involving the total abandonment of and abandonment of the present channels. Where the early engineers preferred to dig a ditch along the bank of a natural water course, the new plan calls for the utilization of rivers and lakes as much as practicable. Boats will use the Niagara river between Buffalo and Tonawanda; instead of an artificial canal, a dam in the Genesee river south of that city, raising the river to the canal level; the Seneca and Oneida rivers will be utilized and the canal carried through Oneida lake, and the Mohawk river will be canalized from Little Falls nearly to Cohoes. In like manner the Hudson river will be utilized as far north as Fort Edward. This will shorten the Erie canal to 343 miles, the Oswego to 23 miles, and the Champlain will remain of about the same length as at present.
The undertaking thus planned is almost as great an enterprise as the Erie canal for its day. It is a greater public improvement for the state of New York to carry out than is the Panama canal for the United States government, and enthusiasts believe it of hardly less commercial value. Its cost will be more than half the estimates for the Panama.

DEATH OF ALEXANDER COWAN, OF LANSDOWNE.
Gananoque Reporter.
The death of one of the oldest residents in the person of Alexander Cowan, passed away last Thursday, shortly after noon, at his farm home seven miles east of Gananoque, aged eighty-seven years and nine months. His first wife, Mr. Cowan was born near Paisley, Scotland, but was brought to Canada when only seventeen months old. He was third son of the late John Cowan, Pittsburg. Two brothers—Alexander and John Cowan—immigrated to Canada and settled in Norfolk county about the year 1817. They had been there but a short time when their uncle, a military officer, died and left them a tract of land in the township of Pittsburg, Frontenac county. It was then a wilderness, with not a clearing on it. But the two men with their families came down to occupy it, travelling the 25 miles with ox teams and on foot. Each of them had large families and as time passed and their sons and daughters grew up and made homes for themselves, the Cowan connection became a large one. His first wife, Mrs. Mary Jane, died in the fall of 1878. He disposed of his farm in Leeds and bought from the late Noah Peck, a beautiful level farm, part of what was called the "Hay land," in Lansdowne, on front road, near the Keyes side road, seven miles east of Gananoque, where the rest of his life was spent.
Mr. Cowan's life, though a long one, was not an eventful one. There was but one period during which he left his farm and occupation. That was during the rebellion of 1837, when he did most serious service at Kingston, Prescott and other places. He served under his uncle Alexander, who was captain. He was at the battle of the Windmill, and was on duty at the execution of Schultz at Kingston, being then a sergeant.
Having spent his younger days in the woods, where game of all sorts abounded, he naturally became a great sportsman, and for many years was reputed to be the best rifle shooter in the district. He was also a noted checker player, and generally of a most genial and convivial disposition, which rendered him exceedingly popular. At the same time he was a man who attended highly to his own affairs, and only indulged in amusement when such relaxation did not require him to neglect his business. He was a thoroughly honorable man in every respect, kind, hearty, and always ready to do a neighborly service; but not inclined for public office or any self advancement outside of his own affairs. He was active until a few weeks before his death.

IN CAMP DESERONTO.

Official Report Of The Firing Competitions.

The most important event in camp this week was the visit of the highest military officer in the country, General Dunderburg, and it must be satisfactory to Col. Drury, the staff officers and the officers and men of the militia who have been in competition to know that his lordship is satisfied with the progress that has been made and with the arrangements and conduct of the camp.
Another event of importance which Lord Dunderburg took a substantial interest in was the Dominion day sports in the Deseronto Driving Park, under the auspices of the Pitkin Field Battery. It will be interesting to readers to know the names of the men who took part in the competition for Lord Dunderburg's prizes, \$10 for first and \$5 for second in the artillery and "B" Battery took first prize, with Sergt. Fowler No. 1 of the subdivision, Drivers Grieguerre and Smith, Gunners Br. McDonald, Br. Hart, Br. Lameroux and Gr. Hubley. "A" Battery took second prize, with Sergt. Slater No. 1 of the subdivision, Drivers Br. Peary and Rolson, Gunners Corpl. Rider, Br. Fee, Gr. Webster and Br. Hopkins. All the men did their share of the work creditably. In the barback wrestling "B" Battery won without a man dismounted, while in "A" Battery five men came off their mounts.
The following is the official recapitulation of the scores made by the different batteries in their target practice:
14th, Midland, 78.32; "A" R.C.F.A., 74.50; "B" R.C.F.A., 68.63; 8th, Gananoque, 65.36; 7th, St. Catharines, 62.04; Hamilton, 61.75; 16th, Guelph, 46.79; 2nd, First Battery, Guelph, 46; 11th, Guelph, 42.13; 10th, Toronto, 41.35; Royal Military College, 37.50; "A" and "B" Batteries not competing with other batteries.
The Dominion day camp will be broken up for the season, and the R.C.F.A. will return to Kingston, partly by boat and partly by road.

AMENDMENTS TO ACT.
And Quite a Cut in Salaries Contemplated.
The minister of justice has introduced a bill for the consolidation and amendment of the acts relating to the penitentiaries. The bill contains an amended scale of salaries for the officials at the several institutions, and in several instances the stipends are reduced. At Kingston the two chaplains will be paid \$1,000 instead of \$1,200 each, the surgeon will receive \$1,500 instead of \$1,800, and the accountant and clerk of industries will be paid \$1,400 by virtue of his dual office. The present salary as accountant is \$1,200. The office of assistant chaplain is created, with a salary of \$600. The office of hospital overseer and schoolmaster has a salary of \$1,200 attached. When the bill passes the amount will be \$800, and that of the assistant \$600, instead of \$700. The chief keeper draws \$1,200, but the new salary suggested is \$800. A position as night keeper at \$700 is established. The other changes contemplated are: Engineer, \$1,800, instead of \$1,500; chief trade instructor, \$1,000, instead of \$800; and superintendent of cordage, \$1,000, instead of \$1,500.
